

JOURNAL OF RECONVENED ANNUAL TOWN MEETING HELD TUESDAY, MARCH 8, 1966

ARTICLE 51

To see if the Town will vote to establish a School Building Committee consisting of five (5) members; Three (3) of whom shall be chosen from the Continuing School Building Study Committee and two (2) to be appointed from the Town at large by the Moderator. One of the Continuing School Building Study Committee members shall be a School Committee member. This Committee to bring in at the next Annual Town Meeting, or any Special Town Meeting, plans and estimates for a school facility to be built on land owned by the Town to house 800 students, expandable to 1200 students; and to raise and appropriate, or appropriate from available funds the sum of \$8,000.00 for this purpose, or take any other action relative thereto.

Continuing School Building Study Committee

VOTED: That the Town do establish a School Building Committee and do appropriate the sum of \$8,000.00 for this purpose.

ARTICLE 52

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or appropriate from available funds the sum of \$1,000.00 to the fund now used toward the development of the playground area at the Indian Head site, said fund to be used under the direction of the Playground Committee, or take any other action relative thereto.

VOTED: That this Article be passed over.

ARTICLE 53

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or appropriate from available funds the sum of \$6,190.00 for the purpose of purchasing a Model F Worthington Tractor or its equal, with 5 gang hydraulically operated mowers, said sum to be expended under the direction of the Playground Committee, or take any other action relative thereto.

VOTED: That this Article be passed over.

ARTICLE 54

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or appro-

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priate from available funds the sum of \$6,304.11 for the purpose of purchasing approximately 3.15 acres of land from the Petrell Land Development Corp. shown as Lot 46 (Dillingham Road) Plan 16 of the Assessors Maps, for playground purposes, and to authorize the Selectmen to purchase said land, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 55

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or appropriate from available funds the sum of \$3,000.00 for the purpose of building an outdoor basketball court, complete with lighting facilities and enclosed by a fence, at the B. Everett Hall Playground. Said sum to be expended under the direction of the Playground Committee, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 56

To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following by-law:

"There is hereby established in the Town of Hanover, pursuant to General Laws, Chapter 40, Section 8B, a council for the aging to consist of not more than five members as may be determined annually by the Selectmen. The members shall be appointed annually in the month of March by the Selectmen and shall serve from the first day of April until the thirty-first day of March following and for such further time as may be required until their successors are chosen. The council shall have all of the powers and duties granted by law and particularly the power to co-ordinate or carry out programs designed to meet the problems of the aging.

Article XXII, Junk and Car Disposal Law:

1. No person shall store or place, or permit to be stored or placed on premises which he owns, leases or occupies any debris, junk scrap metals or other waste material or products, which in the opinion of the Board of Selectmen shall be considered detrimental to the public safety, health and good.
2. No junked or disabled motor vehicles, or parts thereof, shall be stored, parked or placed on any premises unless the same shall be within a building or area unexposed to view of the public and abutters, or within an area licensed under Chapter 140, Sections 55 to 57 of the General Laws for the storage of same by licensed junk dealers and automobile dealers.
3. Any person, violating any of the provisions of this By-Law may be fined not more than twenty dollars for each offense. Each day that such violation continues shall constitute a separate offense.

To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Moderator to appoint a committee of five (5), consisting of one member of the Board of Selectmen, one member of the Advisory Committee, the Building Inspector and two(2) citizens who are not Town Officials or Employees, said committee to study the present Town Hall facilities and to bring in their recommendations concerning the need for any alterations or an addition to the Town Hall, said committee to report at any Special Town Meeting or the next Annual Town Meeting, or take any other action relative thereto.

 Hartford Railroad Company right of way, and the Northerly side line
 of Hanover Street, and bounded Easterly and Westerly by land of Marion
 G. Josselyn and Esther T. Josselyn; reserving to the Town of Hanover
 the perpetual right and easement to lay, construct and maintain water
 mains and hydrants within the former layout of said Circuit Street, or
 to take any other action relative thereto.

