

We thank each of them for the services rendered to the Town of Hanover and express our best wishes for their future.

During 1979 the Board held regularly scheduled meetings each Monday evening, and the first and third Wednesday evenings of each month.

Special meetings were held frequently to address special problems and to negotiate contracts with the Municipal Unions. The Board called several interdepartmental meetings to co-ordinate the responses of the various boards and officers to the challenges before us.

Members of the Board appeared before Federal, State and County Boards, Commissions and Committees to represent the Town's best interest.

We would like to commend all Town Boards, Committees and Officers for their valiant attempts to keep budgets within the Tax Cap Limits and in the face of rising inflation and soaring energy costs.

One of the Selectmen's major concerns this year has been the local effects of the energy crisis. In the June gasoline shortage, the Board met with local service station owners who co-operated in a plan to provide gasoline to residents on a staggered hour basis. In September, Mr. Richard Simmons, Health Agent, was appointed energy co-ordinator for the Town, and will in this capacity administer the program for fuel assistance.

The Town Government Study Committee's recommendations and designs for new records for the use of the Town gasoline pumps were put into effect to encourage gasoline conservation and improve the record keeping process.

The Selectmen are pleased that, finally, after many years efforts on the part of the Housing Authority, two different elderly housing complexes have been funded by the Federal Government. We look forward to the breaking of ground for each of these projects during the coming year.

The Town has been notified that the Stetson House has been named to the National Register of Historic Places. This makes the house eligible for various federal and state grant programs.

We have examined the financial statements of the various funds and account groups of the Town of Hanover for the year ended June 30, 1979 listed in the foregoing table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

The financial statements of the Town have been prepared on the basis of accounting and reporting practices prescribed or permitted by the Bureau of Accounts of the Department of Revenue, Commonwealth of Massachusetts, which practices differ, in some respects, from generally accepted accounting principles as set forth in pronouncements of the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants and the National Committee on Governmental Accounting. The more significant differences result from the reporting of revenue and expenditures on a modified cash basis instead of on the modified accrual basis, the reporting of special fund transactions within the general fund instead of in separate funds, pension cost not being funded in accordance with the minimum injurements of Opinion No. 8 of the Accounting Principles Board of the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, and the Town not maintaining a record of its general fixed assets. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statements are not intended to present financial position or results of operations in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, the financial statements listed in the aforementioned table of contents present fairly at June 30, 1979 and for the year then ended the information contained therein in conformity with accounting and reporting practices prescribed or permitted by the Bureau of Accounts of the Department of Revenue, Commonwealth of Massachusetts (the Department), applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

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The accompanying supplemental information and the column on the accompanying combined financial statement captioned "Total (memorandum only)" are not necessary for a fair presentation of the financial statements in conformity with accounting and reporting practices prescribed or permitted by the Department, but are presented as additional analytical data. The supplementary information has been subjected to the tests and other auditing procedures applied in the examination of the financial statements listed in the foregoing table of contents, and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects, on the basis stated above, in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

We have examined the financial statements of the various funds and account groups of the Town of Hanover for the year ended June 30, 1979 and have issued our report thereon dated October 9, 1979. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

In connection with our examination, we also (1) performed tests of compliance with the Revenue Sharing and Antirecession Fiscal Assistance Acts and regulations as required by Sections II.C.3. and III.C.3. of the Audit Guide and Standards for Revenue Sharing and Antirecession Fiscal Assistance Fund Recipients (Quide) issued by the Office of Revenue Sharing, U.S. Department of the Treasury, and (2) compared the data on Report of Financial Transactions Schedule A, Department of Revenue, Commonwealth of Massachusetts with the audited records of the Town of Hanover as required by Section II.C.3. of the "Quide." Our findings are as follows:

The Town has not complied with the regulation which requires that Antirecession Fiscal Assistance Entitlements be appropriated within six months after the day of receipt. An entitlement of \$3,571 received on July 10, 1978 plus interest earned from the investment of funds had not been appropriated as of June 30, 1979.

Other than the above, we noted no instance of noncompliance with the regulations and no material differences between the data on Schedule A, referred to above, and the records of the Town of Hanover for the year ended June 30, 1979.

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NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 1979

1. Summary of significant accounting policies:

The accompanying financial statements reflect compliance with the accounting practices prescribed by the Uniform Municipal Accounting System (Uniform System) promulgated by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts Department of Revenue. The significant accounting policies required by the Uniform System and followed by the Town are presented below. Accounting requirements of the Uniform System vary in some respects from accounting practices prescribed by generally accepted accounting principles. A summary of the significant differences is presented in Note 2.

(a) Fund accounting:

Financial transactions of the Town are recorded in the following accounts:

General accounts - An accounting for all transactions not properly accounted for in other prescribed accounts.

Revenue sharing and antirecession accounts - An accounting for revenue sharing and antirecession fiscal assistance entitlements received by the Town.

Trust accounts - An accounting for trust funds received and accepted by vote of the Town.

Debt accounts - An accounting for long-term debt outstanding to be repaid in future years.

(b) Revenue recognition:

Real estate and personal property tax levies are recorded as revenue in amounts equal to the total taxes levied. There are no provisions made for possible uncollectible taxes; however, a reserve is established for anticipated abatements. At the time tax titles are taken, the general fund balance is reduced by the amount of the uncollected taxes. Revenues from redemption of tax titles are credited to the general fund balance.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED)

YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 1979

Summary of significant accounting policies: (continued)

State and federal grant proceeds, except for amounts received under the Revenue Sharing and Antirecession programs, are recorded in a balance sheet reserve account as received in cash. Authorized expenditures under terms of the grants are charged to the reserve account.

Certain receipts, such as cemetery and library funds, are recorded in balance sheet reserve accounts as received in cash. As expenditures payable from such receipts are appropriated, amounts are transferred from the reserve account to the applicable appropriation account.

Proceeds of long-term debt issues are recorded as non-revenue appropriations.

Accounts receivable balances, except for property taxes receivable, are fully offset by a reserve entitled revenue reserved until collected.

(c) Expenditures and appropriation balances:

Expenditures are recorded on the basis of cash disbursements. Cash disbursements made during the fifteen days immediately following the close of each fiscal year which are related to the prior year are recorded as if paid on or before the end of the year.

Appropriation balances are carried forward for revenue appropriations (appropriations for ordinary current expenses) to permit liquidation of applicable outstanding bills and encumbrances in the succeeding fiscal year. Non-revenue appropriations are carried forward until completion of the authorized project.

(d). Recoverable adjustments:

Unprovided for or overdrawn accounts and overestimates reflect amounts of funds which are to be raised (or will be refunded) in the succeeding year through the general property tax levies or a reduction in free cash. Such amounts result from:

Underestimates (overestimates) of state and county assessments resulting from actual expenditures in excess of (which are less than) the amounts appropriated and raised in the current year's general property tax levies.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED)

YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 1979

- 1. Summary of significant accounting policies: (Continued)
 - (e) Retirement system:

Substantially all employees of the Town of Hanover are covered under and contribute to the Plymouth County Retirement System. The Town does not administer the plan to which it contributed.

(f) Inventories:

Inventories of supplies are recorded as expenditures when purchased.

(q) Trust funds:

The trust funds have been established for the purpose of accounting for money and property received and held by the Town of Hanover as trustee, custodian or agent. Interest earned is recorded on the cash basis.

(h) Long-term debt:

All long-term debt is recorded in the general long-term debt group of accounts. Debt service is funded through the general fund.

2. Generally accepted accounting principles:

The significant differences between the accounting practices prescribed by the Uniform System and the requirements of generally accepted accounting principles are set forth below. Since the financial statements of the Town have not been prepared in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles, it is not practical to quantity the effects of differences resulting from compliance with the Uniform System.

(a) Fund accounting:

Generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) require the segregation and reporting of all financial transactions in eight types of funds and two groups of accounts. Financial transactions for the following types of activities are presently accounted for in the Town's general fund.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED)

YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 1979

Generally accepted accounting principles: (Continued)

State and federal grant proceeds (except for revenue sharing and antirecession entitlements) and other revenues restricted as to use by law or other grantor imposed conditions - under GAAP, such revenues would be accounted for in special revenue funds.

Costs and financing proceeds for capital improvement projects - under GAAP, capital improvement projects financed by proceeds of long-term debt issues would be accounted for in capital project funds.

Under GAAP, the Town would also be required to establish a general fixed asset group of accounts to provide historical cost information for property, plant and equipment owned. Such information is not required by the Uniform System.

(b) Revenue recognition:

GAAP requires the use of the modified accrual basis of accounting in the general fund and special revenue funds and the use of the accrual basis of accounting in all other funds.

(c) Retirement system:

Under GAAP, annual pension expense is a measure of the future retirement benefits earned by employees during an accounting period. Pursuant to provisions of the Massachusetts General Laws, the Town provides its share of pension costs on a payas-you-go basis by annually contributing (and providing as pension expense) an amount determined by the State Division of Insurance. The amount determined is an estimate of pensions actually payable during the accounting period.

Investments:

Investments in certificates of deposit reflected in the accompanying combined financial statements are stated at cost which is market.

Investments reflected in the accompanying combined financial statements of the trust funds are stated at cost. Market value is \$92,615 at June 30, 1979.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED)

4. Legal debt limit:

Legislative authority, as outlined in Chapter 44 of the General Laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, permits the issuance of bonds up to 5% of the equalized valuation, plus an additional amount which would bring the total up to but less then 10% with the approval of the Emergency Finance Board. At June 30, 1979, the total statutory debt limit of the Town was \$18,523,770 against which \$3,035,000 of debt was outstanding.

5. Plymouth County Retirement System:

The Town retirement system is administered by the Plymouth County Retirement Board. The Town's obligation for the year ended June 30, 1979 was \$159,200. Employee contributions totaled \$102,056. No actuarial evaluations have been made to determine the amount of the unfunded pension cost at June 30, 1979.

6. Budgeted revenues and appropriations, fiscal 1980:

At the annual Town meeting held on May 7, 1979, the Town voted the following:

7. Contingent liabilities:

There are a number of lawsuits presently pending against the Town or its employees. While the outcome of these lawsuits is not determinable, in the opinion of the Board of Selectmen, recovery of claims against the Town or indemnification of Town employees for judgments against them, if any, would not have a material effect on the financial condition of the Town.

