

We respectfully submit the one hundred and twenty-first Annual Report of the Officers and Committees of the Town of Hanover for the year ended December 31, 1973.

It will be remembered that the year 1973 came to a climactic conclusion with a fuel and energy crisis being foremost on everyone's mind. Your Board is particularly concerned with this problem since it has far reaching effects on such things as ability to provide proper municipal services during emergency situations, lack of heat for the aged and ill, spiraling costs to all town departments and other innumerable situations. We feel confident however that we shall avoid any crises by exploring all avenues available to us and request your support in our efforts.

The Board of Selectmen held regularly scheduled meetings during 1973, each Monday evening and the first and third Wednesday evening of each month. Many special meetings were held to investigate special problems that arose, to listen to and investigate complaints, to hold public hearings and to address ourselves to future problems we can foresee. The Board appeared before the County Commissioners, Special Legislative Committees, the Governor of the Commonwealth, and other Committees and Commissions to present the Town's best interest on matters that affected its citizens general welfare and well-being. Meetings were held with Town Boards, Committees, Commissions and Department Heads to discuss mutual problems and to make continued plans for efficient operation of our town. We were pleased to attend the dedication of the new Compactor plant and congratulate the Board of Health on the creation of a highly regarded plant. We also have observed the operation of the new Department of Public Works and congratulate the Commissioners on their excellent progress.

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Journal of Annual Town Meeting Held on Monday, March 5, 1973

The Annual Town Meeting at Hanover High School was called to order by George H. Lewald, Moderator at 8:30 P.M. Monday, March 5, 1973 with 615 voters present.

Reverend James S. Crawford offered the invocation which was followed by the pledge to the flag.

The Moderator asked that the Town Clerk record that the Warrant had been served and returned as required by the Town By-Laws.

Selectman Allan A. Carnes read the following resolution on the death of George Lewis Legg.

RESOLUTION ON THE DEATH OF GEORGE LEWIS LEGG

WHEREAS: The Town of Hanover having suffered the loss of one of its most highly respected citizens,

GEORGE LEWIS LEGG

Born August 25, 1899

Departed March 14, 1972

it is fitting and proper that we, in Town Meeting Assembled, recognize his long and distinguished career as a public servant, and

WHEREAS: He served as Superintendent of the Hanover Water Department for twenty-three years, and

WHEREAS: He served for twenty-five years as a Firefighter with Engine Company No. 6, and

WHEREAS: he served as a member of the Advisory Committee for ten years, and

WHEREAS: He served as a member of the Playground Committee for fifteen years, and

WHEREAS: He consistently displayed a sincere interest in the welfare of the children of Hanover, freely giving of his time and talent in their behalf, thus earning the affection and respect of all the Citizens of Hanover, and

WHEREAS: He dischareged his duties and responsibilities with great integrity and fidelity, and

WHEREAS: The Town of Hanover has lost a loyal citizen, a faithful public servant and a true friend, now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED: That the Citizens of the Town of Hanover in Town Meeting assembled do hereby publicly express their appreciation of the Honorable and faithful service he rendered in their behalf for so many years and that this Resolution be incorporated in the Records of the Town Clerk and a copy thereof suitably attested be presented to his family.

The Moderator told the meeting that Mr. A. Donald Deluse, Chairman of the Advisory Committee, had indicated that he would not accept reappointment to the committee. The Moderator expressed his regret that we would lose the services of Mr. Deluse who has done such a fine job in the last few years. At the close of his remarks the citizens responded with a show of appreciation.

REPORT OF BUILDING COMMITTEE FOR A NEW POLICE STATION

Pursuant to Article 43 of the Annual Town Meeting held on March 6, 1972 it was voted — That the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$17,000.00 for the purpose of obtaining final plans and firm bids to construct and originally equip a Police Station on a parcel of land donated to the Town as a gift by Ralph D. Tedeschi.

The Committee reports as follows:

Final plans were completed by Mr. Burne, the Architect, in December of 1972.

Invitations to bid were advertised in both the Quincy Patriot Ledger and the Brockton Enterprise. On Tuesday, January 23, 1973 the filed sub bids were opened at 12:00 Noon and the following Tuesday, January 30, 1973 the General Bids were opened. Plans and specifications were requested by a total of seventeen General Contractors and we received bids from eleven. The bids ranged from a low of \$364,200.00 received from the firm of A. P. Whitaker Sons, 536 No. Main St., Randolph, Mass. to a high bid of \$438,000.00 received from C. A. Batson Co., Brockton, Mass.

