

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

To the Citizens of Hanover:

We respectfully submit the One Hundred and Twenty-Ninth Annual Report of the Officers and Committees of the Town of Hanover for the year ended December 31, 1981.

We are once again using a drawing by John Nutter, whose portrait appears at the front of the book. This is the fourth cover showing a familiar scene in the Town. We sincerely thank Mr. Nutter for sharing his fine talent with us.

During 1981 several of our citizens who had served on various Boards and Commissions died. They will be missed. Our sympathy goes to their families. Among them are Richard Bradford, Melvin Clarke, Albert Nielsen, Thomas Tindale, Ray Hill.

Sgt. James Cruise retired from the Police Department after many years as Police Officer, Sergeant and Prosecutor. Officer Allan Jones also retired after years of faithful service. Charles Inglis retired from his position as Foreman at the Transfer Station after serving many years. We wish them all many happy and healthy years of retirement.

Gillis, Council on Aging; Elaine M. Londergan, Council on Aging; Rev. Lawrence J. Chane, Council on Aging; Lois P. Heim, Chairman, Conservation Commission; Marjorie H. Abbot, Conservation Commission; Carl Arlanson, Conservation Commission; James Harney, Conservation Commission; Alice R. Abbott, Personnel Board; Anthony J. Speranzo, Cable Television Study Committee; G. Elliott Robinson, Representative to North River Commission; Philip Beal, Alternate Representative to North River Commission; Donald E. The services of all of these officials is greatly appreciated and we hesitate to single out any for special tribute lest we diminish the service of all. However, we would like to give a special note of appreciation to Marjorie Abbot and Lois Heim for their time spent with the Conservation Commission.

We were sorry to learn of the transfer of Father Lawrence Chane to Brockton, and wish him many years of happiness in his new post.

In 1981, the Board settled a two year contract with the Police Department with the assistance of labor consultants Kingston and Garrett.

John Ashton helped us with the transition period of the new Town Administrator/Accountant. We are grateful to him for postponing his retirement to give us this assistance. This has been a significant year for the Housing for the Elderly program. The Cushing Residence Elderly Complex was completed and is now called home by many happy citizens of our Town.

The American Legion Elderly Housing Complex off Spring Street should be completed and occupied early in 1982.

We continue to be unfairly assessed by the MBTA and were disappointed that Governor King vetoed the bill that would have given us some relief from this large addition to our tax burden. Under Proposition 2½ the Board has worked to continue as many town functions as possible with the decrease in revenue, and we will continue to work in this direction.

As required every five years, the borders of the town were perambulated with an official of the abutting town. This was done on all borders with Norwell, Pembroke, Hanson and Rockland. This year marked the twentiety anniversary of the establishment of the Emergency Communications Center. This service was started on May 26, 1961. We are grateful for the foresight of those responsible for its establishment. That Committee was made up of Andrew Baker, Avito diCicco, Joseph Ingle and Henry Newcomb.

JOURNAL OF ANNUAL TOWN MEETING HELD ON MAY 4, 1981

The Annual Town Meeting at Hanover High School was called to order by George H. Lewald, Moderator at 8:20 P.M., Monday, May 4, 1981, with 497 voters present.

The Town Clerk reported that the Warrant had been served and a return made as required by the Town By-Laws.

Reverend W. Roscoe Riley offered the invocation which was followed by the pledge to the flag.

The Moderator, George H. Lewald introduced himself and the members of the Advisory Committee. He explained that the budget had been prepared according to requirements as laid forth by Proposition 2½. He also explained how Proposition 2½ is different from most state laws which are prepared by the state legislators in that Proposition 2½ was Question 2 of the November 4th ballot and was voted on favorably by the state voters. He outlined the procedure to be followed at the meeting in accordance with the Town By-Laws.

ARTICLE 1

To see if the Town will accept the reports of the Officers and Committees as printed in the Town Report, or take any other action relative thereto.

VOTED UNANIMOUSLY: That the Town so do.

ARTICLE 2

To hear reports of the Committees and act thereon, or take any other action relative thereto.

VOTED UNANIMOUSLY: That the Town so do.

A TRIBUTE TO ALFRED J. NIELSEN

There is hardly a person present at this Meeting who did not know Al Nielsen; and certainly everyone in Hanover has been affected much for the better by his efforts.

Al is best remembered for his 17 years service on the Planning Board . . . most of them as Chairman. He was one of those instrumental in establishing our Zoning By-Laws. At the time, this was a highly controversial issue and not everyone believed it a wise move. The years have proven Al and his co-workers were entirely correct and foresighted. Hanover would be a vastly different Town today but for those early regulations.

Al served many other official functions. He was a member of the Drainage Committee and the Board of Appeals. Unofficially, he was an advisor and consultant to virtually every Board and Official in Hanover at one time or another.

He was one of those rarities, a Hanover native. Whether you agreed with him or not, you certainly had to respect him. As a person, we remember him best as a dedicated family man and true friend. In many ways, Al was a "character" in the finest sense of the word. His unique use (and, yes mis-use) of the King's English is something we all treasured and miss today.

While we miss him, we also are grateful that we were able to be here at the same time. We owe Al a debt of gratitude which can never be paid in full. He will never be forgotten by those who were fortunate enough to know him. Al would have been the first to say a lengthy tribute is not the measure of a man. For this reason, we know these few and inadequate words speak volumes for him.

We respectfully move that this Tribute be placed in the minutes of the 1981 Annual Town Meeting and a copy presented to his family.

The Board of Selectmen desire to pay tribute to four gentlemen who since 1974 have given much to the youth of our community. These gentlemen are the founders and police officers of the Hanover Police Boys Club which has become a model in many communities, in fact, has received in the last few months, nationwide recognition for their efforts. They started in 1974 with a group of 30-35 boys who traveled once a week to the Norwell Police Station where there were facilities there for weight lifting. Due to the building of new facilities of our Department of Public Works and then the availability of the old carriage shed to the rear of the Town Hall, they requested of the Board of Selectmen in 1976, as to its availability and if they could have the use of that at that time. They spent several thousand dollars through campaigns, bingos, automobile sales etc; they did anything to raise and appropriate the available cash so that they could have a home for their boys club. In 1979 they came back and requested permission from the Board of Selectmen to construct a building, measuring approximately 40' x 60' to the rear of that building so they could further expand those facilities. At that time the membership of that club consisted of over 300 boys and girls of Hanover. We, with some reservations, gave our approval with some stipulation that architectually the building would become the property of the Town of Hanover and they started to raise funds to construct that. They initially raised \$25,000.00 and along with a news release by Channel 7 they obtained donations from throughout the state for construction of that building. I believe the estimated value today is \$100,000.00 not including the equipment which is presently in there. There are showers and I understand that a hot tub is going in, a sauna and the program has expanded from karate and weight lifting to boxing to wrestling and body building. We have a young man here in Hanover just recently finished 3rd in the Eastern Finals in body building. This past Sunday our Karate Club competed in Stoughton and came away with 7 out of 11 championships and we've also had a Pee-Wee Midget finalist in the Golden Gloves in California last year who unfortunately lost in the finals. I would like to ask that the President of the Boys Club, Thomas Hayes; Vice-President, John Lingley; Treasurer-Secretary, Paul Lunetta and Karate Instructor, Gary Young please come forward. (The four officers presented themselves to the podium). On behalf of the Board of Selectmen and the citizens of Hanover, we wish to present to each one of these officers a Distinguished Citizen Service Award in recognition of your dedication and efforts for the youth of Hanover through the Hanover Police Boys Club given this 4th Day of May, 1981, with grateful and heartful thanks.

Since last years Town Meeting, the Hanover Town Government Study Committee has continued in its efforts of reviewing various town government organizations with efficiency and economy in mind. We are pleased with the implementa-

tion of the new Town Accountant/Administrator position, and are of the opinion that it has, and will continue to be, of great benefit to the Board of Selectmen, other boards and committees and you the citizen.

This year the Town Government Study Committee has prepared a By-Law entitled "Capital Improvement Planning Committee" for your consideration. With the passage of Proposition 2½, and as the physical assets of the Town of Hanover age, it is the unanimous opinion of this Committee that the Town must better plan its future expenditures for maintenance, repair and capital acquisitions. Acceptance of this Article will set in motion a five member committee whose sole purpose will be to thoroughly study all planned major Town expenditures and establish priorities on a year to year basis. Such planning should enable the Town, over the long term, to reduce costs through group purchasing. Furthermore, by identifying needs in a timely manner, the ability of the Town to seek Federal and State reimbursements will be enhanced.

Concerning members of this Committee, it was indeed with great regret that we recently received the resignation of Chester K. Tom. This Committee wishes him every success in his new position as a member of the Advisory Committee.

Finally, we would take this opportunity to extend our thanks to all those in Town government with whom we have worked this past year. Your efforts in our behalf are sincerely appreciated. This report is submitted as an ongoing report of progress.

REPORT OF THE HANOVER CABLE TELEVISION ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Pursuant to Article 14 at last October's Special Town Meeting, the Board of Selectmen appointed a Cable Television Advisory Committee consisting of Gerald Malnati, Anthony Speranzo, Steven Parsons, Guy Evans and myself.