The Special Town Meeting at Hanover High School was called to order by George H. Lewald, Moderator at 7:55 P.M., Monday, March 5, 1979 with 754 voters present.

The Town Clerk reported that the Warrant had been served and a return made as required by the Town By-Laws.

Mr. George H. Lewald, the Moderator outlined the procedure to be followed at the meeting in accordance with the Town By-Laws. He introduced the Advisory Board and the Town Clerk.

ARTICLE 1

To hear the report of Committees empowered to report at a Special Town Meeting, and act thereon, or take any other action relative thereto.

Mr. Benjamin Kruser, Chairman of the Hanover High School Building and Grounds Renovation Committee submitted two brochures as Reports of Progress by the Committee. These brochures were passed out to voters as they entered the Town Meeting Room and a copy of each brochure is on file in the Town Clerks Office.

VOTED: That the Town so do.

ARTICLE 2

To receive such accounts as may be presented against the Town, and act thereon, or take any other action relative thereto.

Moved that the Town appropriate the sum of \$28.00 from available funds for Selectmen expense.

To see if the Town will vote to continue the High School Building and Grounds Renovation Committee, as established by Article 14 of the Special Town Meeting of November 14, 1977, for the purpose of obtaining final plans, specifications and firm bids for the renovation, remodeling, expansion and equipping of the present High School; which Committee shall be empowered to report at any Annual or Special Town Meeting and to appropriate from available funds the sum of \$100,000.00 for this purpose, or take any other action relative thereto.

We move that the Committee be retained to continue its work but the sum of \$100,000.00 for the purpose of obtaining final plans, specifications and firm bids for the renovation, remodeling, expansion and equipping of the present High School be passed over.

Mr. Charles Fuller, Chairman of the Advisory Committee explained the reasoning for their motion.

A motion that the sum of \$100,000.00 for the purpose of obtaining final plans, specifications and firm bids for the renovation, remodeling, expansion and equipping of the present High School be passed over.

A motion that the High School Building and Grounds Renovation Committee be retained to continue its work was defeated.

ARTICLE 4

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 from the Surplus Water Revenue Account to the DPW Administration Clerical Salaries Account to cover water collection salaries for the balance for FY 79.

REPORT OF THE TOWN GOVERNMENT STUDY COMMITTEE

To the citizens of the Town of Hanover:

Since the May 1978 Town Meeting, the Hanover Town Government Study Committee has continued in its efforts of studying the efficiency and operation of the various town government functions and units. The vast majority of this Committee's time during this period was expended on several areas of study that resulted in recommendations formally submitted to the Board of Selectmen with copies to the Advisory Committee and the Moderator. These areas included the Town's gasoline accountability, review of the Town's "rolling stock," in addition to a centralized vehicle maintenance facility study and one that is currently being studied, the Town's telephone system.

- Concerning gasoline accountability, a study was performed on the record keeping and control of gasoline which culminated in a report to the Board of Selectmen with recommendations on November 14, 1978.
 - This report and recommendations were reviewed with the Board of Selectmen on April 18, 1979. They took it under advisement and a reply will be forthcoming.
- II. A study was also concluded on an old outstanding study that commenced in 1977 of motorized equipment or "rolling stock." A report with recommendations was submitted to the Board of Selectmen on January 24, 1979.
 - This report and recommendations were also reviewed with the Board of Selectmen on April 18th and a reply to this report was also promised.
- III. As an integral part of the "rolling stock" study our Committee was rerequested to determine the feasibility of a centralized vehicle maintenance facility possibly using the existing Department of Public Works (D.P.W.) facility. The study determined that this action would not be feasible or

cost justified at the current time and the D.P.W. was currently cooperating with other Town Departments in emergency and as available maintenance functions.

This brief study did not result in any formal report but was reported informally back to the D.P.W. and Board of Selectmen.

- IV. Another area of work concerned a request from the Citizens Advisory Committee to the School Committee. We were requested and performed a certification function on specific selected figures, statistics and data which will result in inclusions in their findings on the reorganization of grades within the schools and the question of closing the Salmond School. This process was completed and the information returned to that Committee for the completion of their study in April and presentation to the School Committee on April 23, 1979.
- V. The most recent area of study is the Town's telephone systems that is currently ongoing and expected to be complete within the next several months. This is the first town-wide telephone study undertaken.

Concerning members of this Committee, it was indeed with great regret that we received the resignations of both Francis Mitchell and Richard Cooke, Jr. Two new members were appointed by the Town Moderator in November and we welcomed James F. Morrissy, Jr. and Chester K. Tom to our Committee.

In conclusion, it has indeed been a busy year for our Committee. The Hanover Town Government Committee continues its dedication to improving town government for the Town of Hanover and to this end will continue to study areas of potential savings and improvement to Town government. One key area was presented to the Town on the 1978 Warrant and was narrowly defeated. This was a sorely needed administrative position to support the Board of Selectmen in day-to-day affairs of the Town.

This Committee continues to believe in the need for this position.

We would like the opportunity to thank the administrators and employees of the various Town departments/functions/committees that we interfaced with in the past year and look forward to their continued cooperation in our future endeavors. This report is submitted as an ongoing report of progress of the Hanover Town Government Study Committee.

INTERIM REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD ON THE EMERGENCY ZONE DISTRICT

The 1978 Annual Town Meeting enacted an Emergency Zone District "to promote and provide for an orderly opportunity for the Town... to initiate and/or continue studies of any and all present and potential problems" in a highly critical area of Hanover. This area contains our main source of water supply as well as our

major commercial district. Not only were we concerned with the protection of our water supply and distribution system. The act also directed us to examine the impact of traffic congestion and density development in the affected area on the health safety and welfare of the residents of Hanover.

During the first half of this two year study period, the Planning Board has reviewed all available data, has met with technical and legal advisers from state and regional planning agencies, and other town departments. We are presenting our interim findings for your review.

The hydrological study prepared by Interdisciplinary Environmental Planning (IEP) for the Hanover Conservation Commission has delineated the water supply and recharge areas for the Third Herring Brook and Iron Mine Brook, the two watershed systems contributing to the Hanover wells. These watersheds have been further divided into eight sub-areas according to their function, and ranked according to their priority and sensitivity. The most critical of these, the well sites and draw down areas, were recommended for acquisition by the Town. This could be accomplished by negotiated purchase or by the sale or transfer of development rights. Regrettably, some of this area has already been built upon. It is incumbent on the Planning Board to develop sufficiently stringent regulations to insure that no additional damage results.

Also of major significance is the underground acquifer and its recharge area. This can be protected by the institution of a Groundwater Protection District. Basically, this would be an overlay district which would superimpose on the underlying district (residential, commercial, or industrial) certain restrictions and/or review procedures which would avert potential adverse affects on groundwater resources. Examples might include: additional green strip and buffer areas; self contained sewage treatment facilities; no change in runoff or infiltration rates; no added pollution; the prohibition of certain uses; and a program of periodic inspection to insure continued performance.

IEP states that the groundwater system in the Hanover watershed areas are already stressed in terms of water quality. Consequently, any further loss of recharge will serve to decrease groundwater dilution and thereby accelerate the current decline in water quality. For this reason and for the previously stated concern over water distribution, traffic congestion and density, it is the consensus of the Planning Board that the allowable density and lot coverage should be reduced, and that the Site Plan Review requirements tightened in the remainder of the watershed area.

During the coming year, the Planning Board will continue to review the alternative solutions and specific standards which should be proposed for action at the 1980 Annual Town Meeting. In addition, we will investigate the availability of federal and state funding for land acquisition, the use of conservation restrictions, and such novel techniques as site preparation review, transfer of development rights, and impact zoning.

REPORT OF THE BY-LAW STUDY COMMITTEE

To the Citizens of the Town of Hanover:

The Bylaw Study Committee was organized by Article 72 of the 1975 Annual Town Meeting.

During the early months of the 1978, the Committee worked on articles by request of the Hanover Selectmen concerning Hawkers, Peddlers, Salesmen and Transient Venders; Self-Service Gasoline Stations, and the revision of the General Provisions, Article I, Section II, Fines. Also updated was the article dealing with the Board of Appeals and an article concerning the Conservation Commission. These were presented to the Town as Articles 68, 69, 70, 71 and 72 of the 1978 Warrant. All were approved by the voters and subsequently ratified by the Office of the Attorney General.

During the later months of 1978, the Committee has met twice a month and worked on the updating and proof reading of the Hanover Town By-Laws. We have investigated the costs for printing, typing and collating and have given our authorization for publication of the bylaws. A final copy will be available for distribution at a later date.

Although the Committee has made considerable progress at this writing further clarification and updating remains to be done in 1979. We propose, therefore, that the Town accept this interim report as a Report of Progress of the Bylaw Study Committee.

STATUS REPORT ON GROUNDWATER PROTECTION STUDY

In February, 1978 the Board of Public Works of the town of Hanover voted unanimously to declare a two-year moratorium on all new construction in the Route 53 area. The purpose of the moratorium is to give the town time to develop a comprehensive plan for protection of existing and potential groundwater supplies. The moratorium area includes all of Hanover which lies easterly of a line 2,000 feet west of, and parallel to, Route 53. Dense commercial development along Route 53 and expanding population has made it necessary for the town to consider the impact of development of this area on its water supply sources.

In order to develop a comprehensive groundwater protection plan throughout the town, the Board of Public Works commissioned an engineering study by S E A Consultants, Inc. which will investigate potention dangers to the groundwater supply and make recommendations for its proper management and protection. The following is a summary of the progress of that study and description of work remaining to be completed.

An immediate problem was to define any contamination to our groundwater supply. Relatively speaking, groundwater moves very slowly. Once groundwater becomes polluted, the effect may take years to appear at a well site. Even after the source of pollution is removed, a well may continue to be unusable for a number of years. In the vicinity of Route 53 are several closed basins in which collected runoff infiltrates quickly into the groundwater thus creating the potential for groundwater pollution.

A rapidly increasing number of commercial establishments are located near Hanover's well fields and areas of rapid groundwater recharge. Each business has its own subsurface waste disposal system returning used water to the aquifer. Normal septic tank leachate from well-designed systems on suitable soils contains chlorides, nitrates, and other dissolved solids which move directly into the groundwater. The impact on Hanover's water quality could be significant because these dissolved contaminants are not readily removed by water filtration plants.