In consultation with Mr. Burne, the Architect and a representative of the Whitaker Co. it was determined that substitutions could be made in the type of constructions materials used and a total of \$26,700.00 could be deducted from the bid price, lowering the bid of the A. P. Whitaker Co. to \$337,500.00. These changes would be types of materials used and would not affect the physical appearance or functional use of the originally designed building.

A further study was made on the comparative costs for police facilities using data furnished by R. S. Means Co., Publishers of construction costs data. For the period of June 1, 1972 thru June 1, 1973 the general range of costs for law enforcement facilities ran from \$19.30 per sq. ft. in the rural areas to \$91.00 per sq. ft. in the large city areas. In comparing the proposed facility with comparative towns with the same requirements our construction costs of \$22.97 per sq. ft. are about 50% of the average which is \$45.35. The study also showed that a facility with comparative size and function cost \$37.55 per sq. ft. To the above costs should be added \$11.90 per sq. ft. for mechanical equipment which includes electrical, heating, ventilating and plumbing. This would bring the total construction and mechanical costs of the proposed facility to \$34.91 per sq. ft.

The committee proposes that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$367,500.00 to construct the proposed police facility. This sum consists of the following projected costs:

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DRAINAGE COMMITTEE

To the citizens of the Town of Hanover and all Town Officials and Departments:

The Town of Hanover Drainage Committee, during 1972 held monthly meetings and whenever required for emergencies, to hear complaints and review conditions.

All necessary minor complaints have been taken care of by the General Drainage appropriation, and when feasible, major emergency projects were relieved until a special article could be presented to a future Town Meeting.

This year portions of Iron Mine Brook were cleaned from Broadway to Rockland Street and a new 60 inch metal culvert installed under Broadway replacing a defective stone culvert.

In 1973 three special drainage articles will be presented to the Town Meeting for your consideration.

It is our opinion that the committee should be continued and that this report be accepted as a report of progress.

REPORT OF TOWN GOVERNMENT STUDY COMMITTEE

During the past year, the Town Government Study Committee has spent the major portion of its time considering the problems created in connection with the imminent establishment of a Department of Public Works in Hanover.

During the course of the year, we have met with the heads of the departments affected by the Public Works transition and have visited the facilities of the departments involved. Representatives of the Committee have met with the Personnel Board and the Selectmen to discuss special problems in their respective areas of interest, and the members of the Committee have offered their advice and services to the Advisory Committee. Furthermore, we have met with the candidates for the Board of Public Works to discuss the upcoming transition to a Public Works Department and the immediate and long-range problems facing the new Commissioners.

The Committee continues to believe that it is premature at this time to initiate action to establish a Charter Commission for the Town of Hanover. While further reorganization of the Town's government structure is undoubtedly desirable, the Committee is unanimously of the view that no further reorganization of the Town's governmental structure should be undertaken until the significant consolidation affected by the adoption of Public Works has been firmly established.

The Committee believes that it is in the Town's interest to continue the Committee's review of the organization and operation of the Department of Public Works and the several other Town departments and to consider the possibility of initiating and doing preliminary work for a Charter Commission. For these reasons, the Committee asks the Town Meeting to accept this as a report of progress.

OF THE MUNICIPAL GOLF COURSE STUDY COMMITTEE

At the recommendation of the sole member of this committee at the 1972 Annual Town Meeting, new committee members were appointed.

The new committee looked into available areas of land, took up discussions with other towns involved in the same endeavor, and into the types of funding and government reimbursement that was available to the Town.

Since the committee was formed at the Annual Town Meeting of 1968; available tracts of land have greatly diminished, construction costs and maintenance have risen sharply, and government reimbursement funds for such a limited venture is extremely small. This committee feels that further study on the construction of a Municipal Golf Course would not produce any new results, and requests that this report be accepted as a final report and the outstanding balance of \$3,000.00 be returned to the town.

The board holds special sessions for registration before town elections, town meetings, presidential and state primaries and state elections.

All petitions and nomination papers were checked and certified.

Recent legislation changed the residency requirements to 31 days in the State and Town before being able to vote. Rules have been relaxed so that no one should be unable to vote — but still people do neglect to appear for registration during the proper times, or before the closing dates set by law, prior to town meetings and elections. The newspapers, radio and television have been very informative, especially this year, so the public should have been well informed. A call to the office of the Town Clerk can straighten out questions regarding dates of registration, party affiliations, etc.