JOURNAL OF ANNUAL TOWN ELECTION HELD SATURDAY, MARCH 12, 1966

At 12:00 noon the adjourned Annual Town Meeting convened at the Hanover High School for the Election of Officers. The Meeting was called to order by Everett G. Rhodes, Warden. The Warrant was delivered to the Town Clerk, Hartnell J. Bartlett, by Thomas G. Axon, Constable. Mr. Bartlett read Article 74 as follows:

To bring in their votes for each of the following for a term of three years: one Selectmen, one Assessor, one member of the Board of Public Welfare, one member of the Board of Health, one Cemetery Commissioner, one Water Commissioner, one Trustee of the Public Library, two members of the Hanover School Committee. ARTICLE 2

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Library Addition and Study Committee as established under Article 3 of the Special Town Meeting of July 20, 1964, to accept and utilize any funds received on behalf of the Town in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 74, of the Acts of 1945 for the purpose of the library additions voted under Article 45 of the Annual Town Meeting of March 7, 1966. That any funds received under the provisions of PL 88-269, Title II of the Library Construction Act, or any similar funds, shall be used to reduce the amount of authorized borrowing as approved under Article 45 of said Annual Town Meeting, said Federal funds to be expended under the provisions of PL-88-269, and that the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen be authorized to borrow in anticipation of revenue, in accordance with the general laws, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 3

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Town of Hanover Zoning By-Law of August 30, 1965, as follows:

Delete Section VII E in its entirety and insert the following:

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Section VII

E. Signs:

1. Non-illuminated signs are permitted in all districts, subject to restrictions as follows:
 - a. One (1) sign for identification, announcement of professional or home occupations or announcement of membership of an occupant of a dwelling, or announcement of use of any other property, not exceeding six (6) square feet in area;
 - b. One (1) sign pertaining to the rent, lease or sale of land or building on which the sign is located not exceeding twelve (12) square feet in area, except that if the tract of land has more frontage that would be required for a dwelling, it may have one (1) such sign on each increment of required frontage.
2. In Business, Commercial and Limited Industrial Districts additional signs advertising goods and services available on the premises or identifying the name of the occupant of a business development or industrial park, or advertising the premises for sale or lease are permitted, provided that:
 - a. A building permit has been granted as required in Section VIII A of this bylaw.
 - b. No sign shall exceed forty-eight (48) square feet in area unless a greater size is approved by the Board of Appeals as provided in Section IX of this bylaw.
 - c. No sign shall be erected which is oscillating, flashing, or operated with movable parts.
 - d. The top of the sign shall not be more than twenty-five (25) feet above the ground unless a greater height is approved by the Board of Appeals as provided in Section IX of this bylaw.
 - e. The location of any free-standing sign shall be at least ten (10) feet from all street lines and district boundary lines except where a greater distance is required in Section VII B 2.

James A. Miniutti, Chairman of the Hanover Planning Board, proposed the following recommendation:

At the time of the writing of the new Zoning By-Law and issuance of the present Zoning Map, the Industrial Fireworks area was designated to lie within the boundaries of the fence. This designation was done for expediency. The proposed area, although lying outside of the fence was originally zoned Industrial Fireworks, and the Planning Board believes it should revert to that status.

The Hanover Planning Board unanimously recommends that the Town approve this Article.

VOTED: Unanimously to approve the amendments to the Zoning By-Laws and the Zoning Map.

ARTICLE 8

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning By-Law, adopted June 14, 1965 by adding to Section VI, E, 1, the following additional provision, or take any other action relative thereto:

g. In Limited Industrial Districts abutting Commercial Districts, any uses permitted in a Commercial District, Paragraph D, subject to the restrictions therein contained.

By Development and Industrial Commission

James A. Miniutti, Chairman of the Hanover Planning Board, proposed the following recommendation:

The Planning Board does have some apprehension about this Article.

However, the Board will not submit an adverse report.

The Planning Board believes that if the Town does approve this Article, the Board should, with the assistance of the Industrial and Development Commission, look into the possibility of future protected Industrial areas for the Town of Hanover.

This Article was voted unanimously.

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ARTICLE 9

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning By-Law, adopted June 14, 1965 by adding to Section VI, D, the following additional provision, or take any other action relative thereto:

3. Industrial Right of Way:

Where access to land included in the Limited Industrial District is separated from a major thorough-fare by a Commercial District, an industrial right of way is permitted through the Commercial District.

James A. Miniutti, Chairman of the Hanover Planning Board, proposed the following recommendation:

The planning Board believes that this Article is in the best interests of the Town and, particularly in view of a recent Court decision, the Hanover Planning Board recommends that the Town approve this Article.