Runoff from highways contains metals, hydrocarbons and de-icing salt. Increasing levels of sodium and chlorides from de-icing salt are already apparent in Hanover's water supply.

A major gasoline spill in the Route 53 area could eliminate 80% of our water resources for a decade. These sensitive areas can be identified and appropriate action taken to eliminate any potential catastrophe.

The physical data that will be used to develop a clear picture of Hanover's groundwater system is being gathered from many sources. A report by Weston Geophysical Engineering Inc. completed in March 1978 summarizes Hanover's

seismic exploration. That information shows the depth of bedrock and groundwater and confirms that most of the productive formations are in the Route 53 area.

A study completed in April 1978 for the Conservation Commission by I E P used available hydrogeological data to develop maps showing groundwater flow and recharge areas. The report also discusses septic tank pollution and outlines the range of possible protective measures.

A technical review of moratorium documentation was prepared in September 1978 by Camp, Dresser & McKee, Inc. It states that a water shortage is not sufficient grounds for a moratorium in a specific area but that the moratorium can be justified on the basis of deteriorating water quality, as long as steps are being taken to find alternative means of protecting the water supply.

Based on work completed to date, the overall water supply system evaluation by SEA Consultants has concluded that the Pond Street well field can be more easily developed to produce additional water supply sources than any other location. This further increases the importance of protecting the groundwater in the Route 53 moratorium area. The report gives a long range plan for the improvement of the system as the town grows to prevent problems in distribution of available water to the year 2000.

In the groundwater protection study, existing hydrogeological and soils information has been gathered and mapped in an attempt to identify local areas of extremely rapid infiltration that collect runoff from larger areas. These areas are too small to appear on geological maps but are very important as points of water supply recharge and therefore must be protected from pollution. One such area on the south side of Mill Street receives much of the runoff from the parking lot of the Hanover Mall.

Field work has included locating existing businesses which have been shown on a map. Of particular interest are gas stations, auto repair shops, businesses that are likely to store or use chemicals, and also restaurants. Outlets of piped drainage systems were also located and plotted.

The moratorium is intended to control the impact of future development. Therefore, it is essential that the study locate those areas of vacant land that have the greatest development potential.

To meet drinking water limits pertaining to sodium, use of de-icing salt will have to be restricted to certain areas. Mill Street is now a no-salt zone. Other areas to be designated as no-salt zones will be identified as the groundwater maps are completed.

The main sources of nitrate are septic tank leachate and fertilizer. Nitrates are toxic to infants and the U.S. Public Health Service limit is 10 mg/1. However, nitrate concentrations in Hanover's wells seldom exceed 1.5 mg/1 and no upward trend is evident except in Broadway Well No. 1, which is located in an old cranberry bog and is downstream of 60 new homes.

The groundwater protection program will investigate monitoring the movement of nitrates from populated areas toward well fields and also state means to control subsurface waste disposal practices in these areas.

Once all existing data is plotted and additional field work is completed, the result will be a map of ground water flow and recharge areas drawn in sufficient detail to

pinpoint all sensitive locations, with documentation to justify specific building restrictions that may be necessary. Some types of sensitive areas which will be identified are:

- Areas requiring closed drainage to protect the water supply from spills and street runoff.
- 2. Streets requiring emergency response in the event of spills or restrictions on salting.
- 3. Recharge areas that must be maintained in a previous state or areas where groundwater levels must be altered.
- 4. Areas where the density of septic tanks must not be increased or where existing on-site disposal must be upgraded.

Maps of Hanover's groundwater flow and recharge areas that are presently available were compiled systematically from existing geological data. In the development of maps for groundwater protection, consideration will also be given to the natural and man-made topography, soils, and present and future land use patterns. Additional geological and stream flow data will be generated by installing more observation wells and by gauging flows in Third Herring Brook during pumping tests.

The final report will include the recommendation to institute at least one classification of overlay zoning; a groundwater protection zone. Within that zone, the hydrogeological picture will be drawn in sufficient detail to permit the town to respond knowledgeably to each development proposal. The groundwater protection study cannot answer all questions that will arise in connection with each development proposed, but it can help the town decide what additional engineering investigation will be required for each site.

In late summer, installation of observation wells and stream gaging equipment will be required to observe groundwater conditions during the lowest water level period. This will allow sufficient time for the draft of the groundwater protection report to be completed by December 1979. Then after approval of the report by the Board of Public Works the final report along with the water supply evaluation report, I E P's study and the seismic tests will be sent to Camp, Dresser and McKee, Inc. for an unbiased and professional opinion. Their independent evaluation will be ready for the 1980 Annual Town Meeting. At that time the Board of Public Works will propose to the Town a permanent groundwater protection zone, any other necessary action and will have already initiated a twenty year plan for continual improvement of the water distribution system.

REPORT OF THE GROWTH POLICY COMMITTEE

The Growth Policy Committee, originally established by Chapter 807 of the Acts of 1975, was formally reconstituted by the 1978 Annual Town Meeting. This Committee is seen as an open and comprehensive participatory process to establish policies for guiding growth at both the local and the state levels. Membership on the

Committee is representative of various Town Departments, interest groups within the community, and citizens at large.

The existence of such a Committee in Hanover is especially important in light of the state's "bottoms-up" policy implementation begun under the "Massachusetts Growth Policy Development Act." The special legislative committee investigating implementation of this Act is considering increased responsibility at the local level. It is conceivable that state legislation may be enacted which would enable communities such as ours to prepare a Local Growth Management Program, indicating the desired level and location of growth within the community over a specified number of years. In some cases, the community might even be able to specifically direct the maximum number of building permits to be issued each year based upon such a Local Growth Management Program and approved by Town Meeting. Such a management tool would be particularly helpful in implementing recommendation for our Emergency Zone District.

For the present, however, the Committee is concentrating on two major areas of concern. The first is to foster communication and cooperation among the town boards and the general citizenry. The make-up of the Committee in and of itself is a first step in this direction.

Zone District. Specifically, the Committee has examined local parking regulations in light of generally accepted standards and requirements for offstreet parking in the area. Also the Committee has researched and outlined the large commercial and industrial parcels still available for development along the Rte. 53 corridor. Finally, the Committee is currently preparing a questionnaire to be distributed to businesses along the Rte. 53 corridor. The purpose of the questionnaire is to solicit the input of those people to be directly impacted by any change in regulations while the proposals are still in the review stage. The committee will make its findings available to those Town boards and committees responsible for drafting the new regulations.

TOWN OF HANOVER BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS

This is the 7th annual report of the Board of Public Works. Each of us in our daily lives are forced to make changes to meet the economic situation and so is the Board of Public Works. The articles for the May 1980 Annual Town Meeting represent the very minimum of equipment replacement, capital maintenance and projects which must be accomplished in FY 81. During the past twelve months three (3) vehicles which could not be repaired at a reasonable cost have been taken out of service and replaced by doubling up use of other vehicles. Two replacements are recommended for high mileage vehicles this year but no additional vehicles are requested.

We wish to express our appreciation to Mr. Frank M. Wallen who served as a member and Chairman of this Board during his term of office and did not seek re-election this year. Mr. Wallen's years of experience and expertise in all areas of public works has benefited the Town.

The rebuilt electronic bookkeeping machine authorized by the November 1979 Special Town Meeting has been installed and the part time employment at the Treatment Plant for billing and collecting has been discontinued. The machine will also be used in an inventory system being established at the recommendation of the annual audit.

Three of the projects accomplished this year deserve mention:

The reconstruction of the King Street Bridge has been completed except for resurfacing and fencing to be done in the Spring. The entire project of spillway and bridge construction over the past three years was accomplished by our own employees at a cost of \$60,000 as compared to the 1960 estimate of \$150,000.

Several studies made of the High School Sewage System over the past eight years resulted in a recommendation for \$150,000 for a new system. At the suggestion of this Board a study was made by the DPW and resulted in a request for a \$30,000 appropriation for rehabilitation of the 20 year old system. The work was accomplished at a cost of \$18,000 by DPW personnel and equipment. Similarly the School Department received a quotation of over \$48,000 to apply a new surface to the High School parking lot. The Department of Public Works reviewed the circumstances and recommended a maintenance approach to extend by several years the existing parking lot surfaces at the High School, Junior High School and Cedar School. This work was carried out at a cost of \$3,000.

These are only three examples of the capabilities and expertise of our DPW personnel who are to be commended for their performance and proprietory attitude.

The initial Groundwater Protection Study will be completed in March, 1980. and along with the Water Supply Evaluation Study completed in May 1979 will be available to townspeople through the John Curtis Free Library. From this study and others a change in the zoning by-laws will be initiated by the Planning Board at the May 1980 Town Meeting to establish the proper zoning protection of the water supply and once accomplished the February 1, 1978 moratorium on construction in areas affecting our groundwater supply will be lifted. There are two articles in the May 1980 Town Meeting which are recommended by the previously mentioned reports. One is for plans and specifications for construcijon of sludge handling and lime feeding system at the Water Treatment Plant. The project will enable us to reclaim all of the water wasted in treatment (equivalent of one month's winter usage for the Town). reduce sludge handling costs, reduce the sodium content of the water (a known health hazard), and reduce the chemical cost of plant operation. The second article is for one-half of a two year continued testing and exploration program to develop data needed to protect and increase our water supplies. Our present growth rate indicates the determination of added supplies must be accomplished by 1982. None of the articles for water purposes will affect the tax rate as the water rate when established anticipated these necessary capital outlays.

Webster Street reconstruction has been completed to Manns Corner. Rebuilding of the intersection of Webster and Main will be done under the federally funded State Topics Program. Drainage and reconstruction of Webster Street from Main Street to Walnut Street will be accomplished through the basecoat in the spring and summer of 1980. We are requesting for the final section of Webster Street at the Annual Town Meeting to complete the five year reconstruction of this street. Hillside Drive and Hillside Circle were extensively repaired during 1979 and funds for resurfacing are being requested. The next street to be rebuilt is Winter Street. An article to provide funds for engineering for drainage is in the warrant for the Annual Town Meeting and assuming its approval work would start on the drainage in late 1981.

Our Cemetery operation has been very efficient. The oldest sections of piping for the water system were replaced last spring and leakage and maintenance labor of the water system was reduced substantially. Some adjustment in charges will be made in 1980 to keep up with increasing costs.

