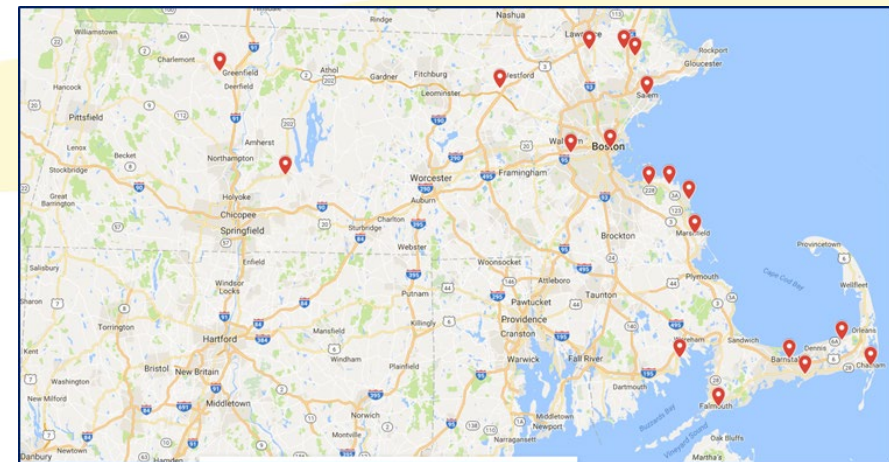

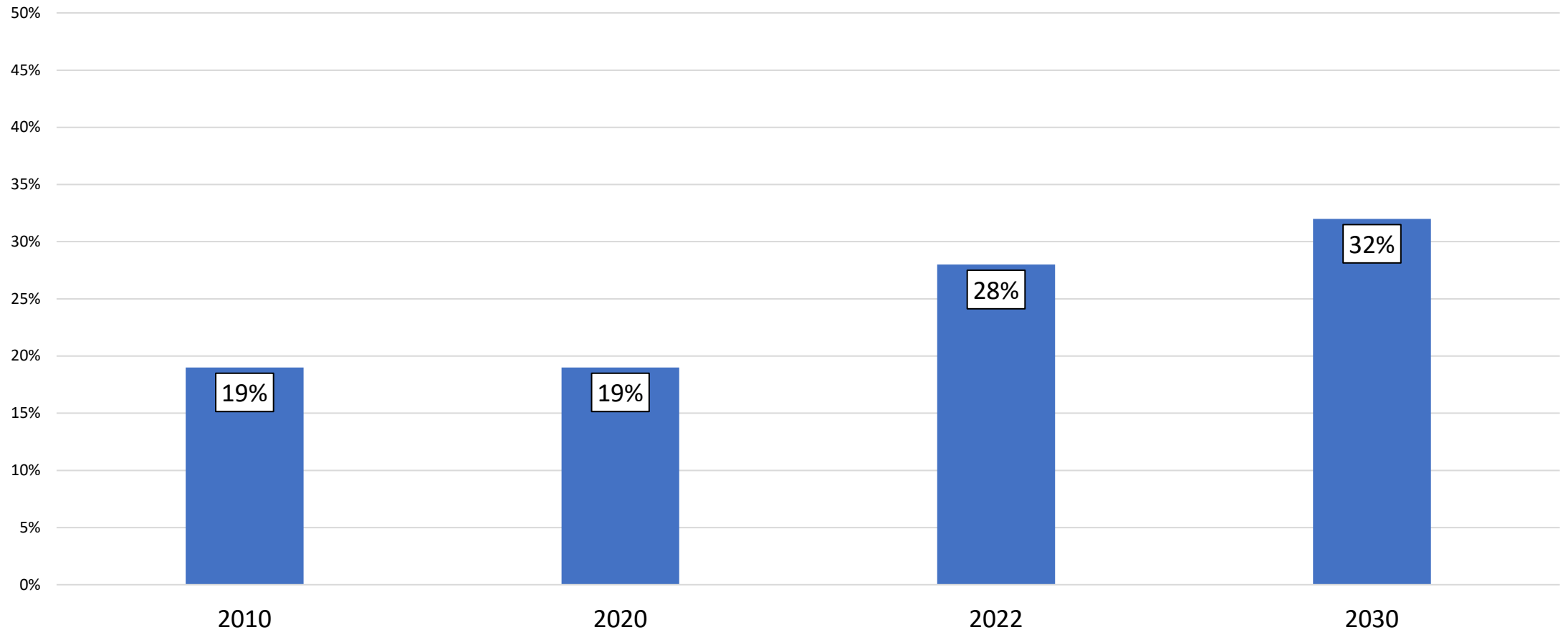
“Our mission is to conduct applied research that informs communities as their populations become older demographically, including research on topics that impact older adults seeking to age in their communities.”