Report of the Planning Board

To the Citizens of the Town of Hanover:

Calendar year 1973 has been a relatively quiet period for the Hanover Planning Board. It was anticipated that the pent up demand for development resulting from the ban on new water services would make this a very busy year. It appears that the high interest rate structure has operated to continue the inhibition of new development. The gasoline shortage, which makes living in suburban communities without adequate public transportation less attractive, may have a similar short-time effect. While no major subdivisions have been submitted for approval in 1973 there has been increased activity in completing several of those previously approved.

The Planning Board has completed, insofar as available bond money would permit, its work on Twin Fawn Drive and Heritage Way. In both cases the necessity to reconstruct portions of the existing roadway to bring them to grade made the overall cost greater than expected. We are sponsoring articles in the warrant for the annual Town Meeting to, if approved, provide funds to the Department of Public Works to finish work on these streets after their acceptance which it is hoped will take place at that Town Meeting. The Planning Board expects to return to the E & D account, because of development inactivity, more than enough money to cover the estimated expenses on the two streets.

Experience indicates that developers in general are not spending enough time in the early stages of subdivision construction to be sure the locations and grades of streets are correct. We have been unable in the past to secure funds adequate to enable us to provide the necessary supervision as construction is in process and have been forced to delegate this task to the Highway Surveyor and the Water Superintendent, and now the Department of Public Works. These bodies have been very cooperative but are likely to be busiest on their own projects at the times of year developers are working on subdivision streets. We will attempt this year to establish a procedure, by modification of our Subdivision Control Regulations, to include a provision whereby engineers employed by the developers will have to certify the correct completion of each step of construction. Such a procedure, plus occasional observation by the Department of Public Works on critical matters such as water and drainage installations, would minimize the problem in the future. The revised procedures, of course, can not be applied retroactively to subdivisions already approved, but may be applied when they are renewed after the initial approvals and past extensions expire.

We continue to meet at 8 P.M. on the first, third, and fifth Mondays of each month and, where Monday Holidays intervene, on occasional Wednesdays. These meetings are open and the citizens are welcome to attend.

Report of Tax Collector — 1973

To the Board of Selectmen, Town of Hanover;

The following report covers the 12 months of calendar year 1973 which is two-thirds of the fiscal cycle change-over period. The 6 months, January 1 thru June 30, 1974 will complete the 18 months change-over.

A single Real Estate Bill for the 6 months period will be mailed this spring and should be paid by May1, 1974. Thereafter, billing will be on a fiscal year basis covering the period July1 thru June 30, payable in two parts, November 1 and May 1.

I feel that our conscientious taxpayers should be commended. As Tax Collector, I am very grateful and proud of the collection records. Approximately 4,000 individual pieces of property were assessed and billed in 1972 and it was necessary to record and take for the Town on Tax Title only 5 pieces for unpaid taxes.

As we enter into the new fiscal year and the semi-annual payment of Real Estate Taxes, it may be that the Banks will release to the individual many of the Tax escrow accounts, leaving the responsibility of monthly budgeting entirely up to the property owner. I do not forsee smooth operation of this new system, but it is a State Law and we must learn to live with it and make it work.

WARNING! Attend Town Meeting. Consider carefully and vote wisely. The Tax Rate is based on the money <u>you</u> vote to spend.

My sincere thanks to all for the help and consideration given this department throughout the year.

Report of the Police Department

To the Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of the Town of Hanover:

I hereby submit the following report of the Police Department from January 1, 1973 to December 31, 1973.

We have had a marked increase in Motor Vehicle Accidents over the past 12 months. Washington Street (Rte. 53) has increased in Traffic usage. Consequently all of our secondary roads are experiencing heavier traffic. We have considerable new business facilities in the Town area and have many out of town people coming in to visit them.

The Mall area located on the North section of Washington Street is heavily congested and traffic control in this area is most difficult. The Massachusetts Department of Public Works has promised action on installing traffic control signals in this location which should help to some degree.

Another serious problem that has arisen is the increase in Breaking, Entering and Larceny of Business Establishments and private homes. We would like to request of anyone seeing anything unusual happening in your home area to report it to us at once.

Drugs are still a problem within the Town and they are much on the scene. We have had some success the past year on solving certain cases which have been brought to our attention.

I would like to thank Fire Chief Lawrence E. Slaney and all members of the Hanover Fire Department for their excellent assistance in responding with their equipment to many serious accidents we have had in the past year. Professional in their handling of these situations upon their arrival and very much appreciated by this Department.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the people of Hanover, The Board of Selectmen, Neighboring Police Departments, State and County Officers and the Members of the Hanover Police Force for their assistance and cooperation during the past year.