The new loader authorized at the May 1979 Town Meeting has been delivered equipped and is most satisfactory.

In the course of the fiscal year, 51 dead or diseased trees were removed and 20 more trimmed. Forty eight new trees were set out in the replanting program. Approximately 70 citizens requested aid in removing hornet and wasp nests that presented a potential danger to themselves and their families. Over the past two years the gypsy moth has been increasing and a 20% to 80% defoliation is anticipated in 1800 to 3000 acres of the Town which has been determined to be an area of severe infestation by egg count. Aerial spray which must be applied between May 1 and May 10 is the only recommended control and the Board has informed the Advisory Board of the need and cost. No funds are budgeted so there would have to be a transfer from the reserve fund or a special Town Meeting to provide funds. If aerial spray is not accomplished we will do as much roadside spraying as possible to control the outbreak.

In FY 80 our reimbursement under Chapter 497 was increased to \$89,915 and the following maintenance and resurfacing has been accomplished in 1979:

Sealcoat 3.38% Bituminous Concrete Resurfacing 3.13%

Each year the price of asphalt, scab patch, sealcoat, bituminous concrete resurfacing and petroleum related products increase and the appropriation which five years ago would provide for ten miles of resurfacing and maintenance covered only 8.3 miles in 1978, 6.5 miles 1979 and the increased reimbursement is not expected to exceed the 1979 mileage, the cost of resurfacing materials having increased more than the reimbursement within the 12 months.

Fortunately the winters of FY 79 and FY 80 through early March 1980 have been mild and snow and ice control costs have been low. Road salt has increased by more than 30% in that period. We have substantially reduced application rates of road salt alone and have used more sand-salt mix. This practice will be continued and in the areas where salt used on town roads will affect our water supply even less salt will be used.

During the year a second basketball court was constructed, and new fencing installed at the B. Everett Hall Playground (Center Hanover). A program of field rehabilitation has been started and the field behind the Curtis School will be rehabilitated. No use of that field will be allowed for a year starting August 1, 1980 and the School Department has agreed to allow the use of the Salmond School field as a substitute during that time.

The leak survey authorized by the May 1979 Town Meeting was completed in August, reducing the usage by approximately 70,000 gallons per day. It is obvious that carrying out a leak survey every two years is cost efficient. The screen in the

#1 Pond Street well, which has been in service since 1943, was erroded and consequently had to be replaced. The #1 Hanover Street well pump and controls were replaced and that well and pumping unit which has been in service since 1960 is now modernized. Funds are being requested in the May Annual Town Meeting to do the same refurbishing to the #2 Hanover Street well and pumping station which is also 20 years old. The #1 Broadway well pump failed in January 1980. An emergency was declared and repairs are in process.

We have thoroughly reviewed the charges for water. There will be a senior citizen discount put into effect in 1980 along with some subtle changes in service charges.

The Board wishes to express it's appreciation to all boards and departments for their continuing spirit of cooperation to assist us in our accomplishments, and especially to the citizens for their understanding and goodwill.

VOTED UNANIMOUSLY: That the Town so do.

ARTICLE 16

To see if the Town will vote to sell for the sum of \$1.00, the materials left over from the commemoration of the nation's Bicentennial and the 250th Anniversary of Hanover, to the Hanover Historical Society for their permanent files and use. Said materials consist of book reprints of the Town's History of 1910, numbering approximately 900 copies, records and correspondence of both Committees.

VOTED UNANIMOUSLY: That the Town so do.

ARTICLE 17

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or appropriate from available funds a sum of money to purchase and equip a 1979 four-door sedan type vehicle for use of the fire department and to authorize the trade-in of the present 1975 Ford Station Wagon, said purchasing and equipping to be done under the direction of the fire chief and the Board of Selectmen, or take any other action relative thereto.

Moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,888.00 for this purpose.

VOTED UNANIMOUSLY: That the Town so do.

ARTICLE 18

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or appropriate from available funds a sum of money to purchase and equip two (2) 1979 4 door sedans and to authorize the trade-in of one (1) present 1974 Ford unmarked sedan and one (1) present 1977 marked Ford Police cruiser, said purchasing and equipping to be under the direction of the Chief of Police and the Board of Selectmen, or take any other action relative thereto.

Moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,709.00 for this purpose.

VOTED: That the Town so do.

ARTICLE 19

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or appropriate from available funds the sum of \$3,100. for the purpose of purchasing an Athletic Field Conditioning Machine for the Playground Division of the Department of Public Works. Said purchasing to be done under the direction of the Board of Public Works, or take any other action relative thereto.

VOTED: That this Article be passed over.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or appropriate from available funds the sum of \$5,360. for the purpose of purchasing a pick-up truck for the Highway Division of the Department of Public Works and authorize a trade-in of a 1967 3/4 ton truck. Said purchasing to be done under the direction of the Board of Public Works; and/or take other action relative thereto.

VOTED UNANIMOUSLY: That this Article be passed over.

ARTICLE 21

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or appropriate from available funds the sum of \$43,000. to purchase and equip a two cubic yard capacity front end loader and authorize the trade-in of the present 1971 Trojan 1700 loader, said purchasing and equipping to be done under the direction of the Board of Public Works or take any other action relative thereto.

Moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000.00 for this purpose.

VOTED UNANIMOUSLY: That the Town so do.

ARTICLE 22

To see if the Town will vote to grant permission to the Board of Selectmen to allow the Hanover Police Boys Club, Inc., to construct an addition to the building owned by the Town at the rear of the Town Hall, presently being used by said Hanover Police Boys Club, Inc. The cost of said addition to be paid by private funds raised for this purpose by the Hanover Police Boys Club, Inc., or take any other action relative thereto.

VOTED UNANIMOUSLY: That the Town so do.

ARTICLE 23

To see if the Town will vote to accept Section 8E of Chapter 40 of the General Laws of the Commonwealth, and under the authority conferred by said section, establish a Youth Commission of five members, to be appointed by the Selectmen in the manner as provided, with the powers as enumerated and for the purposes designated in said section of the General Laws, or take any other action relative thereto.

Moved to pass over this article. SO VOTED

ARTICLE 24

To see if the Town will vote to raise or appropriate from available funds the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) for the use of the Hanover Youth Commission to be established pursuant to Article 23 or take any other action relative thereto.

VOTED: That this Article be passed over.

ARTICLE 25

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or appropriate from available funds the sum of forty-eight hundred dollars (\$4800.) or conduct an annual audit of all of the Town agencies, departments, and bureaus, or take any other action relative thereto.

VOTED: That this Article be passed over.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or appropriate from available funds the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4000.) for the Green Engineering Company as additional payment for completion of plans, specifications, and approvals for the intersections as approved at the Annual Town Meeting of 1977, or take any other action relative thereto.

VOTED: That this Article be passed over.

ARTICLE 27

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or appropriate from available funds the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2500.) for the purpose of creating a Revolving Fund for the Stetson House: Such fund to be under the direction of the Board of Selectmen from year to year, and that any funds appropriated to or given to, shall be maintained in said fund, including rental income or take any other action relative thereto.

VOTED: That this Article be passed over.

ARTICLE 28

To see if the Town will vote to remove the office of the Chief of Police from the Civil Service, as adopted by the Town at the Annual Town Election of March 12, 1960, or take any other action relative thereto.

VOTED UNANIMOUSLY: That this Article be passed over.

ARTICLE 29

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or appropriate from available funds the sum of \$10,000 (Ten thousand dollars) to be added to the Conservation Fund, or take any other action relative thereto.

Motion was made to Pass Over Article.

Before any action was taken on the Article a quorum was questioned. Count showed 147 voters present lacking a quorum.

Motion to adjourn this meeting to Wednesday, May 9, 1979 to convene at the High School at 7:30 P.M.

Motion to pass over Article was defeated.

ARTICLE 30

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Hanover Zoning By-Law as follows:

Add to Section VI., F., 1., a new paragraph "i" as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or appropriate from available funds the sum of \$48,231. for reconstruction and resurfacing of the High School Parking Lot, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 42

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning By-Laws by revising the Hanover, Massachusetts, Zoning Map, and so note on the Zoning Map; by changing from a Limited Industrial District, two parcels of land bounded and described as follows: (said parcels to be rezoned from Limited Industrial District to a Residential District)

First Parcel

Northerly by the present Limited Industrial District, a distance of about one thousand feet;

Easterly by land now or formerly of David W. Moran and land now or formerly of the Hanover Swim & Tennis Club, Inc., a distance of about approximately eighteen hundred (1800) feet;

Northerly by land now or formerly of the Hanover Swim and Tennis Club Inc., a distance of about six hundred feet:

Easterly and in a line parallel to and one hundred fifty (150) feet

Southeasterly from Third Herring Brook, a distance of about fifteen hundred (1500) feet;

Southerly by land now or formerly of the Town of Hanover and land now or formerly of America A. Cassese, a distance of about seven hundred seventy (770) feet:

Southwesterly and Southerly by the present commercial district by two (2) courses, a distance of three hundred (300) and one hundred fifty (150) feet, respectively; and Southeasterly and Westerly by the present Commercial District, a distance for approximately thirty-nine hundred (3900) feet.

(Excluding lots numbered 13, 22, 58, 59 and 60 as shown on Plan 24 of the Assessors' Maps of Hanover which lots remain Residential)

Second Parcel

Northeasterly by the Southeast Expressway, a distance of about one hundred fifty (150) feet.

Easterly, Northerly and Easterly by Third Herring Brook and Peterson's Pond, being the Hanover Town Line, a distance of about nineteen hundred (1900) feet.

Southerly by land now or formerly of David W. Moran, a distance of about two hundred twenty (220) feet;

Westerly and Southerly by the present Limited Industrial District, a distance of about nineteen hundred (1900) feet; or take any other action relative thereto.

VOTED: That this Article be passed over 123 in the affirmative and 56 in the negative.

ARTICLE 43

To see if the Town will vote to amend Article III of the Town By-Laws by deleting Section 2 and substituting the following new section 2:

Section 2. The order for consideration of all Town Meeting articles shall be chosen in lottery fashion by the Town Clerk, assisted by the Town Moderator. After an article has been drawn for consideration, subsequent articles shall not be drawn until the Town Meeting has acted upon the drawn article

For the purpose of this By-Law, the General Budget Article and the Wage and Personnel Compensation Schedules shall be considered subsections of the same article." or take any other action relative thereto.