Purpose:

- Is meant to identify, understand, and prioritize needs of older residents of Hanover that must be addressed to maintain Hanover as a place to age well. Results of the proposed project are intended to:
 - Inform strategic planning of the COA re: programming, services, and capacity needs of space and staff.
 - Raise awareness of aging-related issues Town-wide, inform other municipal departments as they consider their own practices.
 - To support an application to be designated an Age & Dementia Friendly community.


By 2030, it is estimated that 32% of Hanover residents will be age 60+



Source: Data from 2010 are drawn from the Census; from 2020 are from the ACS (2016-2020) estimates; from 2022 are the local Town Census; from 2030 are projections from the Donahue Institute at UMass.

Other Factors to Consider:

- Multiple birth cohorts (a.k.a., generations) within the 60+ population
- Healthy aging means more people are living longer and living more active lives.
- Not just about programming---senior centers are hubs of information and resources about health, long term care, caregiving supports, and other issues that affect health and wellbeing.

A Dementia Friendly Community

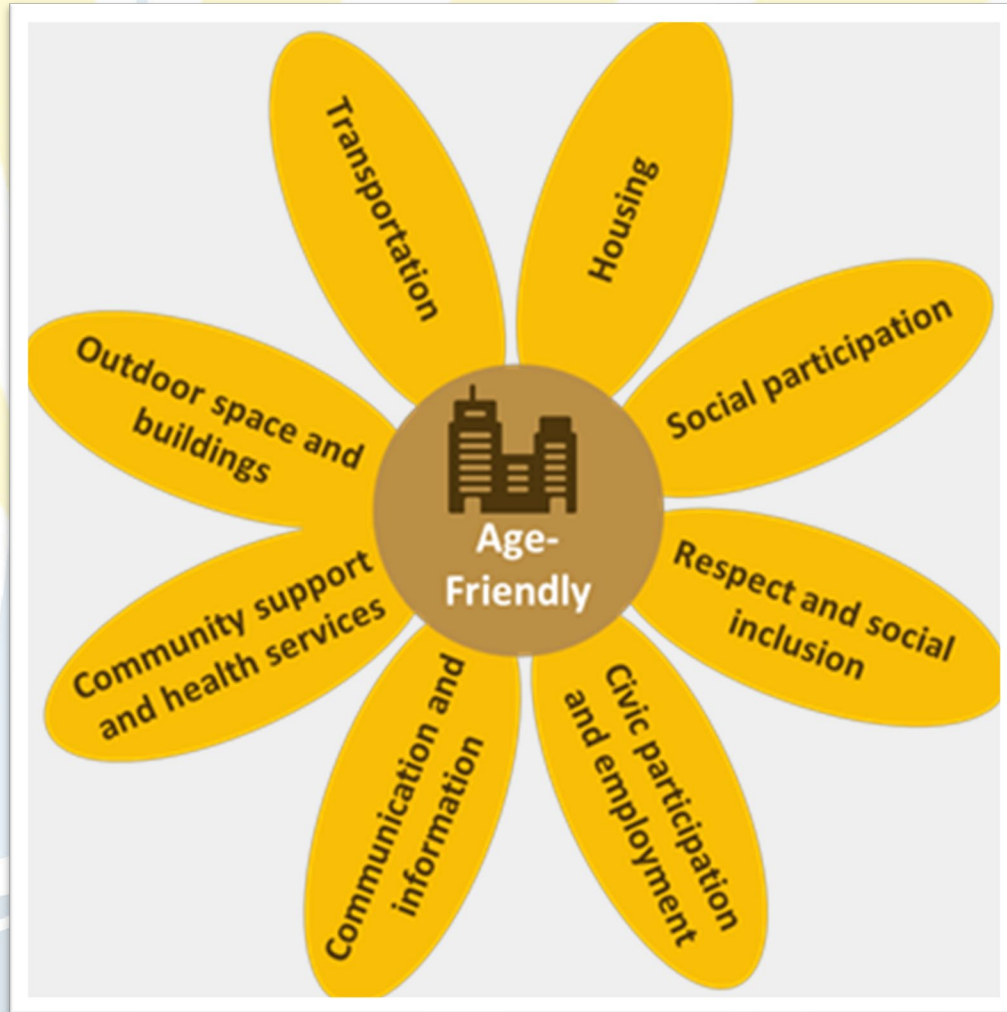

- Offers educational opportunities to build awareness, support, safety, and respect in the community