ARTICLE 10

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning By-Law and Zoning Map, adopted June 14, 1965, by changing from Limited Industrial to Commercial, the following described land, or take any other action relative thereto:

Starting at a point on the easterly side of Pond Street, 350 feet from the center line of Washington Street, running thence southeasterly at a distance of 350 feet from the center line of Washington Street, crossing successively Lot 7, Plan 31, being property now or formerly of Frederick E. Caldwell et ux; Lot 9, Plan 31 being property now or formerly of Frank N. Fanchon and Anthony Rawson; Lots 30 and 31, Plan 39, both now or formerly of W. T. White and P. B. MacDonald; Lot 32, Plan 39, now or formerly of Edward A. and Virginia E. Fisher; Lots 33 and 34, Plan 39, both now or formerly of Robert and Lyda R. The annual Town Meeting was held in the Gymnasium of the Hanover High School on Monday, March 6, 1967. Voters were checked at the entrance to the hall by the following tellers, appointed by the Selectmen and sworn into office by the Town Clerk: Mary E. Smith, Mary A. Downing, Josephine E. Kendrigan and Marie H. Mullin. The number of voters present were 452.

The Moderator, George H. Lewald, called the meeting to order at 8:15 o'clock P.M. The warrant was returned to the Town Clerk, Hartnell J. Bartlett, by Thomas G. Axon, Constable. Mr. Bartlett read the call for the meeting and it was voted to omit the reading of the articles.

Mr. Frederick F. Nagel led the audience in a salute to the flag.

The invocation prayer was offered by the Rev. Robert L. Jones.

Mr. Allan A. Carnes moved that Resolutions Committees be appointed pertaining to the deaths of Jeremiah J. Hayes and Edwin B. Dwelley and then voted that the Resolutions Committee on the death of Jeremiah J. Hayes consist of Frederick F. Nagel, Howard F. Levings and John W. Stoddard and that the Resolutions Committee on the death of Edwin B. Dwelley consist of John Thomson, John H. White and R. Irving Lovell.

The following tribute to Alfred G. Lovell was read by Allan A. Carnes and it was unanimously voted that the tribute be incorporated in the records of the Town Meeting:

Since 1727, the date of Incorporation of the Town of Hanover, our Citizens have gathered together at an Annual Meeting to conduct it's affairs for the ensuing year and to compile an official record of the activities and accomplishments having occurred since the previous Annual Meeting..

An examination and comparison of these official records clearly indicates that from 1727 to this very day, whenever warranted, our townspeople have publicly recognized and commended those who have labored long and well in the vineyard of public service.

Alfred G. Lovell is eminently qualified for the honor we are bestowing upon him tonight. For over 20 years his every thought, word and action has been in the interest of the development and preservation of public playgrounds and athletic fields. He helped conceive the idea of a Playground Committee with Moderator Frederick M. Barnicoat in 1946. He was appointed to the original Playground Committee in 1947 by Moderator Harold F. Studley together with William Lloyd and George L. Legg.

Alfred G. Lovell was continuously reappointed to this position by Moderator Harold W. Rinear and our present Moderator George H. Lewald. He served as Chairman of the Committee for 19 years. His decision to retire from this position in 1966 was accepted with extreme reluctance by Moderator Lewald.

Every citizen is aware of his quiet dedication to our youth and his self-sacrifice in our behalf. Many of the men who served with him tell us that it was not uncommon for Al Lovell to supply material and equipment out of his own funds in the early stages of the program. To him, the success of his projects were adequate compensation. Alfred G. Lovell has made a lasting impression on our community. We are fortunate to have him as a friend and neighbor. His integrity, dedication and faithful service to all of us will remain on perpetual record. With sincere appreciation of his many years of labor and service in our behalf and with every good wish for his future success in all his endeavors, the Moderator and Board of Selectmen respectfully move that a copy of this tribute be incorporated in the records of the Town Clerk and that this Town Meeting rise and publicly express their gratitude to Alfred G. Lovell.

The next step was to present the revised plans for approval to the Massachusetts Department of Library Extension, the awarding authority for federal funds on library projects. Since the number of square feet available for library use remains the same as that in the original plan, approval was forthcoming, and Hanover is still eligible for its \$40,000 federal grant.

The Committee then advertised for bids which were opened on February 16, 1967. The Waynrich Corporation of Framingham were the low bidders at a figure which will allow the construction of the Library Addition within the amount of our appropriation. The Committee has since voted to award the contract to the Waynrich Corporation, and the agreement will be signed as soon as the sub-bids can be checked.

This means that construction can start in a matter of weeks and that, if all goes well, the Committee can turn over the facility to the Trustees in the early fall.