A Motion to Accept this Article was defeated.

ARTICLE 44

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Town By-Laws, Rules and Regulations by adding a Section entitled, "Recall and Removal of Elected Officials," described as follows: or act on anything relative thereto.

- I. Any holder of an elective office may be recalled and removed therefrom by the qualified voters of the Town as herein provided.
- II. Any qualified voter of the Town may make and file with the Town Clerk an affidavit containing the name of the Elected Official sought to be removed and a statement of the grounds of removal. The Town Clerk shall thereupon deliver to the voter making such affidavit a sufficient number of copies of petition blanks for such recall the removal, printed forms of which the Town Clerk shall keep on hand. Such blanks shall be issued by the Town Clerk with the Town Clerk's signature and official seal thereto attached; they shall be dated and addressed to the Selectmen, shall contain the name of the elected official sought to be removed, the office from which such removal is sought, the grounds of removal as stated in the affidavit, and shall demand the election of a successor to such office. A copy of the petition shall be entered in a record book to be kept in the office of the Town Clerk. Said recall petition shall be returned and filed with the Town Clerk within twenty days after the filing of the affidavit. Said petition before being returned and filed shall be signed by five hundred qualified voters, each and every signature shall include the place of residence of the signer, by

number and street; such signatures need not be all on one paper. One of the signers of every such paper shall make an affidavit thereto that the statements contained therein are true, and that each signature appended to the paper is the genuine signature of the person whose name it purports to be. All such papers for the recall of any one officer shall be filed as one instrument, with the endorsements thereon of the names and addresses of three persons designated as filing the same.

III. Within five days after the filing of said petition, the Town Clerk shall ascertain by examination thereof and of the voter registration list and election returns whether the petition is signed by the requisite number of qualified voters, and shall attach thereto a certificate showing the results of such examination. The TownClerk shall, if necessary, be given assistance by the Selectmen.

If the Town Clerk's certificate shows the petition to be insufficient the Town Clerk shall within said five days so notify in writing one or more of the persons designated on the petition as filing the same, and the petition may be amended by the addition of signatures at any time within five days after the giving of said notice by the Town Clerk. The Town Clerk shall, within three days after such amendment, make like examination of the amended petition, and attach thereto a certificate of the result. If then insufficient, or if no amendment was made, the Town Clerk, shall return the petition to one of the persons designated thereon as filing it, without prejudice, however, to the filing of a new petition for the same purpose.

IV. If the petition or amended petition shall be found and certified by the Town Clerk to be sufficient, the Town Clerk shall submit the same with a certificate to the Selectmen without delay, and the Selectmen shall forthwith give written notice to said officer of receipt of said certificate and shall, if the officer sought to be removed does not resign within five days thereafter thereupon order an election to be held on a Saturday fixed by them not less than twenty-five nor more than thirty-five days after the date of the Town Clerk's certificate that a sufficient petition is filed: provided, however, that if any other town election is to occur within sixty days after the date of said certificate, the Selectmen may, in their discretion, postpone the holding of the removal election to the date of such other election. If a vacancy occurs in said office after a removal election has been so ordered, the election shall nevertheless proceed as in this section provided. V. Any officer sought to be removed may be a candidate to succeed himself, and, unless he requests otherwise in writing, the Town Clerk shall place his name on the official ballot without nomination. The nomination of other candidates, the publications of the warrant for such removal election, and the conduct of the same, shall all be in accordance with the provisions of law relating to elections, unless otherwise provided in the By-Law.

VI. The incumbent shall continue to perform the duties of his office until the removal election. If then re-elected, he shall continue in office for the remainder of his unexpired term, subject to recall as before, except as provided in Section VII. of the By-Law. If not re-elected in the removal election, he shall be deemed removed upon the qualification of his successor, who shall hold office during the unexpired term. If the successor fails to qualify within five days after receiving notification of his election, the incumbent shall thereupon be deemed removed and the office vacant.

VII. No recall petition shall be filed against any officer within three months after his election, nor, in the case of any officer re-elected in a removal election, until three months after that election.

VIII. No person who has been removed from office by recall, or who has resigned from some office while recall proceedings were pending against him, shall be appointed to any town office within two years after such removal by recall or such resignation.

IX. The term "qualified voter," wherever it occurs in this By-Law, means a voter qualified by law to vote for candidates for office to be filled or from which removal is sought.

The Motion of the Advisory Board changed the first paragraph of this Article to read:

To see if the Town will vote to petition the Massachusetts General Court to amend by Special Legislation the By-laws of the Town of Hanover as follows: "Recall and Removal of Elected Officials" described as follows: and with the change the Article be accepted.

After much discussion the Motion to Accept this Article was defeated.

ARTICLE 45

Moved that the Town vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 576 of the General Laws entitled "An Act authorizing the granting of limited real estate tax abatements for certain improvements to real estate.

Section 1. Section 38 of Chapter 59 of the General Laws, as amended by Chapter 853 of the Acts of 1975, is hereby further amended by adding the following paragraph.

The assessors of each city and town, beginning December thirty-first, nineteen hundred and seventy-eight, shall not consider expenditures for normal repairs and maintenance in determining fair cash valuation of property for assessment purposes. In no event shall the amount excluded exceed four thousand dollars each year, not to exceed three consecutive years. The following repairs shall be considered normal maintenance if they are not part of a structural addition: repairing and replacing existing masonry, repairing or replacing existing siding, roof, porches, steps, sidewalks or driveways, wiring or plumbing modernization, new fences, lawns, and landscaping, outside and inside painting, new boiler and furnace, replacement of awnings, adding or replacing gutters, downspouts, paving of driveways, new ceiling, wall or floor surfacing, plaster repairs, or other redecorating.

Section 2. The provisions of this act shall take effect upon local acceptance. Approved July 22, 1978.

Board of Health

The Board of Health respectfully submits our annual report for the year 1979.

The board meets Monday evenings at 7:30 P.M. with the exception of Holidays.

The Office is manned Monday through Friday from 8:30 A.M. — 4:30 P.M. There is a full time Health Agent who performs the various duties and enforces the rules and regulations which come under the jurisdiction of the Board of Health. During the year 8599 tons of refuse was disposed of at the Transfer Station. This is 261 tons less than 1978. Thanks to continuing efforts of our citizens our recycling program returned monies to the town. Recycled glass — \$1,933.58, newspaper and cardboard \$6,925.76 — totaling \$8,859.34. Weighing of commercial vehicles collected \$855.00. We are presently charging \$20 per ton for receiving out of town refuse which amounted to \$13,137.63 for the year. Percolation tests of which 55 were performed amounted to \$1,375.00. 32 Disposal Works Construction permits were issued and brought in \$800.00. Fees for licenses came to \$3,802.90. The total revenue returned in 1979 was \$28.829.87.

The Mosquito Control aerial program was continued again in 1979 with fairly successful results.

A Flu Clinic was held for residents over 65 years of age. Vaccine is provided for school immunization programs: Diphtheria, Tetanus, Measles/Mumps/Rubella and Polio. Mantoux Clinics are held monthly for testing for Tuberculosis for all food handlers employed within the Town of Hanover and the school personnel. Two Rabies Clinics for dogs were held in 1979.

 - 3 Illegal dumping complaints

The Hanover Conservation Commission

The primary responsibility of the Hanover Conservation Commission continues to be the enforcement of Chapter 131, Section 40, the Wetlands Act of the State of Massachusetts. It is the hope of the Commission that it has met its responsibilities. The Commission has tried to be of assistance to other town boards in their efforts to improve the quality of life in the Town of Hanover.

The Conservation Commission meets at 7:30 P.M. on the 2nd and 4th Mondays of each month and maintains Town Hall office hours from 8:30 - 10:30 A.M. Monday through Friday. If a holiday is celebrated on a meeting Monday, the Commission meets on the following Wednesday. Mrs. Lois Heim is Chairman, replacing Mrs. Marjorie Abbot, able chairman for the past four years. Commission member Mr. James Harney is vice-chairman. The Commission was happy to welcome Mr. Carl B. Arlanson as its newest member.

Three parcels of land have been acquired this year for conservation purposes. An area located at the intersection of Union Street and Old Washington Street has been donated to the Town by Miss Lucy J. Bonney and her sister, Mrs. Anne B. Henderson. This gift is greatly appreciated as it preserves open space on Route 53 in a vital water-shed area.

A parcel located off Broadway was purchased to add to the Thomas Tindale conservation area. Another purchased parcel with right of way by the South Hanover Fire Station borders the Phillips Bird Sanctuary. These acquisitions increase trail areas of accessibility to already existing areas.

During the past year 17 hearings were held under the Wetlands Act. Professional advice has been obtained from Interdisciplinary Environment Planning, The Massachusetts Association of Conservation Commissions, The Conservation Law Foundation, and many others.

The study of the Drinkwater River Basin by Mr. Walter Amory, consulting engineer, has been completed. Also completed has been our Open Space Program. The Commission wishes to thank all Town Boards and the many citizens who have assisted in this project.

The Conservation Commission has sent to the *Metropolitan Area Planning Council* acknowledgment of its support of the application of this Town for Council technical assistance in the form of a three-community comprehensive land use study to provide needed direction for relief in the Route 53 and Third Herring Brook watershed.

The development of conservation land for use and enjoyment by the citizens of the town is a supervisory function of the Conservation Commission. However, the actual development and improvement of present conservation land would require the specialized services of a trained personnel and the necessary funding. This would result in a sizable budget increase. Conservation areas are presently available for hiking, horse-back riding, picnicking, fishing, canoeing and boating, and other passive uses. CETA personnel and our Boy Scouts have improved the existing trails and have constructed others.

For safety reasons hunting is forbidden in the conservation areas which are open for the use of everyone, young and old. The deposition of unsightly garbage and refuse is also forbidden and motor vehicles have been excluded. Regrettably, it has been necessary to put up barriers in some instances to enforce these rulings, and

this could cause some inconvenience to Hanover citizens from time to time.

Hazardous waste disposal in the town is a new and potentially serious problem for the Commission. The services of persons knowledgeable in methods of testing for both organic and inorganic pollutants have been retained to determine the effects of such pollutants on private wells and on the Town Water Supply. With every passing year the problems facing the Conservation Commission become more complex, requiring ever more technical and legal assistance in their resolution.

