# ARTICLES FOR *SPECIAL* TOWN MEETING WARRANT Monday, May 2, 2022

#### ARTICLE 1. PAYMENT OF PRIOR YEAR EXPENDITURES

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money or transfer from any available funds, or to transfer from other accounts, to pay such accounts as may be presented against the Town for which an appropriation does not exist, or take any other action relative thereto.

We move that the Town vote to appropriate from Certified Free Cash the sum of \$489.47 to be used as set forth in this Article.

Advisory Committee Commentary: This Article implements a routine housekeeping procedure and allows the Finance Director to pay invoices presented for payment after the close of the prior fiscal year. Pursuant to State law, a Town Meeting vote is required to accept and pay these outstanding invoices. This Article is presented at the Special Town Meeting so that the vendors can be paid as soon as possible if the Article is approved.

## ARTICLE 2. APPROPRIATE FUNDS – QUINQUENNIAL REVALUATION (\$85,000 FREE CASH)

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, or transfer from available funds, or borrow, the sum of \$85,000 to fund the quinquennial revaluation that is required by the Department of Revenue in order for the Commissioner of Revenue to certify that the Town is assessing property for local tax purposes in a way in which meets legal standards for FY23, or take any other action relative thereto.

We move that the Town vote to appropriate from Certified Free Cash the sum of \$85,000 to be used as set forth in this Article.

<u>Advisory Committee Commentary:</u> This Article provides funding for the property (commercial, residential, industrial, etc.) revaluation, as required by the Department of Revenue every five years. This work will begin in the spring to ensure the revaluation is complete in time for the setting of the tax rate in the fall. The Advisory Committee supports the recommendation of the Finance Director.

Advisory Committee Commentary: This Article would rescind the borrowing authorization for the remaining balances in accounts that funded projects which have since been completed under budget. Since these projects have been completed with less than the funds originally believed to be necessary, the borrowing authorization for the unused funds is no longer needed.

#### ARTICLE 4. 10 YEAR SERVICE AGREEMENT

To see if the Town will vote to approve a service agreement of 10 years with Global Traffic Technologies, LLC for service relative to an Opticom EVP (Emergency Vehicle Preemption) system consisting of hardware and software for intersections, and town vehicles or take any other action relative thereto.

Advisory Committee Commentary: This article will approve a ten-year service agreement for enhancement of public safety infrastructure. The Town of Hanover has utilized infrared (IR) Vehicle Pre-Emption Devices to allow fire and police vehicles to quickly and safely navigate through intersections within the community for over twenty years. These devices have been shown to reduce the chance of a vehicle collision by seventy-percent and decrease response times for both fire and police by nearly twenty-five percent. Multiple evaluations by independent contractors have revealed that only ten percent of this equipment is functioning normally. A new GPS based vehicle pre-emption system was chosen to replace the aging and dysfunctional IR equipment both at each of Hanover's twelve intersections and in all fire and police vehicles. The new GPS system offers the latest technology available for this type of infrastructure and, unlike the previous system and equipment, allows for a fully supported service and maintenance plan. This plan will ensure equipment, both in vehicles and intersections, is working at all times and, if necessary, repairs are made in a timely fashion – at no additional cost to the Town. The installation, both at each intersection and in all fire and police vehicles, along with the ten-year service and maintenance plan are included in the cost. Currently the Town is on a month-to-month plan for the Opticom maintenance and passage of this Article will allow the Town to enter into the 10-year agreement immediately following Town Meeting.

#### ARTICLE 5. TRANSFER FUNDS – SNOW & ICE EXPENSES (\$130,945 FREE CASH)

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from available funds, in accordance with the Massachusetts General Laws, the sum of \$130,945 to meet deficits or unforeseen costs for Snow & Ice Removal, or take any other action relative thereto.

We move that the Town vote to appropriate from Certified Free Cash the sum of \$130,945 to be used as set forth in this Article.

Advisory Committee Commentary: This Article appropriates from free cash \$130,945 to be used to pay overages in the Snow and Ice budget. The Town budgeted too conservatively last year for this line-item, the price of salt increased, and we experienced several long duration events. Passage of this Article is needed to cover the deficit prior to fiscal year-end.