Cable television is one of the fastest growing industries in this country. This is evident to anyone who reads a newspaper or a magazine and by the number of large corporations investing big money into Cable. Boston and many surrounding communities are about to or have awarded franchises. This has been made possible by sophisticated electronic technology and communication satellites. A large number of programming services both basic service and pay-TV are now available, with more being proposed. These include the so-called super stations from Atlanta, Chicago

and Los Angeles, a 24-hour news channel, an all sports channel, Home Box Office, the Movie Channel, and list goes on. You can read about these services, but none are available to Hanover residents, only a limited over the air subscription channel. There are also benefits to the town, all the schools would be interconnected with a video channel and an equipment package is given to the town to upgrade the High School facilities. Such a system would link the entire town with television video and data circuits and the uses are endless. The technology is here.

Some nearby towns have already awarded franchises, they are Weymouth, Quincy, Plymouth, Kingston and Marshfield. The towns nearer Hanover are only beginning to think about Cable TV, the franchising process takes time.

There is no cost to the town, private companies make a capital investment in the town, they wire the streets and install equipment. Their desire is to get subscribers for their services. Our objective is to select the best qualified applicant.

On March 16th of this year, the Selectmen took our recommendation and voted to begin the franchising process. This process is governed by state law and is overseen by a state cable commission. Applications for the cable license must be filed at the town hall by June 24th. Then the Committee reviews them and writes the town's requirements in a report called the RFP. The original applicants then amend their applications to meet the towns needs, that would occur in December. They would then be reviewed, a public hearing held where each applicant would present his case, the Committee would make a recommendation and the Board of Selectmen would make the final decision by March 16, 1982. Then it takes 6 to 8 months to get the final license prepared, before construction can begin. So you might expect to see cable television in your home by June 1983. If you have any questions about Cable Television, or want to discuss cable services and the town's needs, everyone and anyone is invited to a public hearing at the Town Hall on Wednesday, May 20th at 7:45 P.M. This includes any town official. Two companies who have indicated they will apply in Hanover will speak and answer questions. Or you can contact myself or a member of the committee.

REPORT OF THE BY-LAW STUDY COMMITTEE

The current compilation of the existing bylaws of the Town which the By-Law study Committee has been working on for the past several years was approved by the voters at the 1980 Annual Town Meeting and by the Attorney General of the Commonwealth on August 18, 1980.

Included are the Wetlands Protection and Treasurer/Accountant By-laws and several corrections in the text and numbering of others.

Since there are still modifications necessary to update some of the By-laws and requests that the committee consider new ones for future presentation to the voters, we ask that the Town accept this interim report as a Report of Progress of the By-law Study Committee.

REPORT OF THE HANOVER COMPUTER STUDY COMMITTEE

The Hanover Computer Study Committee was appointed in June 1980. Following this appointment by the Board of Selectmen, the three member committee met to determine what the scope of the requested undertaking was. It was defined as:

The scope of the undertaking by the Committee is:

- to study and identify what the functional candidates are for computer systems development and automation within the Town of Hanover government structure (particular attention is to be directed towards financial areas, i.e., "follow the cash");
- to inventory both existing computer equipment and applications in use within the Town;
- to include in the study all Town departments, boards, Committees and government bodies; and
- to report to the Board of Selectmen the results of the study.

Upon presentation of the aforementioned scope and objectives to the Board of Selectmen, this Committee reviewed their written confirmation as to direction altering the areas included to 11 — "core" financial bodies. Their response was the catalyst for the newly appointed Committee to organize and commence with the study/ analysis in December 1980.

The Committee proceeded with the survey issuance, return and analysis. This was followed with a series of key interviews with survey responders to amplify on the survey information and provided additional source material for our final report.

The final report to the Board of Selectmen is near completion and will be presented prior to the summer. That report should fulfill the undertaking of our Committee.

This report is to be considered a report of progress for the Computer Study Committee.

Moved that the Town vote to amend the Hanover Personnel By-Laws as follows:

Page 1, Paragraph 2, Persons covered

Page 1, Item 2, Paragraph 1, Delete and substitute:

The Plan shall apply to all persons compensated by the Town except those persons elected by popular vote or under the direction and control of the School Committee, represented by a recognized bargaining agent, or by contract with the Board of Selectmen.

Page 1, Item 3. Personnel Board, Delete and substitute:

The Plan shall be administered by a Personnel Board consisting of five unpaid members to be appointed by the Selectmen. These members shall not be employees, elected officials or officials in any other capacity in Town.

Page 1, Item 4. Duties of Personnel Board

Paragraph (c), - Delete and substitute:

Personnel records consisting of personnel history, job classification, rates of pay, etc. of all Town employees shall be made available to the Personnel Board, but maintained by the cognizant department.

Paragraph (f) Delete and substitute:

The Personnel Board may add positions to the Plan or reclassify existing positions, such action to be referred to the next Annual Town Meeting for action

Paragraph (g) Delete and substitute:

The Board shall, within four (4) weeks following the annual appointment of new members, meet and organize by electing a chairman. A quorum at a board meeting shall consist of three (3) members, and a majority vote shall be necessary on any matter upon which the Board is authorized to act.

Page 2, Item 5. Effective Date, Delete and substitute:

The Plan and any amendments thereto shall become effective upon acceptance by the Town. The Classifications of positions and pay schedules shall take effect on July 1, 1981 following acceptance and all subsequent anniversaries shall be on July 1 provided the individual in a given classification and step was employed prior to September 1 of that fiscal year.

Item 7. Increase, Delete and sbustitute:

Progressions through the pay schedules, shall be on the basis of merit as recommended by the Department Head and approved by the Personnel Board.

Item 8. Transfers and Promotions

Paragraph (a) Delete and substitute:

When an employee is promoted to a higher rated job, it shall be at the minimum of the job pay schedule or at the next pay rate above the present salary, whichever is higher. If an employee should be transferred to a lower classification, it shall be paid at the step rate based upon the length of service on the previous job, unless a higher step rate is recommended by the Department Head.

- Page 3. Item 9. New Personnel and Notification of Vacancies Paragraphs (a) and (b) Delete and substitute:
 - (a) New Employees shall start at the minimum of the pay schedule for the job classiciations, except that on the recommendation of a department head, supported by written and/or oral evidence of special reasons or circumstances satisfactory to the Board, the Board may authorize an entrance at a higher rate than the minimum rate for a position.
 - (b) The Personnel Board and the Town Clerk shall be notified in writing by the head of any Department covered under this By-Law of any vacancy, or new position, full-time or part-time. Job Description, hourly pay rate, and department shall be posted by Town Clerk on Town Hall bulletin board and Selectmen's office within three (3) working days from receipt of the notification from the Department Head. Such vacancy shall also be advertised at least once in a local newspaper.
- Page 3, Item 10, Hours, Vacations, and Leaves for Full Time Employees (Insert following introductory paragraph:)
 - A. For those occupying positions designated as clerical, 35 hours per week.
 - B. For those occupying positions designated as production, 40 hours per week.
 - C. For those occupying positions designated as administrative, hours necessary for proper administration in fulfillment of the work and responsibilities of the department.
- Page 3, Item 10. B. Vacations, Delete Paragraphs 1-4, inc. and substitute following:

An employee shall be entitled to an annual paid vacation. The time for taking them shall be scheduled by the department head. Vacation period shall be determined as follows:

- 1. Employees employed June 1 with 20 weeks or more employment in the aggregate in the twelve months prior to June of vacation year, but less than 30 weeks: 1 WEEK.
- 2. Employees employed June 1 with 30 weeks or more employment in the aggregate in the twelve previous months prior to June 1 of vacation year: 2 WEEKS.
- 3. Employees employed June 1 with five (5) years in the aggregate, shall receive 3 WEEKS of vacation.
- 4. Employees employed June 1 with ten (10) years in the aggregate, shall receive 4 WEEKS of vacation.
- 5. An employee who does not exhaust earned vacation time during the year will forfeit the time.

- Page 4, Item 10, C. Sick Pay, Delete paragraphs 1,2,3, substitute following:
 - 1. Sick pay shall be at the rate of one day for each completed month of the full-time employment accumulating to 120 working days. At the discretion of the department head, a certificate from a duly licensed physician may be required to receive payment for lost time.
 - 2. An employee who is injured within the scope of employment and who is receiving Workmen's Compensation benefits or other comparable benefits may elect to be paid accrued sick leave to make up the difference between the compensation benefits and the current base wage. Supplemental weekly payments shall be charged to sick leave and shall be discontinued when sick leave benefits have been used up.
 - 3. An employee, upon normal retirement or death, shall be compensated at a rate of fifty percent (50%) of unused sick leave. This payment shall be made in cash.
- Page 4, Item 10, D. Leave of Absence, Delete and substitute following:

 All leaves of absence shall be without compensation and at the discretion of the department head, except for Jury Duty, Funeral Leave,

 Military Leave, and Maternity Leave to the extent provided as follows:
 - Jury Duty
 An employee called for Jury Duty shall be paid by the Town an amount equal to the difference between the compensation paid for a normal working period and the amount paid by the Court, excluding allowance for travel.
 - 2. Funeral Leave
 All employees will be entitled to 3 consecutive calendar days off
 without loss of pay in the event of death in the immediate family
 of said employee: namely, husband, wife, children, mother, father
 or mother and father-in-law of said employee.
 - E. Military Leave, change to
 - 3. Military Leave, delete entire paragraph and substitute following: Regular full-time employees with more than one year continuous employment by the Town next prior to the time of performing the service herein referred to, who are required to report for temporary summer or like period of training in the military forces of the Nation or the Commonwealth, shall be paid an amount equal to the difference between compensation for the normal working period of two weeks and the amount paid for military training. An employee on written approval, may combine the military leave with the regular vacation period. In order to receive this difference from the Town, the employee must first file copies of the military pay vouchers with the Town Accountant's Office.
 - 4. Maternity Leave
 - Regular full-time employees with more than one year continuous employment by the Town prior to the time of a desired maternity leave may choose to receive payment for the leave in the amount not to exceed accumulated sick leave. All other employees, whether paid or unpaid, shall not be eligible for paid maternity leave. Maternity leaves shall not exceed three calendar months. Leaves are granted to a request to the department head and approval of the Personnel Board.