The Conservation Commission wishes to express appreciation for the continued assistance of the Department of Public Works in the maintenance of the conservation areas of the town and to the Police Department for their cooperation and assistance. We are grateful for the interest and support of our Town Officials, Town Boards, the many organizations within the town, and especially of our fellowcitizens. We hope we will have your continued assistance and support during the coming year.

In 1979 the H.H.A. was saddened by the death of its Chairman Edward Amazeen. This was followed later by the resignations of Susan Hillman and Carlos Hill.

Robert Basiliere was first appointed and then elected to replace Mr. Amazeen. The appointments of Michael Pizziferri and J. Michael Roberts were made to fill the other vacant positions.

In February of 1979 the H.H.A. was notified of available monies from the H.U.D. $202 \, \mathrm{program}$.

A non-profit sponsoring agent was needed. The Hanover American Legion was contacted and agreed to act as the sponsor.

The Hanover Legion Elderly Corp. then put a funding package together that included an agreement from Ralph Tedeschi on an extension of the land option with the H.H.A. along with a partial assignment of their property.

During the summer H.U.D. notified the Hanover Legion Elderly Corporation of the funding for 60 units of housing. At the same time 150 units of housing was awarded to the Cardinal Cushing Residence Inc.

The H.H.A. will not be managing or organizing either of these non-profit housing units but will help in the process of tenant selection.

Meanwhile, your H.H.A. will continue to explore Section VIII and Congregate Housing opportunities for the elderly and handicaps of Hanover.

Council For the Aging

To the Board of Selectmen and to the Citizens of Hanover:

The Council on Aging hold regular monthly meetings on the third Thursday evening of the month at the Grange Hall on Circuit Street at 7:30. These meetings are open to the public.

The Mini-bus is available to any Senior Citizen of Hanover who is fifty-nine years of age or over; one needs only to contact the Council for the Aging. The average ridership of the bus is approximately two hundred and fifty people a month. It is used to carry people to doctor appointments, shopping and to the hot lunches that are served at the Hanover Junior High School on Wednesdays and Fridays. In addition, the mini-bus carries people to monthly meetings and card parties.

Discount cards for Senior Citizens are still being issued by the Council. These may be used on Tuesdays at most stores and are also accepted on other week days by some stores and restaurants in the town. However, it would be advisable to inquire about the availability of discounts.

There were six trips taken through the summer months and the Council provided the transportation for them.

The Senior Citizens were entertained by Hanover Junior High School at a Christmas Supper hosted by the School and several town merchants.

Two new members joined the Council during the past year; they are Elaine Londergan and Ellen Gillis.

In June, 1978 Hanover joined the Old Colony Elder Services, Brockton. These provide qualifying Senior Citizens with home care service, home maker and/or chore services. They also furnish transportation to hospitals located in surrounding towns and Boston whenever necessary. To date, they have furnished us with approximately \$7,000.00 in services. For information regarding any of these services, please contact the Senior Aide at the Grange Hall.

Council members attend the seminars that are held in the southeastern section of Massachusetts.

We have been awarded monies under Title 202 of HUD for senior housing on Spring Street, Hanover. This project will commence on or about April 1 under the sponsorship of the American Legion Housing Corporation. Senior housing to be built at Cardinal Cushing Training Center has also been funded; the date for this building has yet to be announced.

New lavatories have been installed at the Grange Hall and the building has recently been completely insulated. We are in the process of refurbishing the interior so that we may soon have a drop-in center where Senior Citizens might meet and share common interests.

Report of the Senior Aide Massachusetts Elder Affairs

The Program is sponsored by the Hanover Council On Aging.

The main purpose of the program is to keep all Senior Citizens in their own homes or with their families as long as possible with aid when necessary. Assistance and information can be obtained by calling 878-6361 from 9:30 A.M. to 12:30 P.M. One hour a day is spent on Outreach services to the Community.

A total of 677 people have been served this year through visits, advice, and counseling and liason work in the following categories: Home Care, Government Overview, Health Care, Social Security Increase, Welfare, Rest Homes, Nursing Homes, Legal Services, Housing, Taxes, and many other resources. Since most of the work is of a very personal nature, records are kept confidential.

Our greatest priority over the past several years, that of Elderly Housing in Hanover, is fast becoming a reality. We look forward to the completion of the project with great anticipation. Many people in need will benefit greatly from the services and assistance that will result from these programs. We have at this time approximately 100 names on a waiting list begun four years ago. We are still participating in the Old Colony Elderly Services. This program is available regardless of income on a sliding scale that fits almost everyone over 60 years of age.

We are committed to attend 12 Orientation Conferences, one each month, to keep us abreast of the many changes and developments occurring. We are informed of all bills proposed in the Massachusetts Legislature and in Washington that may affect Senior Citizens. Seminars were held four times this year throughout the Southeastern Massachusetts area to keep us informed on new issues.

OPERATIONS:

We have a total of six fire stations which are essentially manned by call firefighters around the clock. Weekdays between the hours of 8 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. we have two full time firefighters on duty at Station 4.

Our ambulance is manned around the clock with two men on each eight-hour shift 365 days a year.

Our equipment consists of: 6 engines, 1 ladder truck, 3 forest fire trucks, 1 rescue truck, 2 ambulances, and a chief's car.

Two of the stations, Station 4 located on Center Street, and Station 6 located on King Street, are privately owned by the Firemen's Associations.

All fire and ambulance calls are received at the Communications Center and transmitted by radio to the various stations and members.

The town enjoys a 4B insurance rating, which is considerably better than most of the towns of our size in the immediate area.

TRAINING:

During the year Captain Kenneth W. Houghton conducted more than 15 training courses in all phases of firefighting.

Six of our full time personnel are attending community colleges working toward their fire science degrees.

RETIREMENTS:

Deputy Chief Ernest J. Bourque and Firefighter William Michalowski retired after many years of loyal and faithful service to our department and the community. The department extends our thanks for their many years of loyal service.

I would like to thank the department heads and citizens for their support and cooperation during the past year.

Report of the Hanover Member of the South Shore Vocational Technical High School

It is with considerable regret that I feel obliged to make this report to the Town. I am certain that they will bring me criticism from some quarters; nevertheless, I feel it my duty to bring this matter to the attention of the parents of the students at the school, and that it is in the best interest of the students, and that some one must express them.

Last year I reported that the committee had appointed me to review some of the books used in this school. The staff delivered to me about 40 books, most of which were supplimental reading with very few text-books. In fact only one, entitled "Social Studies;" with this I found much prejudice and some errors. Most of these books I characterized as a "Mess of Trash" and still consider them so. There were only three which I would call literature. There are several lists of books suitable for use in English classes. Why not use one of these?

As of January of this year the committe had failed to reply to my reports, so I took it upon myself to place on the agenda for the January 23, 1980 meeting an item "Harrington's Memos." At this meeting one of the committee said that there might be other opinions about these books. I willingly admitted this but asked if some one else on the committee would read at least one of the books and see what his opinion was. No one offered to do this so there the matter stands.

Among these books were only three that could be considered as related to our heritage which should be a prime concern of any educational system. Contemporary literature leaves a person very shallow and without roots. I am incredulous that committee members have such a lack of interest in the curriculum of their school. The time may have arrived when some parents should visit the school and see what is going on there.

Except for the above the year has gone well. We have had two groups to conduct labor negotiations with and they have cost us quite a sum of money for attorney's fees.

The additon is occupied but still not finished. The contractor is proving difficult.

The number of girls is not growing as fast as we would like it but those we have are doing very well, indeed.

South Shore Regional School District Treasurer's Report

Fiscal Year July 1, 1978 to June 30, 1979

In accordance with Section XII of the South Shore Regional School District Agreement effective January 6, 1960, I submit herewith details of the fiscal year July 1, 1978 thru June 30, 1979, Financial transactions of the School District.

Details are presented with respect to the July 1, 1978 to June 30, 1979 estimated expenditures and their apportionment to member towns, actual receipts and expenditures, and a balance sheet and statement of outstanding debt as of June 30, 1979.

On August 23, 1978 the School District Committee voted to approve a total reduction in the 1978-1979 Operating Cost Assessment to Member Towns by the amount of \$127,890.00 in accordance with the provisions of Section 59 of Chapter 367 Acts of 1978.

Total operating expenditures for the fiscal year were \$1,357,762.98 and Capital Outlay expenditures were \$172,986.84, details of which are shown in the expenditure schedule.

Various additional expenditures under self-explanatory titles were made as per details set forth in the expenditure schedule.

Salary increases for all employees for the fiscal year 1978-1979 averaged 7.47% and the total of all salaries paid equaled approximately 71% of Operating Costs.

Construction of our "mini-addition" originally due to be completed in December 1977 has not yet been completed. On March 26, 1979 an initial meeting between the legal representatives of the School District Committee and Scaldini Inc., the general contractor for our "mini-addition" met with the American Board of Arbitrators Boston, Massachusetts to discuss the required procedures necessary to effect a solution in this case. Since that time further delays have been encountered as the result of a superior court order including six sub-contractors in this dispute as well. As of the close of the fiscal year June 30, 1979 no further action has taken place.

Final settlement of this case will be long delayed in view of the necessity of hearing all of the participants now involved in coordinating and evaluating their testimony and arriving at a decision relative thereto.

On April 18, 1979 a temporary occupancy permit was approved by the Hanover Building Inspector and our long delayed "mini-addition" was occupied for school purposes, while awaiting a decision in the arbitration proceedings with respect to the completion of this building.

A third of five annual reimbursements in the amount of \$54,077.30 was received during the year from the State School Building Assistance Commission relative to the construction of our "mini-addition" building.

Surplus Revenue was determined to be \$826,643.16 as of June 30, 1979 which was derived from the following sources:

TOWN REPORT — 1978-1979 TRUSTEES FOR PLYMOUTH COUNTY COOPERATIVE EXTENSION SERVICE By Edgar W. Spear, Director

The Plymouth County Cooperative Extension Service's Office is located on High Street, Hanson, and can be reached by calling 293-3541 or 447-5946.

This is repetitious, but for the information of new residents, we are educational arm of the University of Massachusetts, and the United State Department of Agriculture at the county level. This is where the name, "Cooperative Extension" is derived.

STAFF:

Our staff is comprised of a Director, two Regional Agricultural Specialists, a Community Resource Development Specialist, two Home Economists, four 4-H Agents and three clerical staff.