Report of The Board of Health

To the Voters of Hanover;

We respectfully submit our report for the year 1973:

Our Board meets every Monday evening at 7:30 P.M. with the exception of holidays and special meetings may be held on the following Wednesday if the Board deems it necessary and notices are properly posted.

The Transfer Station Facility was officially opened on July 28, 1973 and dedicated on November 20, 1973. To date the station has been running very smoothly and the Board is very pleased with the new operation. At present we are disposing of approximately 300 tons of rubbish per month. The paper and cardboard recycling facilities are producing approximately 18 tons per month, which is returning revenue to the Town and reducing the overall cost of rubbish disposal. It is hoped the citizens will cooperate with the employees at the facility, by disposing of all their paper and cardboard in the recycling units. Our goal for 1974 is 100% cooperation. The Board feels that we now have an attractive and efficient operation at our facility and anticipate it will serve the community for many years to come.

Restaurant inspections are being conducted every ninety days or more frequently if conditions warrant.

Several clinics were held during 1973 including a Glaucoma Detection Clinic, Immunization of school and preschool children, A flu Vaccine Clinic for town employees and Golden Agers and two Rabies Vaccine Clinic for dogs. Mantoux test Clinics were held every month for Tuberculosis as it is a requirement that all Food Establishment personnel be tested every two years. Food Handler's Certificates were issued and the Clinics will continue in 1974. In 1973 continued aerial sprayings were accomplished during the spring and summer months for mosquito control. A minimum number of complaints were received and we feel the program is very beneficial to the Town.

Mr. Edward R. Hammond, Jr. served on the Visiting Nurse Association Advisory Committee. Mr. Frederick L. Briggs served as a member of the Town Drainage Committee.

65 Disposal Works Construction Permits were approved for 1973. Due to the low water table the Board imposed a testing ban from June 29, 1973 to September 17, 1973. It is anticipated that the Board shall continue to impose testing bans should the water table fall below its normal level.

The Board would like to thank all Town Officials and citizens for their cooperation in 1973 and look forward to their continued support in 1974.

Report of the Hanover Visiting Nurse Association, Incorporated

To the Board of Selectmen and The Citizens of Hanover:

Regular monthly meetings of the Board are held on the second Tuesday of the month. Meetings open to the public are held in January and April.

During the year, Board members assisted the nurse at Well-Child Conferences, Pre-school Child Conferences, and the Health Maintenance Conferences for the elderly.

In April, all pre-school children were screened for Amblyopia in conjunction with the pre-school registration done by the School Department.

Camperships were awarded to nine children in the summer. A total of \$1,150. was given in scholarships to Hanover residents. A baby-sitting course was held for Junior High students. Fifty-four completed the course and were awarded certificatates.

The Association provides a well stocked loan equipment room with all sick room necessities which are available to any Hanover resident. Board members assisted at the Glaucoma Clinic and Mantoux testing clinic sponsored by the Board of Health. A Hard of Hearing Clinic was held for the first time, at which one-hundred and eighty adults were tested.

We wish to thank the Selectmen, Water Department, and the Conservation Commission for aiding the Association in providing a building to store the loan equipment.

Report of Visiting Nurse

To the Selectmen, The Hanover Visiting Nurse Association, and the Citizens of Hanover:

This agency is certified as a Home Health Agency, and offers nursing (Bedside), Physical Therapy, Speech Therapy, Occupational Therapy, medical Social Service, Counselling, Home Health Aides and Health Supervision to residents of Hanover.

Payment for these services are most times paid for by medical health insurance, medicare, medicaid or various other agencies.

A total of 1,897 visits were made of which 728 nursing, 32 Physical Therapy, 13 Home Health Aide, 975 Health Supervision, 149 unclassified.

Nineteen Well Child Conferences were held this year. 355 children attended and received physical and immunizations. Dr. Mary Butterworth is in attendance at these conferences.

Twelve Senior Citizens Health maintenance programs were held with 213 attending. Speakers in the health field were present at a number of conferences. An article "Senior Citizens Health Maintenance" written by Mrs. Avery T. Andrew, R.N., M.S. and Edna G. Anderson, R.N. was published in "Nursing Outlook" a national public health magazine.

Eighty-four courtesy calls to new babies were made and 24 cards were sent to families when the birth was a repeat.