Page 5, Item 11, Overtime, delete paragraph (b) and substitute the following:

- (b) Production Overtime will be paid at the rate of time and one-half for hours worked beyond 40 hours in one week.
- Page 5, Item 13, Classification and Schedules (Delete and replace as Item 20). Item 14. Appeals (change to 13).

Item 16. Probationary Employees - Definition and Status (change to 15). Delete and substitute following:

15. Probationary Employees – Definition and Status

The period or probationary employment shall be ninety days. If no physical condition exists which would prevent employment, and the employee has proven satisfactory in other respects, permanent employment will begin on the ninety-first day retroactive to the first day of employment

Item 17. Part-Time Employees - Definition and Status (change to 16) Delete Paragraph 1 and 2 and substitute following: A part-time employee is one who would not be expected to regularly work a normal week, or, if working a normal work week, would not be expected to do so for a period in excess of ninety days. No employee working a normal work week may remain in a part-time status in excess of ninety days without the approval of the Personnel Board, and then for a period not to exceed an additional ninety days. Permanent Part-time employees are those individuals who regularly work 20 hours or less per week on a permanent basis. They will be eligible for all benefits of full-time employees, on a pro rated basis. That is the total annual hours worked, divided by 52.

Page 6, Item 18. Validity (Change to 17)

Item 19. Termination of Employment (Change to 18)

Page 7, Paragraph (e) Delete and substitute following:

(e) An employee who resigns without two weeks' notice shall be entitled to no termination pay. An employee who gives two weeks notice shall receive 2 weeks pay whether or not the employee is permitted to work the two week period.

(Delete sub-paragraphs 1., 2., 3.)

Delete (f) and (g) and substitute following:

- (f) Hospital-Surgical Insurance is cancelled as of the end of the month worked. An individual may then continue the policy at his or her own expense.
- (g) An employee's Life Insurance ceases 31 days after employment terminates. Each terminating employee has this 31 day period in which, without evidence of insurability, insurance may be converted to any form of individual insurance, except Term Insurance.

The gross total lot coverage, including structures, parking and service area, storage areas, disposal areas, etc. shall not exceed 60% of the lot area. These coverage requirements shall also apply to any use wherein products are displayed or sold outside of a structure in whole or in part.
- When the use is for general retailing of goods within a structure, the maximum coverages shall be 15% for all structures and 60% total coverage.
- 3. When the use is for light industrial, general office, warehousing and similar low-traffic uses, the maximum coverages shall be 17½% for all structures and 60% total coverage.
- 4. For uses which are a combination of the above, the coverages shall be calculated on a pro rata basis.

A favorable report was read by the Planning Board

ARTICLE 28

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Hanover Zoning By-Law by eliminating in their entirety paragraphs Section VII, A., 2. and Section VII, A., 3. and replacing with the following:

In any case, heights permitted in this section (VII, A.) shall not exceed the limits imposed by Chapter 756 of the General Laws of 1960 and any more restrictive amendments thereto.

ARTICLE 34

To see if the Town will vote to establish, under the provisions of MGL Chapter 40, Section 8-D an Historical Commission of the Town of Hanover for the purpose and with the rights and duties provided by law, to be composed of five members, appointed by the Board of Selectmen for terms of three years, except that the initial appointment shall be 2 members for one year, 2 members for two years and 1 member for three years.

VOTED UNANIMOUSLY: That the Town so do.

ARTICLE 35

To see if the Town will vote raise and appropriate or appropriate from available funds a sum of money for the purpose of purchasing or taking by eminent domain certain parcels of land for water supply purposes.

VOTED UNANIMOUSLY: That the Town so do.

A motion was made to reconsider Article 3.

A motion was made to have this a secret ballot but had no support.

A motion to reconsider Article 3 was defeated 87 in the affirmative and 156 in the negative.

ARTICLE 39

To see if the Town will vote to amend the By-Laws of the Town of Hanover, Chapter 6-8, Junk and Car Disposal Law, Section 2. by adding the word "unregistered" after the word "disabled" in the first sentence of that Section, so Section 2 reads as follows:

No junked, disabled or unregistered motor vehicle, or parts thereof, shall be stored, parked or placed on any premises unless the same shall be within a building or area unexposed to view of the public abutters, or within an area licensed under Chapter 140, Sections 55 to 57 of the General Laws for the storage of same by licensed junk dealers and automobile dealers.

Moved that the Town vote to amend the By-Laws of the Town of Hanover, Chapter 6-8, Junk & Car Disposal Law Section 2 by adding the words "or more than one unregistered" after the word disabled in the first sentence of that section so Section 2 reads as follows:

No junked, disabled, or more than one unregistered motor vehicle, or parts thereof, shall be stored, parked or placed on any premises unless the same shall be within a building or area unexposed to view of the public abutters, or within an area licensed under Chapter 140 Sections 55 to 57 of the General Laws for the storage of same by licensed junk dealers and automobile dealers.

VOTED UNANIMOUSLY: That the Town so do.

ARTICLE 40

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Town of Hanover by-laws by adding to Chapter 6-11, Hawkers, Peddler, Salesmen and Transient Vendors, Section 3., the following:

Persons delivering advertising material or newspapers door to door shall not leave such material in or on mail boxes in such a way as to prevent or interfere with the delivery of mail, or without permission of the owner, nor shall they leave such material on the ground, in driveways, or in such a way as to cause a littering problem.

Motion to pass over this Article was defeated.

Motion to accept this Article SO VOTED UNANIMOUSLY:

(This by-law was rejected by the Attorney General)

ARTICLE 41

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or appropriate from available funds, the sum of \$750.00 to reimburse the Treasurer of the County of Plymouth for land damages order by the Superior Court pursuant to the land taking under County Commissioners Decree No. 1434, Summer Street, Hanover, Parcel 2, or take any other action relative thereto.

Moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 for this purpose. **VOTED UNANIMOUSLY:** That the Town so do.

ARTICLE 42

To see if the Town will vote to amend a vote of a Special Town Meeting on October 14, 1980, in which an Appropriation Limitation for 1981 was unanimously approved at an amount of \$59,235.00 by striking from said vote the amount of \$59,235.00 and inserting therein as the Appropriations Limitations for 1981 the sum of \$64,797.00 VOTED UNANIMOUSLY: That the Town so do.

ARTICLE 43

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or appropriate from available funds a sum of \$7,500.00 to be added to the amount appropriated under the Board of Health Expenses to continue the full coverage of aerial spraying for mosquitos.

Motion to pass over this Article was defeated.

Moved that the Town appropriate from available funds the sum of \$7,500.00 to be added to the amount appropriated under the Board of Health Expenses to continue the full coverage of aerial spraying for mosquitos.

VOTED: That the Town so do.

ARTICLE 44

To see if the Town will vote to amend the By-Laws of the Town of Hanover by adding the following article:

Capital Improvement Planning Committee

Section 1.

A Committee, to be known as the "Capital Improvement Planning Committee" shall be established, composed of one (1) member of the Advisory Committee appointed by and from it, four (4) additional members to be appointed by the Moderator, with the approval of the majority of the Selectmen. The members from the Advisory Committee shall be appointed for one year terms.

Initially one (1) of the other members shall be appointed for one (1) year, two (2) for two (2) years and one (1) for three (3) years; thereafter each other member shall be appointed for a three (3) year term. Vacancies shall be filled for unexpired terms by the Committee.

The Committee shall annually prepare a Capital Improvement Plan for recommendation to and for use by the Advisory Committee, the voters, other town boards and officials in their deliberations. The Committee shall publish such report or a summary thereof in a suitable manner and deposit the original with the Town Clerk.

Moved that the Town so do and the numbering of it be No. 4-13.

VOTED UNANIMOUSLY

ARTICLE 45

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Hanover Zoning By-Law and Zoning Map of the Town of Hanover so as to change the following described area from a Limited Industrial District to a Commercial District, thereby extending the Commercial District that exists along Washington Street to include the existing Limited Industrial District and designate said area on the Zoning Map:

Beginning at a point three hundred and fifty feet northwest of the intersection of the centerlines of Washington Street and Henry's Lane on the centerline of Henry's Lane; thence in a northwesterly direction along the centerline of Henry's Lane to the point where the centerline of Henry's Lane intersects the boundary of the adjacent Residence District; then in a southerly direction along the boundary of the adjacent Residence District; thence in a southeasterly direction along the boundary adjacent Residence District to a point on the boundary of the adjacent Commercial District and three hundred and fifty feet from the centerline of Washington Street; and then in a northwesterly direction along the boundary of the Commercial District and parallel to the centerline of

Washington Street to the beginning.

A favorable report was read by the Planning Board.