In addition to our County Staff, we administer a Nutritional Educational Program for limited-income families in the city of Brockton, (Expanded Food & Nutrition Educational Program). We have one professional nutritionist and eight aides. This office is located at 32 Belmont Street, Brockton, and is funded by Federal Nutrition Funds through the University of Massachusetts, our Land-Grant College. This is for both a 4-H and Adult Program.

We have many new and varied educational programs for you. Areas in which our staff has expertise are:

Agriculture
Community Resource Development
Home Economics
4-H Youth Program
Nutrition and Energy Conservation

Our Expanded Food and Nutrition Program (EFNEP) has expanded to all of Plymouth County's 26 towns. This was made possible through the use of C.E.T.A. Funds.

In the 4-H youth phase of the program, Nutrition Assistants and volunteers work to provide education to youth, which will contibute to personal development and improvement of diets and nutrition of their families.

In 1978-79, there were 43,779 youth involved in our 4-H EFNEP Nutrition Program. You can obtain information about current programs, as well as upto-date consumer information, by requesting the free monthly newsletter. This newsletter can be sent to you by calling the Brockton Office at 583-2545.

Through C.E.T.A., we also have two ECAP Teams — Energy Conservation Auditing Programs.

Since May of 1979, we have been performing energy audits for home owners and completed 340 audits on June 30th. With oil at 90¢ per gallon, this has meant a savings of approximately \$350 per year, if 25% of the recommended improvements have been performed. Last year, (1978), over 400 homes had such an audit, so over 750 homes in Plymouth County have had an energy audit.

In your town of Hanover, 61 homes participated in this savings.

In our traditional 4-H Program, we have 1,097 members with 36,480 other youth participating in our short-term and school programs. The 1977 population of Plymouth County schools was 96,287. This means 38.9% of Plymouth County youth have been involved in our programs.

In the town of Hanover, there were 765 youths that participated in these programs.

Contact your Town Director, Leander B. Nichols, for the County Cooperative Extension Service with any suggestions or requests.

Free bulletins are on display at our office on lawn care, gardening, nutrition, home canning and freezing, to name just a few. If you pass our office on your travels, please stop and get to know us. We continue to test soil, free of charge, for Plymouth County residents.

Hanover School Department Town Report — 1979

The year 1979 was designated the Year of the Child by the United Nations, national and state leaders. Children are the hope for the future, the most valuable resource we have. However, the decade just ending has seen heavy pressures brought to bear on our children - a weakening of family structure, changes in traditional values, more drugs, less self-discipline. Schools have been asked to assume ever widening responsibilities and yet provide quality traditional services for youth. To keep our faith to the children of today, to help this valuable resource be all it can in the years ahead requires a diversity of programs too numerous to detail in any Annual Report. This annual message, like the ones before, highlights several programs and services worthy of attention and reports on some accomplishments and some problems. It details long range plans for changes in enrollments and mastery of basic skills, curriculum developments in writing and foreign language, accomplishments in the fine arts, athletics and of our Class of '79. In addition, it makes note of widening responsibilities of the department including special needs education and financial restraints, energy conservation, and the desire to provide services for the entire community after school hours.

Population decline and basic skills deal with two of several long range programs underway in the Hanover Schools. With a decrease in the number of elementary school students there is not only a need to economize in the staff and classrooms at this age level but also to have accurate long range plans to most effectively utilize staff and space in the future. A study committee has defined and developed data and five year projections of students. It will continue to update this data and expand a long range plan to include housing and other programs. Eight elementary school positions have been eliminated in the last three years and the Salmond School will be phased out as a primary school in 1980.

Plans for Competency Based Education, also known as basic skills improvement, have developed under the supervision of a long range planning committee. Citizens, teachers and administrators have been working together to define exactly what basic skills should be taught, where in the school curriculum they should be mastered and how the competency of each student is to be measured and reported. By year's end standards were determined and tests developed and pilot tested in arithmetic, reading and writing. Plans will be perfected and made operational systemwide in 1980.

Since a balanced education includes more than mastering of the 3 R's, a few of the many other activities in the elementary schools should be touched on here. A long-range spelling program has been in place for several years and received increased emphasis and positive results in 1980. Reading must be practiced to be learned and a number of programs are in progress to encourage reading. Drop-Everything and Read, is a program where everyone in the school spends one period devoted to quality reading — no interruptions of any sort permitted. Read-Ins, the Sustained Silent Reading Period, Book Fairs and Summer Reading Programs all increase the practice and enjoyment to be gained from effective reading. The Humanities Night at Cedar School is illustrative of many programs geared to recognize the quality and depth of a well-rounded education. The class for academically talented students expanded to a full day program for grades three and four, half day in grades two and five and some enrichment in grade one. The Junior Great Books

Program was inaugurated early in the year by trained staff members and community volunteers. It involved many students, grades 2-8, in a new approach to reading. The reading selections in the program represent outstanding works of literature, past and present. Students are taught to read interpretively and share their response to what they read in a disciplined method of discussion.

Writing is one of the most sought after skills in the business world, it is also a highly desired requirement for those entering prestigious colleges. The Department of Education has made writing one of the three basic competencies to be given attention in public schools across the state. Hanover, last year developed and implemented a mandatory full year writing course in grade 11 and this year is implementing an Individualized Language Arts Program in the junior high. This nationally approved writing program was worked out and teachers trained in the spring and was begun in the fall by all English teachers at the junior high. All students have writing folders where samples of their writing assignments are kept. Lessons in writing include periodic diagnosis, oral warmups, group discussion, peer editing and the use of checklist directions. Much student practice and teacher correction is in evidence. Curriculum packets designed around each of the writing techniques are being developed to aid in the teaching. The new program has been discussed with large groups of staff members, parents, and citizens at large. Plans are underway to introduce the program in grades 1-5 and possibly to expand it in high school. The writing program links well with the minimum competency testing required by the state and should allow Hanover students to grow in this essential skill in the years ahead.

The study of languages other than English long has been considered the sign of a liberal education and more recently a public need both as stated by the President of the United States and as evidenced in business. The Hanover School Department offers up to five years of French and Spanish and three years of Latin. This year some 150 eighth graders begin French and Spanish and 425 students in the high school - 47 percent of the entire student body - are studying one of the three languages at one of five levels. The French and Spanish curricula were completely revised during the summer of 1979. Latin curriculum revision is now in progress, to be completed in 1980. While only a small number of colleges require a foreign language for entrance all accept the Hanover courses towards a general entrance requirement and these subjects are a basic part of the college preparation of a verbally oriented high schooler. Hanover students taking College Board Achievement Tests in French and Spanish average a very commendable 550 score. A number of Hanover graduates in the last two or three years have gone to colleges throughout the country and have either placed in advanced classes or passed tests waiving their language requirement for college graduation. Five of the colleges so recognizing the Hanover language students are Radcliffe, Boston University, University of Massachusetts, Air Force Academy and Georgetown University. Motivating students to the larger applications of a language is more difficult than in science or social studies but the teachers have undertaken a variety of field trips to bring the language alive and enrich the students' lives. They have seen a number of performances of the French Theatre in Boston, attended "La Casa de Bernarda Alba" in New York, seen the Ballet Folkorico of Mexico and visited the Museum of Fine Arts and ethnic restaurants of Boston.

The fine arts — here limited to the Art and Music programs — provide a cultural background of such importance that it is mandated for every child in the

Commonwealth grades K-8. It is a popular and enriching program a source of pride in Hanover grades K-12. To present the highest quality of offering, Hanover uses specialists in art and music for the programs required of every student every week through grade 8. Art serves as a mode of expression for many children. Their creative work in a variety of materials trains them in many basic skills and serves as an individual accomplishment for which each is recognized. A special program for talented art students not otherwise involved in talented and gifted programs at Center School is being pioneered with the cooperation of the Brockton Art Museum. Exhibits and demonstrations occur frequently at school open houses and other activities where parents visit. At the high school, where Art is an elective, both art rooms are utilized every period each week. In addition, instruction is given on two afternoons. The afternoon courses are in ceramics I and II and Silk Screen I, Watercolor will be added soon. At the high school 70 students are taking an Art major and 170 are taking a minor in Art. While the program is not intended to be career training, many young people have become so skilled and encouraged in the public schools that they entered professional art programs.

The basic music program, like the art, is taught by trained professionals and the curriculum has been revised and detailed to provide high quality throughout the system. For added enrichment, choruses have been formed in the elementary schools which rehearse weekly and perform periodically. Student productions of the "Nutcracker" and the "Sound of Music" have been enthusiastically received. They involved many Center and Salmond children. One chorus at Cedar School had part of their Christmas Concert aired on a Boston T.V. New Program. The junior high isntrumental program enrolls 155 students and the level of performance of these musicians rises each year. They have a varsity band of 70 members and another band of about that number. Both present several public concerts per year and perform at school functions in the building and for the elementary schools. A jazz band of 25 members challenges some of the students and a few advanced students have the opportunity to serve as student conductors.

The high school instrumental program is also growing in quality and diversity. Annual testing shows the rise in individual musicianship and the groups are also progressing. Besides the concert and marching band there is the jazz ensemble which continues to practice one night a week and a Dixieland Ensemble. Band Camp has now been extended to 3-1/2 days in August at Camp Squanto. Two students were selected for the Southeast District Band in 1979 and two more in 1980. These two have also been recommended for All-State recognition. The Concert Band and Jazz Ensemble held its Winter Concert in January, while the Marching Band performed at football games, the Memorial Day Parade, the Hanover Mall's Christmas Parade and the Abington Band Jamboree. Throughout the year the band and chorus performed at the elementary schools, the junior high and for high school assemblies. Both groups performed at Graduation. During the Christmas season students went caroling locally and included a performance at a retirement home. Students also caroled at the Lion's Club tree lighting ceremony at Town Hall and for Cardinal Cushing School. The band and chorus were involved in two exchange programs with a school in Jericho, New York.

The choral part of the high school music program grew this year with the addition of a vocal class, production of musicals and a chamber singers group — all new courses. The Concert Choir grew to 70 students and the Chamber Singers numbered 32. Six choral students participated in the 1979 Southeast District

Festival and 13 choral students were selected for the 1980 Festival. Ten received recommendations for the All-State recognition. One choral student was a member of the Eastern United States Chorus — a rare accomplishment. Like the instrumental musicans, the vocal students improved in skill individually and their concerts were of high quality and well received. If the program can maintain its drive, still more quality and even better performances can be realized.