The nurses have attended in-service programs and lectures throughout the year to keep up with the latest trends in Public Health Nursing.

The Nurses' office is at the Town Hall. Telephone hours are 8:30 - 9:00 a.m. and 1:00 - 1:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Report of the Board of Appeals

To the Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Hanover.

The Zoning Board of Appeals held scheduled meetings, including public hearings at the Town Hall on the second and fourth Tuesday of each month, excluding holidays, involving 29 cases during 1973.

Twenty-two public hearings were held on applications requiring approval, petition of appeal from decisions of administrative officials, and petitions for variances, all applicable to the Zoning By-Law. Eighteen decisions were filed at the office of the Town Clerk as required by statute law, and one decision, Case No. 73-29 will be filed in January, 1974. One petition, Case No. 73-19, and two applications, Case No. 73-21, and 22 were withdrawn without prejudice before a decision was made. Seven other applications and/or petitions were returned to the originator because of not following procedure.

The Mass. Supreme Judicial Court made its decision, March 22, 1973 in SJC No. 7754, Board of Appeals of Hanover vs Housing Appeal Committee, et al, (Mass. Dept. of Community Affairs), upholding a decision made by the Housing Appeal Committee, July 13, 1971 in Country Village Corporation, Appellant vs Board of Appeals, Town of Hanover, Appellees. (Reference, Hanover Board of Appeals Case No. 70-5). Instructions were given to the Building Inspector in March, 1973 to issue a Comprehensive Building Permit to Country Village Corporation to construct (11) cluster type structures of (8)living units each, of low and moderate income housing at 85 Oakland Avenue.

The Lanning Corporation appealed the decision of Case No. 73-6 to the Superior Court, S.S No. E-4456 which was heard and a decree entered May 29, 1973, dismissing the Bill of Complaint, and upholding the decision of the Building Inspector and subsequent ruling of the Board of Appeals.

William A. Thompson, after many years of faithful service to the Board of Appeals as an Associate member resigned and Donald F. Grushey was appointed to this vacancy by the Board of Selectmen.

We wish to thank all officials and Boards of this Town for their assistance given to us during this year.

Starting in March, Mr. O'Donnell of the School Department held a Language Lab. class each Thursday in the Phillip's room, while downstairs a story hour was held for the children of the attending adults.

In May the Hanover Newcomer's Club gave the library \$147.00 for books and added \$40.00 more in July.

The Hanover Junior Women's Club gave the library five juvenile books and a \$50.00 donation toward the Air Conditioning Fund.

Thirty-one books were purchased in December from the funds in memory of M. Louise Middleton. These were all children's books.

Story hours for four year olds are held Wednesdays and Fridays, 1:30 to 2:30 in the afternoon. They are under the excellent supervision of Mrs. Edmund Grundy. Due to lack of staff, we were unfortunately not able to take all the children who registered.

In the past year over one thousand books were added to the adult collection and six hundred to the children's room. Our circulation also increased by 10,000 this past year, the total figure being 81,720. This strains our small staff considerably, but we welcome you all and will try to maintain the quality of service you have been accustomed to.

Books are for sale in the lobby of the library and the money raised goes into our Air Conditioning Fund. We have \$450.00 at present. These books are gifts and we would appreciate more, both paperback and hard back.

There were also several books donated to the library this year in memory of deceased friends or relatives.

Report of the Building Inspector

To the Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Hanover:

On January 1st, 1973 this office established the beginning of a Building Department in the Town of Hanover. This Department issues all Building, Wiring and Gas Permits under the supervision of the various Inspectors and also coordinates all final inspections of the Building Inspector, Wiring Inspector, Gas Inspector, Plumbing Inspector and the Board of Health so as to issue proper Occupancy Permits.

In the year 1973 the amount of new construction increased considerably. This was due to the fact that the water ban ceased and the business construction more than doubled that of 1972.

Board of Selectmen;

Submitted herewith is the first Annual Report of the Board of Public Works.

The past year has seen many changes brought on by the advent of a Department of Public Works which consolidated the old Departments of Water, Highway, Tree and Cemetery. Increased efficiency and organization has, we believe, resulted in better service to the people of the Town of Hanover within our budgetary limitations.

We look forward to a successful continuance of our reorganization program during the coming year with a new Superintendent of Public Works taking over on February 1. After considerable time and many interviews, the Board selected Mr. Allen W. Hanson of Westford, Massachusetts, an engineer and former corporate executive, as the first Superintendent of the Department of Public Works. The Superintendent, together with the assistance of our Water Division Supervisor, Mr. Philip Beal, and our Highway Supervisor, Mr. Herbert Simmons, will give our Department leadership and supervision of the highest quality.