A motion was made to Accept the Article. After much discussion a motion was made to move the question thereby cutting off further debate

SO VOTED UNANIMOUSLY

Motion to accept this Article was defeated SO VOTED

ARTICLE 46

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Hanover Zoning By-Law as follows:

- 1. Add to Section VI, F.1 a new sub-paragraph to read:
 - h. In Limited Industrial Districts abutting Commercial Districts, any uses permitted in a Commercial District, Paragraph E., subject to the restrictions therein contained.

An unfavorable report was read by the Planning Board.

Motion to Pass Over this Article SO VOTED

ARTICLE 47

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning By-Laws by revising the Hanover, Mass. Zoning Map, and so note on the Zoning Map, by changing from a Residential District, to a Commercial District. Described as follows:

1 Parcel of Land, bounded by Hanover and Circuit Streets, described as Parcel 26, Plan 43, Assessors Plans, Town of Hanover, Mass. Frontage on Hanover Street approximately 82.41'. and on Circuit Street approximately 162.38', said parcel being a corner lot.

An unfavorable report was read by the Planning Board.

Motion to Pass Over this Article SO VOTED

ARTICLE 48

To see if the Town will vote to change Henry's Lane from a public way to a pedestrian way from its junction at Washington Street to its junction with Curtis Road, and to block the pedestrian way to vehicular traffic.

Motion to Pass Over this Article SO VOTED

ARTICLE 49

To see if the Town will accept as a public way the following private way, with the bounds and measurement thereon, as filed with the Town Clerk, Industrial Way extending from King Street.

We move that the Town so do subject to the abutters of such ways indemnifying the Town from any damages as the result of acceptance and to execute the indemnity agreement to that effect.

VOTED UNANIMOUSLY: That the Town so do.

ARTICLE 50

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the leasing of a parcel of land adjacent to the Walnut Hill Water Standpipe to the Eastern Utilities Associates for the purpose of housing communications equipment for the Eastern Edison Companies, said lease not to exceed ninety-nine years, require no expenditure of Town funds and provide indemnification of the Town from any liabilities resulting therefrom, or take any other action relative thereto.

VOTED UNANIMOUSLY: That the Town so do.

ARTICLE 51

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Town of Hanover By-Laws Chapter 6-11 Hawkers, Peddlers Salesmen and Transient Vendors, Section 2., by deleting "of five dollars (\$5.00)" and inserting the word "license" before "fee". The Section would now read:

No person shall hawk, peddle or barter any goods, or merchandise within the

limits of the Town of Hanover, except as authorized by law, without first obtaining a license to do so from the Board of Selectmen upon payment of a license fee, provided, however, that this article shall not apply to any resident of the town who sells fruits and vegetables raised or produced by himself or his family, or fish which is obtained by his own labor or the labor of his family.

Moved that the Town so do and in Section 4 third and fourth lines; delete the words "the fee shall be five dollars (\$5.00) and insert in their place the words "and upon the payment of the license fee" and Section 4 shall read as follows:

Transient vendors shall not exhibit or sell any goods in the Town of Hanover until licensed by the Board of Selectmen or their designee, and upon the payment of the license fee; however, the Board of Selectmen may require, if deemed appropriate, a refundable deposit of up to two hundred dollars (\$200.00) to ensure the orderly, clean and responsible conduct of the transient vendor.

VOTED UNANIMOUSLY: That the Town so do.

JOURNAL OF SPECIAL TOWN MEETING HELD ON WEDNESDAY, SEPTEMBER 9, 1981

The Special Town Meeting at Hanover High School was called to order at 8:10 P.M., Wednesday, September 9, 1981, with 755 voters present.

The Moderator, George H. Lewald, asked that the Town Clerk record that the Warrant had been served and returned as required by the Town By-Laws. Mr. Lewald was pleased to comment on the large number of people who turned out for this Special Town Meeting.

Mr. Thomas Monaghan, Chairman of the Advisory Board explained about the procedure of the warrant and that certain items were crucial and how they would effect the Town under Proposition 2½.

A motion to change the order of the Articles, taking Article 22 out of order, did not carry.

ARTICLE 1

To hear reports of Committees empowered to report at a Special Town Meeting and act thereon, or take any other action relative thereto.

REPORT OF THE HANOVER COMPUTER STUDY COMMITTEE

The Hanover Computer Study Committee was appointed in June, 1980. As reported at the May, 1981 Annual Town Meeting, a final report of our findings and recommendations was in the process of being drafted and would be presented to the Board of Selectmen shortly after the Town Meeting.

As a report of progress since the Annual Town Meeting, this Committee's sixteen (16) page Town of Hanover, Computer/Automation Opportunity Report was completed and forwarded to the Board of Selectmen on May 27, 1981. This report is the direct result of this Committee's one-year study addressing the feasibility of computer and automation candidates and recommended direction in this area for the Town of Hanover.

As previously planned, this report covers most of the major organizational units within Town government. These included: Tax Collector's Office, Treasurer's Office, Town Accountant's Office, School Department, Board of Assessors, Department of Public Works, Board of Health, John Curtis Free Library, Registrar,

Town Clerk's Office and Board of Selectmen. The primary areas of study in these organizational units were the financial matters and to a lesser degree informational needs. The Committee believes that there was both a concrete direction and conclusions/recommendations presented in the Report.

We believe that the aforementioned Report fulfills the original scope and charge of our Committee. Pending review of our report with the Board of Selectmen (for which receipt was acknowledged via letter of June 8, 1981), this Committee remains on an inactive status.

This report is to be considered a report of progress for the Hanover Computer Study Committee.

- 1. Eliminate the present Section VI, E., and substitute in its place:
- E. Commercial District

The Commercial District is intended to provide consumer goods and services at retail and to provide goods and services for transients or tourists and to provide non-consumer goods and services.

- 1. Uses Permitted
 - a. Uses permitted in a Business District, Paragraph D., 1.
 - b. Museums
 - Gift shops and places for display or sale of handcrafts primarily within a structure.
- Uses permitted upon satisfactory demonstration to the Special Permit Granting Authority *(Hanover Planning Board) that such uses are appropriate to the specific site and that they will not create a nuisance and not cause a derogation of the intent of these by-laws by virtue of noise, odor, smoke, vibration, traffic generated or unsightliness.
 - a. Hotel, motels or lodging houses.
 - b. Restaurants or other places for serving food primarily within a structure but with incidental service not confined within said structure.
 - c. Salesrooms for bicycles, boats, farm equipment and similar equipment provided the display fo goods is primarily within a structure and exterior storage or display is confined to yards which are shielded from public view by fencing and vegetation.
 - d. Contractors' yards and storage yards provided all materials and equipment are stored within a structure or shielded from public view by fencing and vegetation.
 - e. Funeral Homes, mortuaries or crematories.
 - f. Passenger depots and terminals.
 - g. Utility structures and warehouses.
 - h. Theatres, halls, bowling alleys, skating rinks, clubs and other places of indoor amusement or assembly.
 - i. Agriculture, horticulture or floriculture.
- 3. Industrial right of way: Where access to land included in the Limited Industrial District is separated from a major thoroughfare by a Commercial District, an industrial right of way is permitted through the Commercial District.
- 4. Any use permitted in a Limited Industrial District (with the conditions specififed in Section VI, F., 2.) providing it can be satisfactorily demonstrated to the Special Permit Granting Authority *(Hanover Planning Board) that such uses are appropriate to the specific site and that they will not create a nuisance and not cause a derogation of the intent of these by-laws by virtue of noise, odor, smoke, vibration,

- traffic generated or unsightliness.
- 5. Uses permitted on approval of the Board of Selectmen in accordance with the provisions of Sections 9 and 11 of Chapter 40A of the General Laws and after Site Plan Approval as specified in Section VII, G. of these by-laws. Approval shall not be granted until it is satisfactorily demonstrated that said use is safe and appropriate for the specific site and that it will not create a nuisance by virtue of noise, odor, smoke, vibration, traffic generated or unsightliness. The Board of Selectmen may, at their discretion, delegate the Site Plan Hearing to the Special Permit Granting Authority *(Hanover Planning Board) or elect to hold a concurrent Hearing with the Authority *(Board).
 - a. Gasoline service stations, garages and repair shops and salesrooms for automobiles, provided that:
 - Repairs shall be limited to minor repairs and adjustments unless conducted within a structure.
 - 2. There shall be no storage of motor vehicles, appliances and equipment on the premises other than those in process of repair or awaiting delivery or in an enclosed structure.
 - 3. The area used to service, repair or store vehicles shall be paved to the satisfaction of the Board of Public Works.
 - 4. The provisions of Section VI, G., 5., shall apply to these uses.
 - 5. There shall be no other use on the lot excepting, with further approval of the Board of Selectmen, a secondary use may be permitted if it is closely related to and clearly incidental to the primary use under this Section (VI, E., 5., a.).
- 2; Eliminate Section VI, D., 2., b.
- 3. Add a new Section VI, D., 4., as follows:
 - 4. Uses permitted upon satisfactory demonstration to the Special Permit Granting Authority *(Hanover Planning Board) that such uses are appropriate to the specific site and that they will not create a nuisance and not cause a derogation to the intent of these by-laws by virtue of noise, odor, smoke, vibration, traffic generated or unsightliness.
 - a. Uses permitted in a Limited Industrial District (with the conditions specified in Section VI, F., 2.) providing they meet the conditions set forth immediately above.
 - b. Multiple-use buildings, containing one or more Business facilities and not to exceed one single-family residential unit which is secondary to the business utilization of the premises, subject to the determination by the Authority *(Board) that the lot frontage and size and the proposed residential floor area and set-backs either meet the requirements applicable in the Residence A District or are appropriate for the particular utilization proposed for approval.