Town Garage Study Committee report of progress. This is a progress report by the Committee appointed under the provisions of Article 28 of the Annual Town Meeting of 1965, said Committee to study the advisability of constructing a garage for the Highway Department and to determine the best location for same.

At the Annual Town Meeting of 1966 we submitted a progress report in which we outlined the extreme necessity for the construction of a Highway Department garage. The report included the type, use and value of heavy equipment, subsidiary equipment and tools now in the care, custody and control of the Highway Surveyor. The current replacement value is approximately the same as noted last year and with the equipment requested within our present Warrant the replacement value will be approximately \$128,000.00.

We have talked with many local and district officials concerning our present facilities and all agree that the present operations are being conducted under most difficult conditions.

We sincerely hope that the townspeople will approve the construction of an adequate facility to be ready for occupancy not later than 1969.

Last year we recommended that the Advisory Committee set aside within the Stabilization Fund, by popular agreement, a sum of money to be added to this year and next year, so that it will not be necessary to borrow for this facility at the time of construction. It is our understanding that the Advisory Committee has approved this plan and that you will be asked to earmark \$25,000.00 for this purpose.

At the present time we are studying the best location for the proposed garage taking into consideration that the location and type of construction should accommodate easy expansion as the town grows or if the facility should some day involve a combination of departments.

Drainage Committee report of progress. We wish to thank all of you for your cooperation this past year in our efforts to improve the street drainage in the Town of Hanover. This Committee has installed over 400 feet of pipe at eight locations throughout the town. Some of this pipe has been of small size diameter while some has been as large as 40 inches in diameter. We know that a serious drainage problem at each of these locations has been eliminated, but every year adds more as the network expands. One of our most pressing problems is to decide the priority each must be given. With an earnest effort to keep the drainage budget at a reasonable level, we strive to obtain the most drainage at the least cost to the Town of Hanover.

This past year we have obtained and compiled a master plan of all drainage systems which the Town maintains. We hope that in the future this will eliminate any question as to pipe location, size, and direction of flow. This plan of existing facilities was done at a minimal expense to the Town, due mainly to the excellent cooperation of the Highway Department. While this plan might seem trivial to the average person, this newly compiled knowledge will greatly facilitate our over all planning.

A special town meeting was held in the Hanover High School, Cedar Street, Hanover on Monday, June 5, 1967. Voters were checked by the following tellers, who were sworn in by the Town Clerk, Hartnell J. Bartlett: Mary E. Smith, Mary Downing, Josephine E. Kendrigan and Marie Mullen.

The number of voters present were 376.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, George H. Lewald, at 8:20 P. M. The warrant was delivered by Thomas G. Axon, Constable, to the Town Clerk, Hartnell J. Bartlett, and the warrant was read by the Town Clerk. Mr. Lewald read the call for the meeting.

ARTICLE 1

To hear the report of any committee empowered to report at a Special Town Meeting and act thereon, or take any other action relative thereto.

REPORTS: The School Building Committee Report was given as discussion under Articles 2 and 3, and accepted as a report of progress. There were no other reports.

ARTICLE 2

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or appropriate from available funds the sum of Eighty-nine Thousand Dollars (\$89,000.00) for final plans, specifications and bids for building and originally equipping a 700 pupil school to be constructed on land taken by the Town for school purposes on and near Whiting Street; said work to be done under the direction of the School Building Committee, established under Article 51 of the Annual Town Meeting of March 7, 1966, or take any other action relative thereto.

MOVED: To raise and appropriate \$89,000.00 for this purpose.

VOTED: To reject this article.

ARTICLE 3

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or appropriate from available funds the sum of One Hundred Thirty-Six Thousand Dollars (\$136,000.00) for final plans, specifications and bids for building and originally equipping a 1000-1200 pupil school to be constructed on land taken by the Town for school purposes on or near Whiting Street; said work to be done under the direction of the School Building Committee, established under Article 51 of the Annual Town Meeting of March 7, 1966, or take any other action relative thereto.

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the Federal Government for that part of the cost of surveys, plans and reports allocated to a particular sewer project, if, and when, the particular sewer project is subsequently voted by the Town, said study to be made by an engineer, approved by the Administrator, and that the Town authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Board of Selectmen, to accept a planning advance from the United States Government under the terms of Public Law 560, as amended, for the purpose of making said survey for the Town of Hanover, or act on anything relating thereto.