The following general observations reflect some of the accomplishments of the department in the past year.

WATER DIVISION:

Normal rainfall during the past year maintained our ground water supply which, together with the cooperation of the townspeople in conserving water, enabled us to go through a full year without any restriction on use. Our water main cleaning program this year included completing the cleaning of the ten inch main through the Hanover four corners area and from Pond Street to Union Street and North on Main Street to Mann's corner.

Only thirty of 2600 residences remained unmetered as of the 30th of September, and installation of meters in those houses will be completed by the end of January. The meters were read during the last week in September, and the first meter billing will be in January. Cycle billing will take place in the first and second quarters of 1974.

Our exploration program has been held in abeyance due to the extremely high water levels in the areas to be explored. A high water level impairs the efficiency and accuracy of seismic surveying. This program will be continued as location and identification of water resources is a most important program.

The new water filtration plant is nearly complete. We have been delayed in completion by equipment deliveries, and finally all equipment is installed and final adjustments are being made. It is anticipated that the plant will be in operation in supplying water to the town before the Spring seasonal demand arrives.

HIGHWAY DIVISION:

A mild winter in the 1972-73 season permitted continuation of outside work throughout most of the winter. Plowing was only necessary for three storms, plus some sanding at other times. The clean-up of the roadsides in the Spring, clearing away litter and accumulated sand, now takes as much as six to eight weeks which time must be reduced by the purchase of more mechanized equipment. Highway maintenance was performed on Main, King, Winter, North Whiting, Old Hanover, Pine and Union Streets and Pat Road. Roadways were also maintained and improved within the Cemetery and leading to water supply areas. The construction of Cedar Street is complete except for the sidewalks which will be completed within the next year.

The new reconstruction of Plain Street is complete except for one portion which needs a finish top of asphalt. The reconstruction of Spring Street was started and is proceeding in sections within budget limitations.

TREE DIVISION:

The Tree Division performed usual cleaning-up after storms, roadside trimming and spraying for tent caterpillar, birch leaf minor, elm leaf beetle, Japanese Beetle, gypsy moth and other insects. A number of trees which were diseased have been removed and new trees set out in an attempt to replace those that are removed.

There is an impending danger of the moth infestation with occasional clusters of eggs found within the town. This menace will have to be watched carefully, and the Tree Division together with assistance from the State will do everything possible to slow down and prevent this infestation.

The Tree Division has operated on an extremely small budget for years and is in great need of added personnel and equipment. Increases in their budget are needed to perform a better service in this area which is so necessary to beautification and conservation within the town. It is hoped that the taxpayers will appreciate the needs in this area and respond when increased budgets are requested.

CEMETERY DIVISION:

While progress is not usually attached to the operation of a cemetery, the townspeople should note that at long last an addition to the Hanover Center Cemetery has been largely completed. Due mainly to the personal supervision of Mr. Ames together with the able cemetery staff and the assistance of the Highway Division, a complete new section of the cemetery will be finished this year. Although it was probably unnoticed by most of the townspeople, the availability of lots was extremely low. The cost of labor and development of a new section will cause an increase in the cost of lots.

Increased Maintenance and care of the Hanover Center Cemetery and the Union Cemetery in Assinippi has improved the appearance of both.

The Board of Public Works has made an effort to keep its budget in line which will be extremely difficult due to inflationary costs of materials and the necessity of granting reasonable wage increases. The Board hopes that it can maintain a balance between the ever increasing needs of the town and its ability to pay for such services.

1973 Annual School Report

Accountability, assessment, austerity, goal setting and priorities are words that have new meaning in our country and to our school system this year. For the Hanover Schools this meant the publication of our three-year study called *Educational Objectives*. Every faculty member and many Hanover residents gave much personal time to this project — and the result is a chart by which the course of education in Hanover can be traced and measured. A philosophy of education may be inferred from the first level objectives, and an operational definition of a thirteen year Hanover education is presented through the combination of first and second level objectives. From these system-wide objectives or priorities are developed behavioral objectives describing, in measurable terms, attitudes and skills youngsters develop each day in one subject or another. These behavioral objectives are grouped together into courses and curricula. New curricula have been developed system-wide in mathematics and social studies and for grades 6-12 in English. With the expansion of these curricula, assessment and greater educational accountability will be possible.