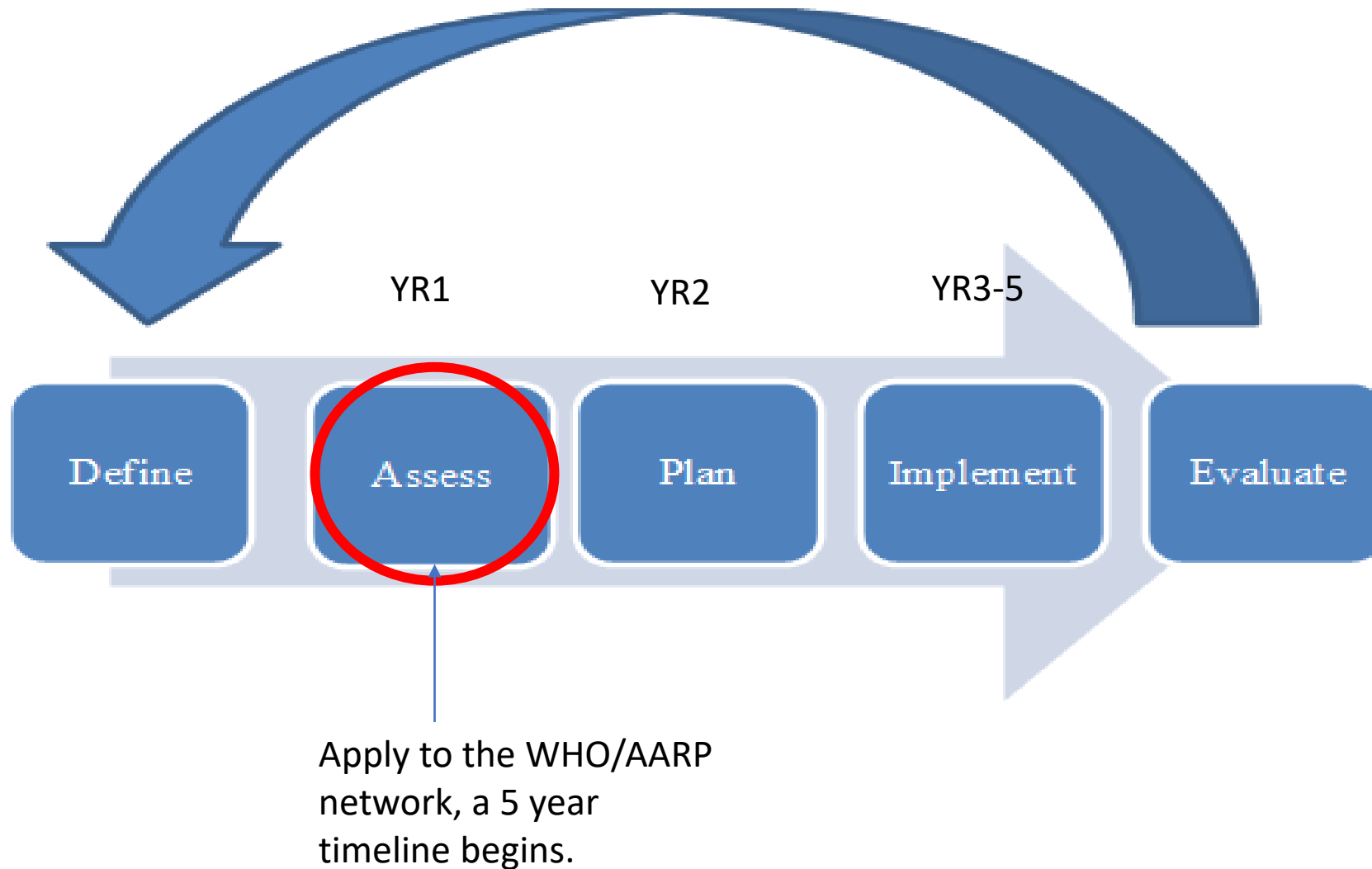
Age Friendly Framework

8 Domains of an Age Friendly Community



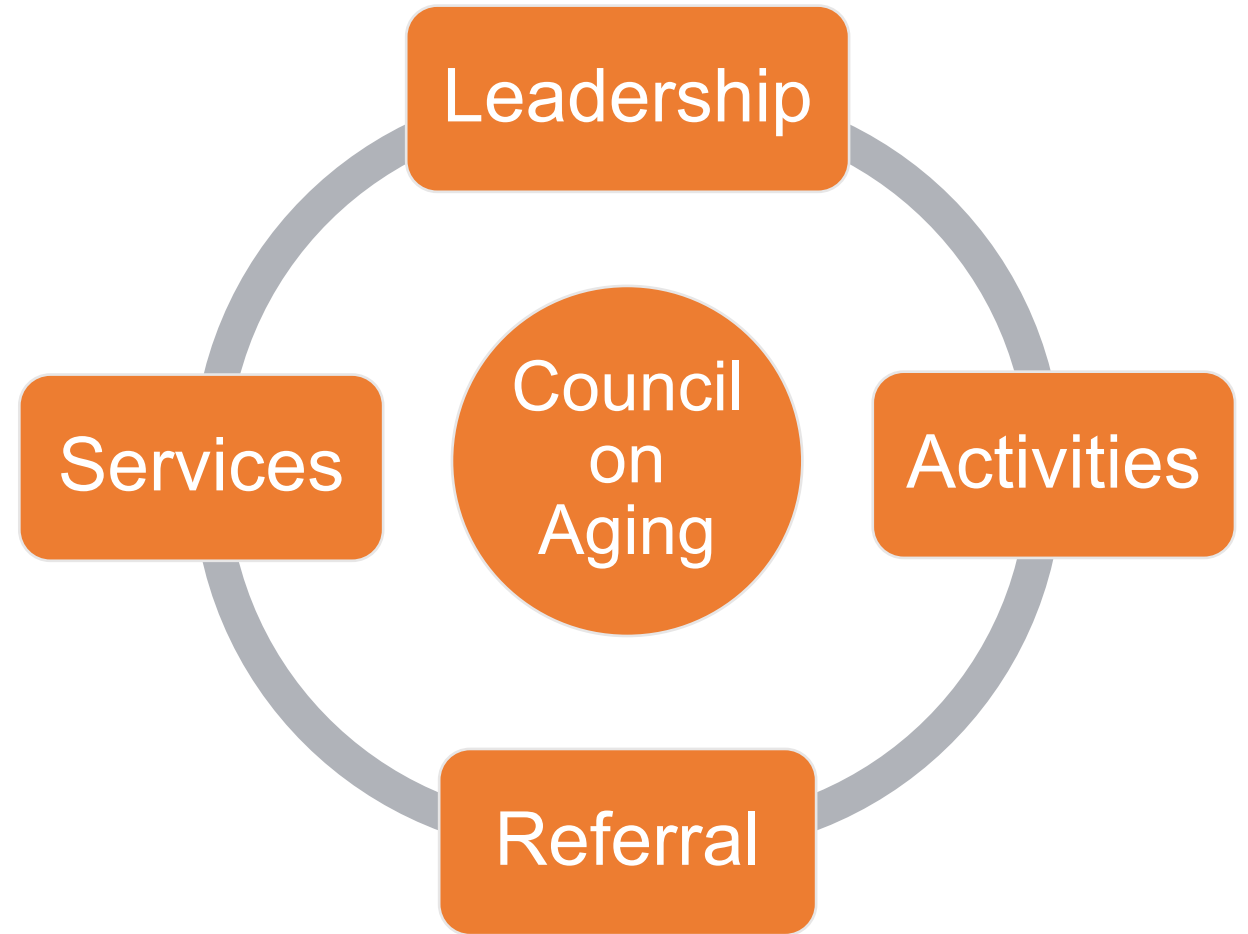
- Supports Aging in Place and promotes personal independence
- Enables people of all ages to actively participate in community activities and treats everyone with respect, regardless of their age
- Makes it easy for older people to stay connected to people who are important to them
- Helps people stay healthy and provides support to those who can no longer live independently