ARTICLE 5

To see if the Town will vote to name the square at the junction of School and Circuit Streets in honor of Pvt. Fred Yetsook, U. S. Army, who lost his life in the service of his country during World War II, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 6

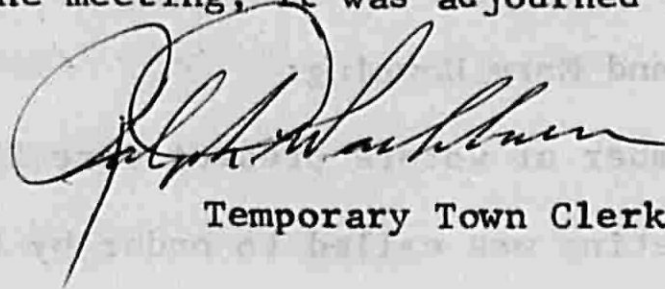

JOURNAL OF ANNUAL TOWN MEETING HELD MONDAY, MARCH 4, 1968

The annual Town Meeting was held in the Gymnasium of the Hanover High School on Monday, March 4, 1968. Voters were checked at the entrance to the hall by the following tellers: Marie Mullin, Barbara Smith, Florence Oldham, Mary Smith, Laura Murphy, Mary Downing, Josephine Kendrigan and Annie Michalowski. The number of voters present was 360.

The Moderator, George H. Lewald, called the meeting to order at 8:15 o'clock P.M. The warrant was returned to the Temporary Town Clerk, Ralph D. Washburn, by Thomas G. Axon, Constable. Mr. Washburn read the call for the meeting and it was voted to omit the reading of the articles.

Mr. Louis Napolitan, Commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, led the audience in a salute to the flag.

The invocation prayer was offered by the Rev. Martin P. Connor.

Mr. Carnes asked and was granted permission to make the following statement:

On Memorial Day, May 30, 1952, the citizens of Hanover, Military and Civic bodies, representatives of the Armed Forces of the United States and visiting dignitaries gathered in front of the Hanover Town Hall to appropriately dedicate a granite monument and flag pole in honor of the 377 men and women who served our Country in World War II. Inscribed on this monument are the names of the 14 men who made the supreme sacrifice that we might continue to govern ourselves as free men and women just as we are doing tonight.

It was the fervent hope and prayer of everyone present at that solemn ceremony that the occasion would never again arise when our young men would be taking up arms and we would be praying for their safe return or bowing our heads in supplication and anguish over their loss.

The passage of time clearly indicates that we are no closer today to eliminating the struggle between man and man than we were over 200 years ago at the time of the French and Indian Wars. For the tenth time since the founding of the Town of Hanover our young men are engaged in a conflict and once again we pause to honor the memory of those who have fallen in battle. Our thoughts go out to those who were the nearest and dearest to these young men. Our thoughts are also directed to the young men who are in the battle area at this minute and we pray for their safe return.

A TRIBUTE TO WENDELL D. BLANCHARD

It is a great honor that I, Frederick L. Briggs, member of the Board of Health, stand before this March 4, 1968 Town Meeting to pay tribute to Mr. Wendell D. Blanchard.

Mr. Blanchard has been a member of the Hanover Board of Health for the past twenty years and has been Chairman for twelve of those years.

Bud, as he is known to residents of Hanover, has been a pioneer, dedicating himself to the obligations that are commensurate with the duties of the Hanover Board of Health.

Bud has served over the last twenty years, sacrificing much of his time to make the Town of Hanover a better town in which to live. He has given of himself, taken time from his family only because he was interested, public-spirited, and realized the necessity that all who live in a community should assist in its operation.

He submitted his resignation to the Board of Selectmen on August 14, 1967 and when it became public knowledge, there was much pressure brought to bear to attempt to have him reconsider, but he thought he had served long enough and so it was with deep regret his resignation was accepted.

Those of the residents, past members of the Board of Health, present members, and other committees who have worked with him, know of his true devotion and dedication, and know his resignation is truly a loss to the Town of Hanover.

Continuing School Building Study Committee report to the Town Meeting:

The members feel, in view of the Town's lack of space for our present and future school population, and the threat of Kindergartens in the very near future, this Committee should continue, but with some review and reorganization. Highway Department Garage Study Committee. Doctor's Committee Report 1967-1968: Several meetings were held in 1967 to consider methods of attracting physicians to the area. Advertisements had been placed in journals and notices sent to hospitals and schools throughout New England. Responses were very few and those who did come to Hanover were more interested in group practices and hospital facilities. Some of our plans have been in abeyance due to the formulation of the new hospital and its location and type.

One of the most logical approaches to securing a new physician is that of the Sears-Roebuck Medical Foundation. This program helps the town survey the need for physicians in the area and supplies advice, plans and materials to secure a physician. Its basic plan is to have the town people participate by having them invest in a unique professional building which, by the contribution of its presence and the town interest, will attract physicians.

This has been over 86% successful. I talked with the director of the Sears Foundation, Mr. Norman Davis, in Chicago last week, and after telling him of the situation, he felt that we certainly need physicians in town and that a survey of a representative group of citizens should be made. I told him that there were many physicians in nearby towns but he said that the size of Hanover itself warranted more practitioners. The fact of the new hospital may be enough to bring men to the area, but whether to Hanover or not would depend on what could be offered better than other towns.

We would like approval to add some new members to this committee who presently are interested and who feel the need for new physicians is paramount to Hanover. We would also like approval to apply for the Sears-Roebuck Medical Foundation Survey.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or appropriate from available funds the sum of \$100.00 for the use of the Plymouth County Aid to Agriculture and choose a director as provided in Chapter 128, Sections 41 and 45 of the Tercentenary Edition or take any other action relative thereto.

VOTED: That the Town do raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for this purpose, and that the Moderator appoint a director.

ARTICLE 16

To see if the Town will assume liability in the manner provided by Section 29 of Chapter 91 of the General Laws, as most recently amended by Chapter 5, Acts of 1955, for all damages that may be incurred by work to be performed by the Department of Public Works of Massachusetts for the improvement, development, maintenance and protection of tidal and non-tidal rivers and streams, harbors, tidewaters, foreshores and shores along a public beach, including the Merrimack and Connecticut Rivers, in accordance with Section 11 of Chapter 91 of the General Laws, and authorize the Selectmen to execute and deliver a bond of indemnity therefor to the Commonwealth.

VOTED: That the Town so do.

ARTICLE 17

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or appropriate from available funds a sum of money to purchase and equip a 1,000 GPM Midship Combination Pumping Engine, said purchasing and equipping to be done under the direction of the Board of Fire Engineers, and to authorize the Board of Fire Engineers to trade in the front end pump and body of the 1954 Ford Pumping Engine and to further authorize the Board of Fire Engineers to give to the Highway Department the chassis of said truck, or take any other action relative thereto.

Hanover Board of Fire Engineers.

VOTED, by vote of more than 2/3, that the Town appropriate the sum of \$21,000.00 from the Stabilization Fund for this purpose.

ARTICLE 18

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, or appropriate from available funds the sum of \$15,000.00 for permanent construction of a portion of Silver Street or take any other action relative thereto.

Highway Surveyor

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VOTED that the Town do transfer \$4,999.03 from the proceeds received or to be received from the State under the provisions of Chapter 616 of the Acts of 1967 and do raise and appropriate \$10,000.97 for the permanent construction of Silver Street.

ARTICLE 19

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or appropriate from available funds the sum of \$20,000.00 for Chapter 90 Highway Work on East Street and Cedar Street, or take any other action relative thereto.

Highway Surveyor

VOTED that the Town raise and appropriate \$5,000.00 and appropriate \$15,000.00 from available funds for this purpose.

ARTICLE 20

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or appropriate from available funds the sum of \$3,000.00 for Chapter 90 Maintenance Work, or take any other action relative thereto.

Highway Surveyor

VOTED that the Town raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 and appropriate \$2,000.00 from available funds for this purpose.

ARTICLE 21

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or appropriate from available funds the sum of \$3,500.00 to purchase a new Four Wheel Drive Pickup for the Highway Department, or take any other action relative thereto.

Highway Surveyor

VOTED: That the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500.00 for this purpose.

ARTICLE 22

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or appropriate from available funds the sum of \$1,500.00 to purchase a second hand chassis for the Highway Department to replace the 1948 chassis of one of our Automatic Sanders, or take any other action relative thereto.

Highway Surveyor.

VOTED: That this article be passed over.

ARTICLE 23

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or appropriate from available funds a sum of money to purchase and equip two (2) station wagons - ambulance type, 1968 police cruisers and to authorize the trade-in of the two present 1967 Chevrolet Station Wagons - ambulance type police

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cruisers, said purchasing and equipping to be under the direction of the Chief of Police and Board of Selectmen or take any other action relative thereto.

Police Department

VOTED: That the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,400.00 for this purpose.

ARTICLE 24

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Cemetery Commissioners to appoint members of their commission to be employed in the Cemetery and to fix the compensation of such employees in accordance with Chapter 41, Section 4a of the General Laws, or take any other action relative thereto.

Cemetery Commissioners

VOTED: That the town authorize members of the Cemetery Commission to be employed in the Cemetery and that the compensation be fixed at \$2.55 per hour as Superintendent and other members of the Commission at \$2.44 per hour, such pay to be effective April 1, 1968.

ARTICLE 25

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 from the Graves and Foundations Fund to the Graves and Foundations Account in accordance with Chapter 114, Section 15 of the Tercentenary Edition of the General Laws, or take any other action relative thereto.

Cemetery Commissioners

VOTED: That the Town so do.

ARTICLE 26

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate, as one sum, for the use of the Trustees of the John Curtis Free Library, the sum of \$1,480.75 now in the E. and D. Account, representing receipts from State Assistance to that library during the year 1967, or take any other action relative thereto.

Trustees John Curtis Free Library

VOTED: That the Town so do.

ARTICLE 27

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning By-law of the Town of Hanover, approved August 30, 1965, by deleting from Section VI D, sections c (1) and (2) of paragraph 2; and by deleting from section d. of paragraph 2 the word "automobiles"; and by adding to Section VI D the following:

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3. Uses permitted on approval of the Board of Selectmen, pursuant to the requirements of notice and hearings as provided in Section 4 of Chapter 40A of the General Laws: The following uses require the Board of Selectmen's approval, which shall be based on satisfaction that said use is safe and appropriate, and that it will not create a nuisance by virtue of noise, odor, smoke, vibration, traffic generated or unsightliness.

a. Gasoline service stations, garages and repair shops and Sales-rooms for automobiles, provided that:

- (1) Repairs shall be limited to minor repairs and adjustments unless conducted in a building.
- (2) There shall be no storage of motor vehicles, appliances and equipment on the premises other than those in process of repair or awaiting delivery or in an enclosed structure.

Board of Selectmen

VOTED unanimously that this amendment be adopted.

ARTICLE 28

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning By-law of the Town of Hanover, approved August 30, 1965, by deleting Section VII C, and inserting in place thereof the following:

C. Accessory Buildings:

A detached accessory building or a swimming pool may be erected in the rear or side yard area in conformance with the yard requirements of the district in which it is located. An accessory building attached to its principal building shall be considered an integral part thereof, and as such shall be subject to the front, side and rear yard requirements applicable to the principal building. A swimming pool may be considered accessory to the use of a dwelling unit provided such pool is used by the residents of the premises and their guests, and that it be in conformance with the yard requirements of the district in which it is located and that the pool be securely fenced to a height not less than four feet.

Board of Selectmen

VOTED unanimously that this amendment be adopted.

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ARTICLE 29

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning By-law of the Town of Hanover, approved August 30, 1965, by adding to Section VI, C:

2. Uses permitted upon approval of the Board of Appeals as provided in Section IX. The following uses require Board of Appeals approval, which shall be based on satisfaction that said use is appropriate and is not prejudicial to the future development of the Business District.

- a. Single family detached dwellings, subject to the frontage, lot-size, set-back and minimum floor area requirements applicable in the Residence A District.
- b. Multiple-use buildings, containing one or more Business facilities and not to exceed one single-family residential unit which is secondary to the business utilization of the premises, subject to a determination by the Board of Appeals that the lot frontage and size and the proposed residential floor area and proposed set-backs either meet the requirements applicable in the Residence A District or are appropriate for the particular utilization proposed for approval.

Board of Selectmen

VOTED: Unanimously that this amendment be adopted.

ARTICLE 30

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning By-law adopted June 14, 1965 as amended to date, by adding a new paragraph at the end of Section VII, as follows:

4. The required fifty-foot side and rear yards for a business use abutting a residential district may be reduced by special permit by the Board of Appeals upon its determination that such reduction will not create a nuisance by virtue of traffic or unsightliness.

Development and Industrial Commission

VOTED: That this article be passed over.

ARTICLE 31

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Map adopted June 14, 1965 as amended to date, by changing from Residential to Business a certain area adjacent to the business zone at Broadway and Cross Street, described as follows, or to take any other action relative thereto:

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Starting at a certain point on the Southerly side of Broadway, at the northeast corner of Lot 27, Plan 78, Hanover Assessors' Map; thence running

Westerly along the Southerly side of Broadway, a distance of one hundred (100) feet; thence turning and running

Southwesterly across said Lot 27, a distance of one hundred eighty-nine (189) feet, more or less, to a point located ten (10) feet from the northwesterly corner of a building presently used as a dental office, on a line, which is the extension of the northerly side-line of said building at the height of the ground at the point; thence turning and running

Southerly a distance of one hundred forty (140) feet, more or less, to the shore of the pond; thence turning and running

Easterly along the shore of the pond, a distance of three hundred (300) feet, more or less, to the present business zone; thence turning and running

Northwesterly along the westerly boundary of the present business zone, two hundred twenty-five (225) feet more or less, to the point of beginning.

Development and Industrial Commission

VOTED: That this article be passed over.

ARTICLE 32

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey to Samuel J. Zona whatever rights or interest the Town has in a small parcel of land located on the southwest corner of the intersection of Broadway and Columbia Road and identified as Lot 144 of Plan 57 of the Assessors' Maps of the Town of Hanover, said parcel consisting of approximately 3900 square feet, providing the Selectmen retain sufficient land for the radius at said intersection; and further providing that the purchase price for said land shall be \$980.00 and that Samuel J. Zona must combine this lot with Lot 142 of Plan 57 which is the adjoining lot owned by him, or take any other action relative thereto.

Board of Selectmen

VOTED: That the Town so do.

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ARTICLE 33

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Moderator to appoint a Committee of five to investigate the possibilities of establishing a Municipal Golf Course for the Town of Hanover and report at an Annual or Special Town Meeting, or take any other action relative thereto.

Planning Board

VOTED: That the Town so do.

ARTICLE 34

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 from the Water Department Surplus Revenue Account for the purpose of installing approximately 700 feet of 8 inch water main on Main Street, connecting two dead ends, or take any other action relative thereto.

Water Commissioners

VOTED: That the Town so do.

ARTICLE 35

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 from the Water Department Surplus Revenue Account for the purpose of purchasing a new 3/4 ton truck equipped with a utility body for the Water Department, and authorize the Board of Water Commissioners to trade in the present 1964 3/4 ton truck as part payment, said purchase to be under the direction of the Water Commissioners, or take any other action relative thereto.

Board of Water Commissioners

VOTED: That the Town so do.

ARTICLE 36

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$16,000.00 from the Water Department Surplus Revenue Account for the purpose of cleaning, painting and repairing the water storage tank on Union Street, inside and outside, or take any other action relative thereto.

Board of Water Commissioners

VOTED: That the Town so do.

ARTICLE 37

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or appropriate from available funds the sum of \$10,000.00 for the Conservation Commission, or take any other action relative thereto.

Conservation Commission

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VOTED: That the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for the Conservation Commission.

ARTICLE 38

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or appropriate from available funds the sum of \$3,117.00 for the purpose of completing the Field House being built adjacent to Hanover High School, for which appropriations were made under Article 36 of the March 6, 1967 Town Meeting, said work being done under the direction of the School Committee, or take any other action relative thereto.

School Committee

VOTED: That the Town do raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,117.00 for this purpose.

ARTICLE 39

To see if the Town will vote to establish a School Building Committee consisting of five (5) members; three (3) of whom shall be chosen from the Town at large, one (1) from the School Committee and one (1) from the Continuing School Building Study Committee, all these to be appointed by the Moderator. This Committee to bring in at the next Annual Town Meeting, or any Special Town Meeting, plans and estimates for a new school to be built on land owned by the Town, or additions to existing buildings, to provide school housing; and to raise and appropriate, or appropriate from available funds the sum of \$15,000.00 for this purpose or take any other action relative thereto.

School Committee

The Advisory Committee moved that this article be passed over, but by vote of the meeting such a motion did not carry.

VOTED: That such a committee be appointed and that the sum of \$15,000.00 be raised and appropriated for such purpose.

ARTICLE 40

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or appropriate from available funds the sum of \$750.00 to be added to the \$2,000.00 voted last year for toilet facilities at the B. Everett Hall Playground. The appropriation to be used to construct these facilities under the direction of the Playground Committee, or take any other action relative thereto.

Playground Committee

VOTED: That the Town do raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 for this purpose.

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