Coupled with this long range educational plan has been a financial design which combines long range planning and a two-year austerity budget operating while the town converts from calendar to fiscal year programming. Extensive bidding, aggressive seeking of grants where useful, careful attention to maximize state reimbursements for education in Hanover, regional and multi-town sharing of resources, effective negotiations with three employee groups and bargain hunting for needed school materials have all contributed to more effective fiscal management.

To realize economy and yet provide the quality of activities to make the curricula effective, many things occur daily with the 3375 day students not to mention the 600 adults in the Extended Opportunities Programs and the 285 youngsters attending Summer School. Signs of this activity can be seen in a variety of accomplishments. Let us consider the mathematics and media programs as a reflection of basic learnings, and music, ecology and athletics as a few activities comprising the breadth of learnings.

Hanover's mathematics program is being changed by a complete revision of the curriculum accomplished by teams of teachers. One aspect of the program is a return to computational skills. In-service programs in mathematics techniques and the use of new materials are helping teachers bring the new curriculum to students. Mathematics labs in both High and Junior High Schools staffed by teachers volunteering free time broaden and individualize math learnings for all students, even those with handicaps. Cross grading in one school, pilot programs in skills learning in another, and the achievement objectives for all students are contributing to better performance in mathematics. Library and audio-visual programs in the Hanover schools continue to expand services to students, teachers and town residents through the use of 125 volunteers and a professional staff of 10. Circulation of materials and in-school use of facilities has increased significantly this year. Enlarging the space and services at the High School and the arrival of two dedicated staff members have aided both students and faculty. Book Fairs at each elementary school, a Book Club at Cedar School, a summer reading program and inservice training of staff and volunteers have strengthened services. A general aid grant and three special purpose grants completely funded by the federal government were obtained by the staff to supplement their programs.

Musical activity, both in class and as special activities, developed this year. Expanded staff and scheduling combined with parent and faculty support has produced such achievements as 300 students in school choruses, 150 in bands, instrumental music lessons grades 4-12, many concerts at schools, productions of student musicals and a student-faculty production of 'Oliver' at the Junior High. Marching bands and caroling groups performed and received high praise both in Hanover and surrounding towns.

Ecology and conservation activities also signal the breadth of the school program. A week-long camping experience at the Plymouth State Park for all sixth graders climaxed a full spring of activities at the Junior High. All pupils at the Center School participated in an ecology project and the school received the Presidential Citation. John Shortall from Center School received a plaque from the Lieutenant Governor as a regional winner in an art contest in ecology. The Sylvester School continued its program of planting bulbs and trees to beautify this town land. A High School science student received a citation as outstanding girl conservationist from the Massachusetts Federation of Women's Clubs.

Athletics and physical education again saw Hanover provide programs for record numbers of students and earn more than its share of honors interscholastically. Coeducational activities became part of the High School physical education program. A girls' gym club of 55 was founded at the Junior High and they produced the first gymnastics demonstration. Sylvester undertook the President's Physical Fitness Program. Elementary schools field days culminated year-long programs. A 48-activity intermural program at the Junior High found 70 per cent of the students participating. The High School fields seven interscholastic teams fall and spring; one-third of student body participates. Ice hockey and soccer, new interscholastic sports, had teams which won regional recognition. High School girls' basketball and softball teams won their league championships, the boys' baseball team won the South Shore League and the football team won both the League title and Division IV State Championship. Some scattered events might further outline the schools' development within limited budgets this year:

- Mini-kindergarten led by qualified volunteers supervised by professional staff, held a program for young children in this transition year.
- Health education programs become integrated into the regular curricula helped by a teacher specialist.
- Work-Study Program at the High School increased from 19 to 40 students with 100 per cent of the students employed.
- The Hanover Teachers' Association sponsored the Ride-A-Bike Program realizing \$3,140 for Massachusetts Association for Retarded Citizens. Mrs. Audrey Gage, Cedar School, won first prize statewide, riding 101 miles to earn \$532.
- The U.S.S.R. was visited by 19 students; three young people from Sweden attended Hanover High.
- Safety education activities, aided by the Safety Officer, show youngsters safe ways to live and play.
- A mobile room was obtained second-hand to implement vocational education plans at the High School.
- Individualized reading instruction expands at all levels; better total learning results from programs of team teaching and integrated day at Cedar School.
- High School Industrial Arts students and teachers construct bus shelters, build shelving at Sylvester School for new experiences and money saving.
- Qualified volunteers supervised by professionals enrich programs for youngsters with special needs, help with Open House activities at the schools, assist teachers with drill exercises and help in parent/child reading program at Cedar School.
- High School Student Council participates in state activities; one member elected to state office.
- Four graduates receive Commendation from National Merit Program; \$47,500 earned in a variety of grants and scholarships, 149 graduate.
- The Hammond Fund Scholarships are established to aid graduates in higher education.