The Special Needs Program provides supplementary and specialized education to some 400 students in Hanover. This represents about 13 percent of the student body, a figure typical of communities across the state. One of our greatest concerns, educationally and financially, is not the majority of these students who receive services in our schools or at North River Collaborative, but some individual students whose problems are so severe or unique that we have not as yet been able to provide programs locally. There are 55 students tuitioned to specialized schools and programs. One problem is that only 42 of these students were in Hanover and known to school personnel when the budgets were established hence all their expenses are budget excesses made up by reducing services elsewhere in the schools. We anticipate only 46 outside placements next year. The average tuition cost for these students is \$4,377 but some costs go as high as \$13,200. These rates are rising rapidly at 10% - 12% and often the state allows retroactive billing which further drains our finances. These students must be specially transported and this cost is expected to increase 50% in the next year.

In order to realize some educational and financial advantages, the school department initiated a preschool program this year involving 17 students with varying degrees of handicaps. Youngsters in this program are from 3 - 7 years of age. Therapy for such young children is felt to be shorter and more effective than when the children are older. By grouping the youngsters and housing them in Hanover classrooms the program is intended to be of high quality and cost effective. Transportation is provided by a van purchased with federal monies and part of the staff costs are also federally funded. The program is proving to be even more valuable than we anticipated. It is a self-contained unit that provides all diagnostic and direct intervention services. Even parents can receive support programming so that they can support the teachers' efforts at home.

During 1979 the Hanover School Department has implemented some severe energy conservation measures that have resulted in a great reduction in energy use. In the conservation of heating oil; thermostats have been lowered to 65 degrees days and 60 nights. Ventilation has been reduced and a preventive maintenance program for boilers, burners and temperature controls should provide maximum efficiency of heating units. Lighting; rooms and corridors have been delamped to provide minimum for safety and effective operations. Gasoline; car pools for staff are encouraged, School Bus Routes have been revised to minimize gas usage. Several audits of lighting, heating and insulation have been conducted and recommendations will be presented at a later date.

With the ever increasing costs of oil, gas and electricity, energy costs will be responsible for uncontrollable increases in future town budgets.

Hanover High graduates have done very well this year in attaining their goals after high school. Most graduates seek advanced education and this year 66 percent (130 students) entered higher education. Four-year colleges predominate with 46 percent of the senior class attending some of the 250 four-year colleges to

which they were accepted. Others were accepted into 66 different two-year colleges and 17 percent of the class attend these institutions. Three percent are entering still other training programs equivalent to two-year colleges. Many graduates seek direct employment after high school and 23 percent of the total class was employed locally. Three percent entered the armed forces and another one percent entered the nursing profession. Among the graduates were eight students who completed all requirements in less than four years and chose to graduate thereby accelerating their educational program. The entire student body was enriched by the presence of exchange students from Sweden and Mexico. Two students received the National Merit Letter of Commendation and now attend Mt. Holyoke and Northeastern. Financial aid to help the students attend college is an increasing need at a time of escalating college costs; the Class of '79 received \$74,571. in aid for their freshman year. It is especially gratifying that \$19,915 was received from local sources — we thank the many citizens who worked so hard to raise this substantial sum to aid our graduates. Money was also given to former students to continue their education; \$13,250 was awarded from the Dr. Charles Hammond Fund for this purpose.

Interscholastic Athletics and intramural sports continue to help hundreds of young people. Intramurals at Sylvester School and the junior high are divided into three ten week sessions. The coaching and officiating are provided by teachers at both schools. At Sylvester, students have the opportunity to participate in bataca, floor hockey, football, kickball, soccer and basketball. Approximately 55 percent of the students participate. The Junior High offers softball, track, field hockey, football, cross country, water polo and bowling. Approximately 40 percent of the students participate. In interscholastic athletics, 484 high schoolers competed on 25 teams representing Hanover in the South Shore League Title. The Boys Tennis Team qualified for state tournament play. Twenty-eight girls participated on the track team — this is a growing sport — and there is interest in girls soccer and more cheerleading groups. All junior high interscholastic sports were dropped this year because of lessening competition in the League and for financial reasons. As of the submission of this report, all four winter sports teams; Girls Gymnastics, Girls Basketball, Boys Basketball and Ice Hockey are leading in their league play.

The Hanover School Department tries to provide for a variety of community/education needs at times when the facilities are not used for the statemandated, regular educational programs for children. The Extended Opportunities Program provides late afternoon and evening courses primarily for adults. For the school year ending June, 1,046 people had registered for a variety of courses with 1,008 paying tuition to cover much of the costs of these programs. From students preparing to take college entrance tests to 38 senior citizens who took 12 different practical arts, 5 different enrichment and one business improvement course, there were a total of 960 citizens who benefited from these programs. Some 86 nonresidents also took courses paying a higher tuition rate. Most popular programs are the 14 practical arts courses and physical education activities followed closely by enrichment courses and business courses. The fallwinter program already has 1,085 registrants with those people profiting from nearly fifty courses including some 16 practical arts offerings, 4 business courses, 9 enrichment courses, 6 physical education activities, elementary gymnastics in three levels, driver education and piano. The college preparation has attracted 100 students. Courses are changed to meet the expressed interests of residents of all ages.

The Hanover Vacation School is another program designed to help Hanover residents of school age during the summer months. The total enrollment in 1979 was 471, up from the previous year's total of 428. About half (209) take an academic program designed primarily to improve basic subjects so the students either will not have to repeat or will be stronger in their subject next year. Reading and Math are stressed for the elementary grades with English, Math, Science and Social Studies, all courses which must be passed to graduate, offered for secondary school students. Enrichment courses continue to provide a summer outlet for the youth of the town and complement the Recreation Program which also works effectively. Some 66 students were enrolled in the Special Needs offerings designed to carry over and improve skills for these children at a time when they can lose part of their previous year's gain. Financially, for both the Extended Opportunities and Vacation School programs, tuitions plus state reimbursement for parts of these programs reimburse the town for much of the budgeted amount.

The schools provide still other services beyond the regular programs for the community. This includes the two lunches per week offered Golden Agers at the junior high. Average attendance is about 80. Some 250 young people use the schools for Scout meeting places. Over 500 soccer players, 400 basketball and 1,000 softball and baseball players use school buildings and fields during nonschool hours. Many civic and parent groups meet at the schools and the facilities are rented to still other groups for special functions. All these activities are attempts by the Department to make educational offerings meet public needs and to keep a large town resource, the school property, serving the public as often as possible.

No report would be complete without thanks to the hundreds of people who have helped the students and the schools this year. Since there is always a danger of missing an important group by singling out specific individuals, we simply say thank you for all your support — you know how much you have helped and we have appreciated it.

1979 Report of the Hanover Planning Board

Continuing a trend now several years old, residential construction was below that of the previous year and new subdivision plans seem to be in a state of limbo. For this reason, normal activity was much less than in an average year.

Other areas, however, at least partly made up for the residential hiatus. Special Site Hearing were held for several businesses and applications for expansions in the Emergency Zone District took up some time. This year, as for the past two or three, business activities have substantially outnumbered residential.

Roger A. Leslie, Sr., a member of this Board resigned after six years of diligent service, following his election to the Board of Public Works. This Board is pleased that the Town continues to enjoy his service. Mr. T. Todd Andersen was appointed to fill the vacancy.

The Emergency Zone District expires this May and a multitude of final reports, studies, etc. have arrived with the end of the year. The Board will now concentrate on writing and presenting new zoning proposals to be voted on at the Annual Town Meeting in May 1980. Because these proposals will be far reaching and of vital importance for both the immediate and long range future of Hanover, we urgently request that all voters make an effort to inform themselves of the proposals before the Town Meeting. This Board, in turn, hopes to present as much information as possible to as many people as possible in advance.

Tax Collector Report — 1979

This figure is lower than the collection figure for 1978 for two reasons: First, the real estate tax rate was lowered \$1.20 per thousand; and Secondly, the real estate bills were mailed two months late, which necessitated a date of January 2, 1980 as the last day for payment of same. Therefore, some collections which normally would have taken place during 1979, were not made until 1980.

The residents' calm acceptance of the late issuing of the real estate bills, and their prompt payment was most helpful to this office during a very difficult period. The cooperation from all was greatly appreciated.

My thanks to the Town Officials, Municipal Departments, co-workers, my Deputy, and the resident taxpayers for all their invaluable assistance throughout this past year.

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Report of the Visiting Nurse

To the Selectmen, the Hanover Visiting Nurse Association, and the Citizens of Hanover.

This agency is certified (yearly) as a Home Health Agency and offers Nursing (bedside), Physical Therapy, Home Health Aide, and Health Supervision to residents of Hanover.

Payments for services are most times paid by Medicare, Medicaid, Blue Cross, private insurance companies, and various other agencies.

A total of 2,233 visits were made this year of which there were: 776 Nursing, 94 Physical Therapy, 5 Home Health Aides, 1,217 Health Supervision, 41 Case Assessments and 100 Unclassified.

Seventeen Well Child Conferences were held this year; 198 children attended and received physicals, immunizations, and health counselling. Appointments may be made by calling the nurses' office. Dr. Mary E. Butterworth is the attending physician.

Twelve Senior Citizen Conferences were held with 307 attending. These conferences are held the last Wednesday of each month at the Grange Hall from 1:00 — 3:30 P.M. for all residents over sixty years of age.

The Adult Blood Pressure Conferences are held the third Friday of each month at the nurses' office from 1:00 — 3:30 P.M. for all below 60 years of age. A total of 131 were seen this year at conferences.

The evening Blood Pressure Conference was held the first Monday of the month from 7:00-8:30 P.M. A total of 120 attended these conferences. During 1980 the conference will be held every other month.

One hundred and one courtesy calls were made to new babies and thirty-three cards were sent to families when the birth was a repeat.

The nurse assisted at the Flu Clinic at the Grange Hall in November.

The nurses have attended in-service programs, lectures, and seminars throughout the year to keep up with the latest trends in Public Health Nursing.

The nurses' office is located in the new addition of the Town Hall. Telephone hours are 8:30-9:00 A.M. and 1:00-1:30 P.M. Monday through Friday. Messages may be left on the answering machine 24 hours a day.