In the reading of the motion, the words Hanover Planning Board were substituted in four (4) places where the words Special Permit Granting Authority appeared and the word Board substituted in two (2) places where the word Authority appeared.

VOTED UNANIMOUSLY: That the Town so do.

ARTICLE 9

To see if the Town will vote to close Washington Street to traffic at the intersection of Route 53, or take any other action relative thereto.

COUNCIL ON AGING

The Council on Aging hold regular monthly meetings on the first Friday of the month at the Grange Hall on Circuit Street at 2:00. These meetings are open to the public.

The Mini-bus is available to any Senior Citizen of Hanover who is fifty-nine Years of age or over; one needs only to contact the Council on Aging. The average ridership of the bus is approximately two hundred and fifty people a month. It is used to carry people to doctor appointments, shopping and to the hot meals that are served at the Hanover Junior High on Wednesdays and Fridays. In addition, the mini-bus carries people to monthly meetings and card parties.

Discount cards for Senior Citizens are still being issued by the Council. These may be used on Tuesdays at most stores and are also accepted on other days by some stores and restaurants in the town. However, it would be advisable to inquire about the availability of discounts.

In June 1978, Hanover joined the Old Colony Elder Services, Brockton. These provide qualifying Senior Citizens with home care service, home maker and/or chore services. They also furnish transportation to hospitals located in surrounding towns and Boston when necessary. For information regarding any of these services, please contact the Senior Aide at the Grange Hall.

Council members attend the seminars that are held in the southeastern section of Massachusetts.

We are in the process of refurbishing the interior so that we may soon have a drop-in-center where Senior Citizens might meet and share common interests. We now have an exercise class on Tuesday morning from ten to eleven o'clock followed by the Morning Out Group sponsored by the Council on Aging.

The program is sponsored by the Hanover Council On Aging.

The main purpose of the program is to keep all Senior Citizens in their own homes or with their families as long as possible with aid when necessary. Assistance and information can be obtained by calling 878-6361 from 9:00 A.M. to 12:00 Noon, Monday-Friday. One hour a day is spent on Outreach services to the community.

A total of 712 people have been served this year through visits, advice, and counseling and liaison work in the following categories: Home Care, Government Overview, Health Care, Social Security Increase, Welfare, Rest Homes, Nursing Homes, Legal Services, Housing, Taxes, and many other resources. Since most of the work is of a very personal nature, records are kept confidential.

Our greatest priority over the past several years, that of Elderly Housing in Hanover, is now a reality. Many people in need will benefit greatly from the services and assistance that will result from these programs. We are still participating in Old Colony Elderly Services. This program is available regardless of income on a sliding scale that fits almost everyone over 60 years of age. Our main project at this time is providing assistance in Energy needs - Oil or gas or other fuel. We are taking applications for processing and have thus far been quite successful.

We are committed to attend 12 Orientation Conferences, one each month, to keep us abreast of the many changes and developments occurring. We are informed of all bills proposed in the Massachusetts Legislature and in Washington that may affect Senior Citizens. Seminars were held four times this year throughout the Southeastern Massachusetts area to keep us informed on new issues.

Main Street and Whiting Street were scabbed and sealed. Work to be done in FY83 will depend upon state reimbursements which are presently estimated to be greater than this year.

Trees: We have maintained a minimum program. Gypsy Moth spray by air will be applied if determined necessary. The tree seedling sale of last Spring was a great success and will be repeated this year. Roadside tree planting program was carried on to replace those removed.

Cemetery: We still have sufficient space, but will have to have more in a few years. We are looking into the possibility of a pet cemetery.

Playground: Maintenance of playgrounds is being carried on by a cooperative effort between the School Department, DPW and the users. A program of upgrading one playground per year was started last year by rebuilding the Curtis School field and this year the Center School field. The new infield grading machine has made it possible to keep the fields in good condition with reduced personnel.

Water: The modifications to the Treatment Plant are underway. Delays in equipment deliveries have put us behind schedule and full operation will probably not be accomplished until Fall 1982. Fortunately, we have sufficient supply and did not have to restrict water use due to the drought. Conservation is the watch word: WASTE NOT — WANT NOT. We are hoping to find more operating economics and be able to hold the same water rate through FY 83.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

To the Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of Hanover:

The Conservation Commission meets regularly on the first and third Monday of each month at 7:30 P.M. Office hours are maintained from 8:30 to 10:30 A.M., Monday through Friday by Mrs. Lois McAfee, Conservation Agent. The office phone number is 826-6506. Maps of Conservation areas are available and organized walks in these areas can be arranged.

In 1981 the Conservation Commission conducted 28 hearings including reconvened hearings under state and local wetlands acts and participated in two on-site hearings convened by the Department of Environmental Quality Engineering. Several proposals presented at hearings required the Commission to obtain professional assistance.

In conjunction with the development of Folly Hill Estates, a 23.65 acre parcel of land south of Tindale Way and north of Laurie Lane was deeded to the Conservation Commission at not cost to the town. Access by right of way from Folly Hill Lane or Broadway and existing trails wind through upland and swamp.

A woodland management program was initiated which involved selective cutting of mature pine trees in the Fireworks area off King Street. Another resource of returning funds to the town was the Clark Cranberry bog on King Street which is harvested each year under lease. \$1,987.80 was turned into the E and D account from harvesting of renewable resources.

Walks of conservation land conducted by Katherine Townsend were attended by interested citizens.

Familiar faces no longer seen in the Conservation Office include Agent Prudence Miller, Chairman Lois Heim, former Chairman Marjorie Abbott, Vice-Chairman, and member Carl Arlanson, all of whom resigned this year. Their service to Hanover is much appreciated by those who know the effort each has put forth.

The Commission notes with regret the passing of Richard E. Bradford longtime member and friend of the environment.

We thank the Town Officers, Boards, and citizens for their continuing cooperation and look forward to 1982 as a year of increased environmental awareness and responsibility.

HANOVER HOUSING AUTHORITY

During the past year, your Housing Authority underwent several changes in the composition of its membership. Mr. Richard Bentley, appointed to fill the vacancy created by the death of the late George Parker, was defeated by Michael Ahern at the Annual Town Election. Mr. John Forry the State Appointee to the Housing Authority submitted his resignation. Mr. John O'Leary was appointed by the State to replace Mr. Forry.

In January, the Hanover Housing Authority entered into a purchase and sale agreement with Ralph D. Tedeschi of Norwell, for the purchase of thirteen acres of land on Spring Street. Shortly thereafter, pursuant to a subsequent purchase and sale agreement with the Hanover Legion Elderly Housing Corporation, your Housing Authority sold 5.3 acres of the Spring Street land to the Legion Corporation for the construction of a 60 unit housing development for the Elderly and Handicapped.

Almost paralleling the construction of the Legion Elderly Housing Corporation Project, was the Cushing Residence, Inc. This 150 unit Housing for the Elderly and Handicapped on Washington Street, broke ground and is now fully operational. Although your Housing Authority has no control or supervision over either housing project., we stand ready to aid and assist them at all times.

The Hanover Housing Authority has been constantly searching for funding from both the State and Federal Agencies. To accomplish that end, a professional in the field of housing, Mr. Stanley Goldman, of East Bridgewater was engaged on a limited basis to bring expertise to the Housing Authority. Mr. Goldman has assisted the Authority in the preparation of the endless number of forms required in obtaining funding. His most recent project was in the preparation of Application for Section - 8 Housing Assistance Payments Program. A program to assist eligible families to secure assistance in obtaining suitable housing (rent assistance).

At the Annual Town Meeting, the Housing Authority returned to the citizens of Hanover the sum of \$3,688.67. The amount represented the balance from the funds given to the Authority in May and November of 1977 to: (a) acquire an option or building site and (b) authorizing a sum to retain professional assistance in site selection for Housing for the Elderly and Handicapped.

Most noteworthy during 1981 was the implementation of a program to generate new ideas and concepts in the field of Housing. The Authority believed that by opening up lines of communication with other Housing Authorities in the South Shore Area, such a program could be viable. Thus far the Authority has met with the Rockland Housing Authority and representatives of the Scituate Housing Authority. We intend to continue with this program in the coming year.

The Hanover Housing Authority will continue to serve in the best interests of the citizens of Hanover.

The Plymouth County Cooperative Extension Service's Office is located on High St., Hanson, and can be reached by calling 293-3541, 447-5946 or 746-0053. STAFF:

Our staff is comprised of a Director, two Regional Agricultural Specialists, a Community Resource Development Specialist, two Home Economists, four 4-H Agents and four clerical staff.

In addition to our County Staff, we administer a Nutritional Educational Program for limited-income families in Plymouth County (Expanded Food & Nutrition Educational Program). We have two professional nutritionists and ten aides. This office is located at 32 Belmont St., Brockton, and is funded by Federal Nutrition Funds, through the University of Massachusetts, our Land-Grant College. This is for both 4-H and Adult Program.

Our Expanded Food and Nutrition Program (EFNEP) has expanded from Brockton to all of Plymouth County's twenty-six towns.

In 1980-81, there were 4,722 youth involved in our 4-H EFNEP Nutrition Program. You can obtain information about current programs, as well as up-to-date consumer information, by requesting the free monthly newsletter, Kitchen Quotes. This newsletter can be sent to you by calling the Brockton Office at 583-2545 or 583-2598. This newsletter is also prepared in Spanish.

In our traditional 4-H Program, we have 1,313 members with 22,041 other youth participating in our short-term and school programs. The 1977 population of Plymouth County schools was 96,287. This means 2,412 of the Plymouth County youth have been involved in our programs this year.

In your town, Hanover, there were 684 youths that participated in these programs.

Contact your Town Director, Leander B. Nichols, for the County Cooperative Extension Service with any suggestions or request.

Free bulletins are on display at our office on lawn care, gardening, nutrition, home canning and freezing, to name just a few. If you pass our office in your travels, please stop and get to know us. We continue to test soil, free of charge for Plymouth County residents. Our Home Economist will also check your pressure cooker gauge.

I would like to thank all who aided me and provided answers to my many questions during my first six months in office. Much appreciation is also extended to my predecessor, Mrs. Grace Q. Smith, who made the transition of my taking over her duties an easier task, and to my office staff and Deputy Collector for their efforts and many courtiesies.

I also want to thank the Citizens of Hanover for their conscientious efforts to pay the many bills that are mailed from this office each year. In these days of Proposition 2½ your continued cooperation is important.

REPORT OF ASSESSORS

To: The Citizens of Hanover

Several recent developments affecting your Assessing Department should be pointed out at this time.

- 1. Our budget for fiscal year 1982 was reduced 40% as of July 1, 1981 and the Full time Assistant Assessor/Appraiser was made part-time.
- New buildings and adjusted assessments increased total valuation from 223,850,300. to 225,613,340. or 1,763,040. (All Classes including Personal Property).
- 3. The 1982 tax rate (under 2½) is 27.55 per thousand and this figure is further defined as school tax rate 18.39 and general government rate 9.16 per thousand for all services except schools.

Ideally, in government, when each community was equalized at 100% the tax rate would reflect the efficient or inefficient operation of government. Since our revaluation as of January 1, 1978 the tax rate has consistently gone down: 79 - 35.70, 80 - 34.50, 81 - 32.70, and in the first year of 2½ 82 - 27.55. The requirement for the Cities and Towns to maintain fair and equitable valuations at 100% is spelled out in Chapter 40 & 58 as amended by Chapters 508 and 797 of the General Laws. After the approval of our 1979 revaluation, an upgrading was required in the second year. As pointed out in our last report, the Department of Revenue agreed that Hanover could increase all assessments 15% across the Board. This was done as of January 1, 1980 and the new values were reflected in the 1981 tax bills.

As we approach fiscal 1983 the State Department of Revenue advises that our values have dropped below 10% of the 100% Full and Fair Cash Value. Our own

sales/ratio study confirms this as of 1981 sales. A simple adjustment by factoring will not be permitted mainly because an across-the-board factoring a second time will compound any existing inequities. The possibility of undertaking a total revaluation is real and your assessors are working on the matter as this report goes to press.

HANOVER COMPUTER STUDY COMMITTEE REPORT

The Hanover Computer Study Committee was appointed by the Board of Selectmen in June 1980. We reported in the 1980 annual report the scope and direction of the Committee's study along with an anticipated mid 1981 schedule report of our finding. This report highlights the progress during 1981.

A sixteen page Town of Hanover, Computer/Automation Opportunity Report (summary recommendations attached) was completed and forwarded to the Board of Selectmen on May 27, 1981. This report resulted from a one-year study addressing the feasibility of computer and automation candidates and recommended direction in this area for the Town of Hanover.

As previously committed, this report covers most of the major organizational units within Town government. These included: Tax Collector's Office, Treasurer's Office, Town Accountant's Office, School Department, Board of Assessors, Department of Public Works, Board of Health, John Curtis Free Library, Registrar, Town Clerk's Office and Board of Selectmen. The primary areas of study in these

organizational units were the financial matters and to a lesser degree informational needs. The Committee believes that there was both a concrete direction and conclusions/recommendations presented in the Report and that this report fulfills the original scope and charge of the Committee.

Our Committee met with the Board of Selectmen on January 4, 1982 to review the reports and its content in a public session and the report was released to the press. The Board of Selectmen indicated that some of the Committee's recommendations had already been undertaken by the areas involved. It was agreed that future direction and commitment on the part of the Committee would be worked out with the Town Accountant/Administrator and he would act as the coordinator for automation and computer related activities within town government. Currently this Committee remains inactive pending this contact.

This report is to be considered a report of progress for the Hanover Computer Study Committee.

HANOVER SCHOOL DEPARTMENT ANNUAL REPORT 1981

The Hanover Public Schools, like most parts of local government throughout the Commonwealth, suffered severe cut backs because of financial restrictions resulting from a state referendum known as Proposition 2½. While the educational impact is yet to be felt, some of the initial reductions will be noted in this report as well as many of the successes and changes in the school system, most of which began before the budget restriction. At a time of retrenchment it is well first to look briefly at some underlying thoughts about schools.

Essentially, our schools should be centers of learning. In the past two decades our schools also have been asked to be social glue for society's shortcomings. School budgets have been expected to pay for a variety of desirable social services such as health, welfare, recreation, transportation, entertainment, child care and food services. Many new subjects, courses and activities have come into being but it is a plain fact, some subjects are more important than others for a basic education. In a democracy it is not appropriate to educate only the few and train the many because all can and should profit from comprehensive basic education. Clifton Fadiman said it; "there is a direct connection between survival of our democracy and the excellence of our public schools."

The Hanover School Committee adopted some general objectives for schools in 1973, the State Department of Education adopted a similar set shortly thereafter. Some of the school system's activities in '81 are organized under these objectives; a reader is referred to earlier Annual Reports for a more complete view of school activities.

The impact of the loss in staff and programs because of Proposition 2½ has yet to be felt by students. However, the School Budget, between June and September was reduced \$1,031,825, even while the goods and services rose with the recent double digit inflation. Forty professional positions were eliminated as follows: At the high school 13 positions (two administrators, nine teachers, two specialists); at the junior high 12 positions (eleven teachers, one specialist); and the elementary schools 15 positions (one administrator, eleven teachers, three specialists). Each one of these people had been performing high quality, needed services for groups of students; each had worked effectively to educate Hanover youth 1300 hours or more in the past year. The loss represented a twenty percent cut in staff while the student body dropped three percent. Forty-eight nonprofessional positions also have been eliminated since the summer of 1981. These represent 13 cafeteria workers, 22 aides, 3 custodians, 1 maintenance worker and 9 tutors. The impact on students from these cuts can be seen in the loss of tutoring and small group work for those with special needs, the fact that teachers must take time from students to do clerical and routine chores, that less time can be spent cleaning and repairing school buildings and grounds and that the whole purpose of the cafeteria operation changed.

Throughout the school system many programs and services have been cut. Some eliminated activities include the dental program, the music consultant for coordination and evaluation, growth and development, courses, permanent in-house substitute teachers for better coverage, nurse aid program and services, music instrumental purchases to provide for a balanced musical organization, subsidized summer schools so that programs could be more affordable for less affluent students, town supported night schools so that costs for programs even for older citizens, could be at more affordable rates, and late buses to transport students home who stay after school for extra help, extra curricula activities and sports.

In the elementary schools there is no longer a supervised handwriting program, after school intramural sports have gone and free instrumental lessons for anyone in grade four and five were put on a pay-as-you-go basis. "The Nutcracker" a traditional December presentation at Center School lacked sufficient staff, supplementary readers for social studies and reading programs could not be bought, eliminating this help for students, the Junior Great Books program no longer challenged the young minds of top students. Small classes for those students needing more individual attention had to be eliminated for lack of teachers, especially those specialized in the teaching of reading.

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In the secondary schools the loss of a teacher eliminated the teaching of French and Spanish in grade 8, Project Read, a course and challenge for able students also was cut because a teacher was lost. Intramurals at all levels and all interscholastic sports in the junior high and ninth grade were dropped for lack of funds. In addition, the sixth grade programs in home economics and industrial arts both were dropped, as was the entire high school home economics program and the health education program in grade six. Some 30 high school elective courses in all subjects were cut plus some remedial reading work for those still having reading problems in high school, all because of staff layoffs. The junior high Great Books program for the able student, the high school debate club and the filming of ballgames to help student athletes get scholarships all ceased for lack of funds. Much remains, but the impact of these cuts slowly will take its toll on students throughout the school system.

These cuts in programs, services and people is only the first step down a long and dark road. The impact of these cuts will be felt on all students more and more each year. While people may come to accept these cuts with time and may even come to accept the lower level of opportunity, all students in all grades will be the losers. The forty educators who are no longer in the schools had been a carefully selected group brought to Hanover because of their high quality of skill and dedication. Their hard work, commitment and achievements with Hanover children still found them the first victims of Proposition 2½. Failure to reverse such cuts or to keep pace with inflation will continue this erosion of our greatest resource, the youth of Hanover.

To keep any large and complex system operating most effectively there needs to be constant evaluation and improvements in specific aspects of the operation. This included staff retraining to effectively apply planned improvements. Two examples serve to illustrate this concept occurring throughout the school system this year. A two-year intensive reevaluation of the high school involved the teachers, others in the school system, as well as students, parents and citizens. In the spring, a professional team was sent to our high school by the New England Association of Schools and Colleges, our accrediting agency, to review our work and prepare a written evaluation. The parent organization has just voted to continue our accreditation for five years through 1986 based on the report submitted. In a summary statement; "The Commission commended the diversity and extent of course offerings for students which include alternative flexible campus programs, and the varied counseling services provided by the guidance department in a spacious, attractive, well-equipped guidance suite. The Commission was also pleased to note the positive feelings and affection for the school that exist among the staff, administration and students." Since that report, half the guidance staff has been lost, many of the programs curtailed or eliminated because of staff layoffs resulting from reduction in funds from the town; the impact of these reductions on the accreditation is, as yet, unknown.

The second example indicates the effort to improve the schools based on local, state and national concerns for more emphasis on basic education. A new elementary

reading curriculum for kindergarten through grade five was developed during the year. It recognizes that reading is a complex process and attempts to organize the component skills in that process for easy access instruction at each grade level.

Both the elementary and secondary reading objectives of the Basic Skills Competency Program have been correlated with the specific reading skills of the curriculum guide. In addition, the guide contains an overview of methods and materials of beginning reading instruction, as well as assessment instruments to determine the most appropriate instructional material for students. To date several in-service programs have focused on making staff aware of the curriculum components and their optimum use. Severe losses in teachers who specialize in remediating reading problems will make the curriculum more important but results harder to achieve.

At the secondary school level, curriculum work continues to upgrade the teaching of social studies especially strengthening the U.S. history and government program with an eye to having a more basic curriculum. The effectiveness of these changes will be more obvious when the current class receiving the new instruction reaches its senior year.

The next three sections will focus on foals the school committee has set for each student and some activities occurring in 1981 which furthered these objectives. There are many other positive events worthy of reporting but space limits these to a few lines each at the end of the report.

The school system allows students to explore new computer/media methods of communication. The media services this year were extended to provide for computer assisted instruction and computer literary financed with federal funds. The high school library obtained a microcomputer with software to help students prepare for college entrance examinations. Plans are underway to have computer assisted instruction in reading at the junior high and in math at the elementary school level. The junior high media center acquired six microcomputers and now provides computer literacy instruction to a large number of students after school; plans are underway to also provide this instruction during the school day. In addition, there are twelve microcomputers in the high school math and business education departments. The computers were obtained through federal grants; the software is bought with local funds. These computers are used throughout the school day; in the evenings they are used by the citizens of Hanover through the extended opportunities program.

Through the math department, two computer courses were taught in the spring with 47 students using the machines sometimes as much as 16 hours a day. In the fall 75 students signed up for the subjects and more computers are being sought through the federal government, local funds being unavailable because of Proposition 2½.

The business education department also is using the new computers. Commodore computers replaced unit record equipment so students will be able to handle this business concept after graduation. The data processing curriculum was revised. Students learned to write computer programs using BASIC language; they also learned to operate computers, printers, flow chart techniques and disc drives. Word Processing concepts were introduced this year into the secretarial office procedures and students used word processing machine dictation tapes. Unfortunately, because of teacher layoffs resulting from Proposition 2½, this program was cancelled for 81-82.

The school system allows students to develop a positive self image and to work together successfully in groups. Interscholastic athletics provided a positive extracurricula experience for many young men and women even as funds were reduced. This year saw the elimination of junior high intramural and interscholastic athletics and the elimination of freshman high school teams in favor of retaining varsity, and

in many cases, subvarsity teams. Some 347 different students participated on 24 high school teams experiencing the discipline of practice and the thrill of competition. Of this group, 166 were girls and, of these, 16 participated all three seasons and another 39 played for two seasons. Among the 188 boys participating, 14 played all three seasons while another 52 were on teams for two seasons. The total participation was down 136 from the prior year but those student athletes taking part gained not only healthful exercise and athletic skills but the ability to extend themselves, to work with others for a common purpose and to excel. Participation under careful supervision is the major goal of the program. The progress of several girls teams should be noted. Hanover fielded a girls soccer team for the first time. The girls gynmastics team was league champion and the field hockey team also was league champion.

Musical extra-curricula activities offered 418 choral, 284 instrumental students throughout the school system opportunities to experience self satisfaction, positive group experiences and development of cultural appreciation. The loss of three music teachers did strain the music program at all levels and it was only through the generosity of parents of fourth and fifth graders that instrumental lessons were able to be offered on a pay-as-you-go basis for these students. The traditional "Nutcracker" at Center School did not occur because of staff losses. However, 270 young people presented six concerts at Cedar, Center and Sylvester schools to appreciative parents and friends. At Cedar, a 100 student chorus sang at both Christmas and Humanities Night programs. Sixty older students at Center school presented Christmas and Spring Concerts while 110 students were in two performances at Sylvester. The Junior High Chorus, 110 strong, performed at three evening concerts, an Open House and Assembly programs.

At the high school there were 60 students in the chorus, 28 in the Chamber Singers, 77 in the Marching Band, 61 in the Concert Band and 21 in the Jazz Ensemble. The members of these five musical organizations gained in self image and in working with others through hours of group practice; they also performed and competed in public. Combinations of these high school groups gave five concerts at the school. The band also played exchange concerts with their counterparts in Jericho, New York, The Chamber Singers during spring vacation toured in New York, Pennsylvania and Connecticut. The band performed at home football games and in parades on Memorial Day in Hanover, Columbus Day in Boston and Veterans Day in Rockland. "Gigi" was the musical presented in February. Both the chorus and band presented private concerts at all schools and made public appearances at the Lions Christmas Lighting, Stetson House, Cushing School and high school graduation. In competition 15 students were selected for SEMSBA, 14 for Southeast District, 3 for All State performance and the Jazz Group entered the regional Jazz Ensemble Festival. For a high school of our size, these were the largest number of students so recognized in the state.

Dramatics is yet another extra curricula program offering students opportunities to develop group involvement and success. Junior High students presented "Cheaper by the Dozen" supported by over 20 staff members and many parent volunteers. At the High School the drama workshops led to a presentation of "Mind of a Killer" which did well in the Boston Globe Competition, a new cast is preparing to enter "Vanities" in next year's competition. The Senior Class Play was "The Mousetrap" bringing still more students in contact with drama. In the Summer Theatre the Hanover students produced "Carousel". Sports, Music and Drama are but some of the ways students in the Hanover schools experience extra curricula opportunities for growth.

The school system allows students to acquire learning leading to self actualization in later life. While students are recognized throughout their school life, most recognitions come towards the end of high school; this year was no exception. The Class of '81 contained 208 students and 63 percent of these, nearly all applying, were accepted into institutions of higher learning. These 132 students received 324 acceptances at 86 colleges; many of the students were offered some financial aid but it is unfortunate that some students do not attend the college of their first choice because of financial limitations. Fifty-three members of the class had obtained jobs by graduation, six others had entered careers in nursing and four in the armed forces. One of the graduates received a National Merit Letter of Commendation. At graduation, class members had received \$144,030 in financial aid \$21,030 of which was raised locally. Our thanks are extended to those many generous citizens who helped raise this money and aided the graduates this year.

Other recognitions came to students this year and three will be cited here as representative of many. Science Fairs have been an opportunity for talented and specialized students to explore new areas and compete. Fairs were successfully held at Sylvester and High School this year; the high school winners entering regional and state compettion. On the state level Lori Chamberlin earned First Prize and the Navy Science Superior Achievement Award, Robin Waterman and Jeff Higginson received second prizes and David Virtue, third prize, a crowning achievement for these students and the science program in the Hanover Schools.

A cooperative work study program enrolls 74 students in either distributive education or work study. This job training covers such fields as the trades, floral design, small machine operators, book binding and business occupation like short order cook, retail sales and bank teller. By this fall this present group had earned a record \$48,110 and are assured of good job placements at graduation.

Project REACH (Recognizing and Enriching Academics and Creativity in Hanover) was most effective with groups of students in both the elementary and junior high schools this year. One recognition came from the Future Problem Solving Program, a national competition designed to provide practice in creative problem solving process. Groups of students worked on responses, sent results to be scored based on work done throughout the year, both a junior high and a grade 4-6 team were invited to enter state competition. Both did very well in their first competition, the younger team receiving third place out of 28 teams in their category. This team from Cedar School was the youngest ever in state competition. Our teacher at the junior high was recognized by being invited to coach the state winners and take them to the nationals; unfortunately her skills are now lost to Hanover because of Proposition 2½ cuts.

A few recognitions and activites are now covered briefly:

- Speakers from industry have been frequent guests in high school classes, emphasizing career possibilities.
- 21 Cedar School students competed in the National Continental Mathematics League; two received medals and three certificates of distinction for their scores.
- A federal grant was obtained to pay for a van to provide transportation for special needs students, thus eliminating part of a costly mandated contracted transportation service.
- The David McGillivray Run for the Jimmy Fund received strong support in the Hanover Schools thanks to the effective organization by the Athletic Department.
- One elementary class was paired with a class at the Kaiulani School in Hawaii. The exchange of letters, local gifts, videotapes and slides made both classes, half a world apart, better appreciate each other and the One World concept.
- A program was developed at the junior high for some special needs students who had formerly been placed in private schools at much greater expense.

- -- High School Math Team competed successfully in both the Greater Mathematics League and the Southeastern Massachusetts Math League.
- -- A citizen group was organized to raise funds to continue to maintain town athletic fields assisting several town departments who worked cooperatively to upgrade these fields despite funds cut by Proposition 2½.
- The dental health program in the primary school grades was able to continue because of federal and business grants obtained.
- -- A class of wheelchair-bound adolescents attends a basic skills program at Hanover High funded by the North River Collaborative.

As always, there are many groups and individuals who volunteer thousand of hours to help enrich the education of Hanover Youth. To avoid missing one, none will be here named but everyone who did give this extra effort on behalf of the young people is sincerely thanked.

REPORT OF THE VISITING NURSE

To the Board of Selectmen, the Hanover Visiting Nurse Association, and the Citizens of Hanover:

On March 31, 1981 this agency withdrew from the Medicare-Medicaid Program. (Provisions were made to still offer Nursing, Physical therapy, and Home Health Aides to residents under these programs, if the criteria was met.)

A total of 2,613 visits were made this year of which there were: 1,135 Nursing 72 Physical Therapy, 29 Home Health Aides, 1,249 Health Supervision, 33 Case Assessments, and 95 Unclassified and Social Service.

Sixteen well Child Conferences were held this year; 219 children attended and received physicals, immunizations and health counseling. Appointments may be made by calling the Nurses' Office.

Twelve Senior Citizen Conferences were held with 302 attending. The conferences are held the last Wednesday of every month from 1-3:30 p.m. at the Grange Hall, for all residents over 60 years of age.

The Adult Blood Pressure Conferences are held the third Friday of every month at the Nurses' office from 1;3:30 p.m. for adults below 60 years of age. A total of 158 were seen this year.

An evening Blood Pressure Conference is held every other month (February, April, June, October, December) on the first Monday of the month from 7-8:30 p.m. at the Town Hall. A total of 29 clients were seen this year.

In November, Blood Pressure days were instituted at the Cardinal Cushing Residence. Building No. 1 clients are seen the first Monday; Building No. 2, the second Monday; Building No. 3, the third Monday. A total of 136 were seen this year.

Letters of Congratulations are sent to all new babies and their parents, and include all services provided by this agency. Parents may call and request an appointment at the Well Child Conference.

The nurses and board members assisted at the Flu Clinics held at the Grange Hall in October.

The nurses have attended in-service programs, lectures, and seminars throughout the year to keep up with the latest trends in Public Health Nursing.

The Nurses' Office is located on the first floor of the new addition at the Town Hall. An answering machine is in operation when the nurses are out of the office.

The Board coordinated and conducted the Amblyopia screening for all pre-school children in conjunction with the April pre-school registration of the school department. In November, Board members and their nurse cooperated with the Board of Health at the flu shot clinic.

The Board awarded six camperships to Hanover children in the summer and gave a total of \$1,550 in scholarships to Hanover residents.

The Association maintains a well-stocked supply of loan equipment, including sick room supplies, which may be borrowed by any Hanover resident.

BOARD OF HEALTH

The Board of Health respectfully submits our annual report for the year 1981.

Catharine B. Hall, Treasurer

The Board meets Monday evenings at 7:30 P.M. — the first, third and fifth Mondays with the exception of Holidays. Special meetings are posted. The office is opened Monday through Friday from 8:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M. There is a full time Health Agent who performs the various duties and enforces the rules and regulations which come under the jurisdiction of the Board of Health.

During the year 7814 tons of refuse were disposed of at the Transfer Station. Thanks to the continuing efforts of our citizens our recycling program returned monies to the Town. Recycled glass — \$2,107.93. Newspapers and cardboard — \$1,677.96 — totaling \$3,809.09. Weighing of commercial vehicles collected \$595. We are presently charging \$20 per ton for receiving out of town refuse which amounted to \$15,580.00. for the year. Percolation tests of which 103 were performed amounted to \$2,575.00. 46-Disposal Works Construction Permits were issued and brought in \$1,150.00. Fees for licenses came to \$4,002.50. The total revenue returned in 1981 was \$27,711.89.

The Mosquito control aerial program was continued again in 1981. Flu clinics were held for residents over 65 years of age. Vaccine is provided for school immunization programs: Diphtheria, Tetanus, Measles/Mumps/Rubella and Polio. Mantoux clinics are held for testing for Tuberculosis for all food handlers employed within the Town of Hanover and the school personnel. Two Rabies Clinics for dogs were held in 1981. 139 — Dogs were innoculated.

Because of the limitations of Proposition 2½ we cut the Board's of Health Budget in every area possible. At the Transfer Station the staff was reduced by one employee. Charles Inglis, Sr. retired in October of 1981. He had been the Foreman at the station since its inception in 1972. We wish to thank him for his years of service.

Mr. Sullivan was appointed to serve as Hazardous Waste Co-ordinator for the Town. Because of proposed changes in the well and aquifer protection districts the Board of Health will continue enforcing its regulation concerning any activity within 1000' of all wells.

JOHN CURTIS FREE LIBRARY

To the Citizens of Hanover:

The total circulation for 1981 was 95,665 items. This represents an increase of 4.577 items over 1980. We have once again had a per capita circulation above the average of other towns of our size in the state as well as of all other libraries in the Eastern Massachusetts Library System, despite a reduction in hours and staff. Passes to the Science Museum, Museum of Fine Arts, Childrens' Museum and USS Constitution Museum were circulated to 285 families.

52 records and ,1,885 books were added to the collection and 22 records and 1,429 books were withdrawn leaving a record collection of 1,850 records and a book collection of 50,904 volumes. 1,046 new patrons were registered and 291 interlibrary loans were processed.

The renovation of the adult reading room, funded by the alice Marian Curtis Trust Fund, was completed. The charging desk and book stacks were relocated and additional shelving for periodicals and oversized books was purchased.

Mrs. Nancy Anderson retired after 14 years of service in April 1981. Her position was eliminated due to budget reductions thus causing a cutback in hours in the Childrens' Room. Library hours are: Adult Department: Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, 10:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.; Thursday, Friday, Saturday, 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.;

Childrens' Department: Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, 1:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m.; Thursday, Friday, 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.; Saturday, 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. The library is closed on Saturdays from June 1 to October 15.

The Hatfield and Phillips Rooms which are available to all organizations in town, were used by the Hanover Woman's Club, Juniors, Hanover Historical Society, Visiting Nurse Association, Hanover Sociables and Citizens Advisory Committee.

Programming for children included "Storytime" for pre-schoolers, film programs and a summer reading program. Adult programs included a speed reading course, a feature-length film series and a demonstration of Pilgrim cooking.

A group of residents interested in supporting the Library organized the "Friends of the John Curtis Free Library". All residents are invited to become members. Mrs. Teresa Diniak was elected the first president. A group of volunteer Friends assisted the Library staff in re-registering all patrons for the first time in the 10 years since the Library started issuing borrowers' cards.

The Hanover Woman's Club Juniors, Hanover Lions Club, Hanover Garden Club and Hanover Sociables, as well as several individuals, made contributions for the purchase of library materials for which the Trustees, staff and patrons are most grateful. A large number of books continue to be purchased from the income of the Alice Marian Curtis Trust, the Bradlee Rogers Trust and the Louise B. Middleton Fund. Funds to purchase books to honor or memorialize someone are most welcome. They provide a living memorial. Larger gifts in the form of cash or securities may be used to establish an annual program of book purchases.

Mrs. Diantha Guimares resigned from the Board of Trustees and Mrs. Grace Boyle was appointed to fill the unexpired term. The Board of Trustees meets regularly on the second Tuesday of each month at 8:00 p.m. in the Library. The public is invited to attend and the Trustees welcome suggestions.

REPORT OF THE HANOVER PLANNING BOARD

1981 was the first full year during which building within the Water Resource Protection District was allowed. As might be expected, interest was high and several small projects (mostly expansion of existing businesses) were brought in under the Site Plan procedure. Several proposals were for larger developments. These included a retail tile store opposite the Mall, an office complex opposite the Post Office and a proposed office park on Webster Street just off Route 53. In addition, one major development (Grossman's Home Center) was initiated towards the end of the year and construction is expected to begin in late Spring of 1982.

It is interesting to note that the Board received excellent cooperation from developers on these projects. It indicates that the best interests of both the landowners and the Town need not be in conflict. The results should benefit all parties and not be harmful to anyone.

Residential construction remains at a very low level. The development off Hanover Street on the former Tindale land is an exception.

It is indeed a pleasure to report the final construction of Country Road and a portion of Hacketts Pond Drive in the Pondbrook development in North Hanover. The developer's bond was called and the Planning Board advertised for bids. Work was completed before hard frost much to the delight of residents on the streets. The Planning Board wishes to extend its thanks to all Town Boards who cooperated in this project, with special gratitude to the Department of Public Works and to our Town Counsel, David G. Nagle, Jr.

Every indication so far supports the long-standing belief of the Board that our Water Resource Protection District will be a credit to the Town both for its primary purpose of conserving the Water Supply and for the improvement of traffic and appearance of Route 53. The density requirements are resulting in much better preplanning and utilization of land. The buffer requirements are providing better control of individual lots and eliminating the old buga-boo of connected parking areas being used as alternative entrance and egress areas.

We look forward to continuing the promising beginning in this area.

Regionalization of Cable Television for Hanover and the surrounding towns is inevitable. The Committee hoped that the towns could take the initiative, but such efforts were fruitless.

The Committee then drafted the Issuing Authority Report, which will be approved by the Selectmen and issued to the five applicants. Amendments are due April 1, 1982. Public Hearings on the Applications will be scheduled in May. The public is invited. An award will be made in June.