Despite financial austerity the Hanover Schools have moved ahead this year in many areas and have tried to be accountable to the wishes of the community. Thanks to the generous support of many parents and citizens quality education is available to the young residents and they enthusiastically respond by realizing their full potential in many areas.

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Report of the South Shore Regional School District Committeeman — 1973

Last year's report described a two phase plan for an expansion of facilities. The first phase was to lease a relocatable building to care for the immediate needs with the permanent building to be built as a second phase. This first phase proved to be impossible to execute since we found only one building suitable and could find no one to lease it.

The second phase, the permanent building, is posing some real problems. These center around the fact that there are so many vocational schools being built that the labor market is over-supplied so that graduates in some trades can not find employment. This difficulty was real last year when we found it difficult to place the graduates in electronic technicians. This year, the crunch is coming in carpenters and electricians. Some of the surrounding schools are advising their applicants not to choose either of these two trades. It is the Committee's opinion that to graduate a boy with no forseeable opportunity for employment is a waste of the taxpayers money and a hoax on the graduate. We therefore find it necessary to be very sure that we do not fall into this trap in our expansion plans. If this situation continues, we may find it necessary to discontinue some offerings. In view of the uncertain economic picture for the next 10 years or more, it may well be that this is no time to expand, even though the state pays the same percentage of the interest on the bond issue as it does on the construction costs, the money must come eventually from the taxpayers.

Another annoying fact is that the state has paid over the past two years, only about 60% of the monies due us; the other forty percent must be assessed against the towns.

The two courses offered to students with qualifications below those which are required for admission to our regular courses, have proven to be very successful. This year we are considering again the possibility of expanding these offerings with the students receiving his academic work in the local high school and his vocational work in the South Shore Vocational School.

Although this approach did not succeed several years ago when we tried it, we now believe that it may succeed under a different set of conditions. Whether the graduates from this program will find employment, we can not forsee, but we believe it is worthy of trying, especially since the member towns wish to have us make some effort to care for these students. Let us hope that this will be a valuable service to the youths of the area.

The problems facing a school committee are now quite formidable compared to those of even three or four years ago and which it finds impossible to solve without the employment of legal council which is costly to the taxpayers. The greatest of these is, of course, the collective bargaining.

Let us hope that next year I may be able to report on more pleasant matters than this one.

South Shore Regional School District Interim Treasurer's Report

For the Period January 1, 1973 thru December 31, 1973

In accordance with Section XII of the South Shore Regional School District Agreement effective January 6, 1960, I submit herewith details of the January 1, 1973 thru December 31, 1973 financial transactions of the School District.

Details are presented with respect to the January 1, 1973 to June 30, 1974 (18 months) estimated expenditures and their apportionment to member towns, actual cash receipts and cash disbursements for the period January 1, 1973 thru December 31, 1973 and balance sheet and statement of outstanding debt as of December 31, 1973.

Total operating expenditures for the period ending December 31, 1973 were \$755,254.31 which involved salaries and wages of \$573,819.92 and other expenses of \$181,434.39 details of which are shown in the cash expenditure schedule.

Capital Outlay for the period ending December 31, 1973 involving cost of new equipment was \$56,674.84.

On May 31, 1973, a total amount of \$6,572.65 involving wage increases for the period September 1, 1971 thru November 13, 1971 was paid to all employees of the School District and charged to Surplus Revenue in accordance with approved Massachusetts legislation. This resulted from a favorable decision by the Federal Office of Wage Stabilization Cost of Living Council under date of April 30, 1973, whereby approval was granted to pay wage increases for the above stated period, after an appeal by the South Shore Regional Vocational Teachers Federation had been previously denied by the Internal Revenue Service.

Various additional expenditures under self-explanatory titles were made as per details set forth in the expenditure schedule.

Unexpended Appropriation balances available for the remainder of the current fiscal period (18 months) dating from January 1, 1973 to June 30, 1974 are as follows: Operating Costs \$562,819.69; New Equipment \$54,698.79; and Expansion Planning Costs \$33,500.00; totalling \$651,018.48.

Interim Surplus Revenue was determined to be \$125,065.67 as of December 31, 1973 as follows:
